WHEREAS, this Council has conducted proceedings under and pursuant to the Municipal Improvement Act of 1913, Division 12, California Streets and Highways Code (the "Act") and Resolution Ordering the Assessment District Formation No. 6642, adopted June 28, 2001 (the "Resolution of Formation"), to form the Heritage Springs Assessment District 2001-1 (the "Assessment District"), to authorize the levy of special assessment upon the lands within the Assessment District, to acquire and construct public streets and other improvements, all as described therein; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 10100.8 of the Act and the Resolution of Intention, this Council is authorized to levy annual assessments (the "Assessments") for maintenance, repair or improvement, including all expenses required for resurfacing and repair to public streets (the "Maintenance") in and adjacent to the Assessment District to keep such acquisitions and improvements in fit operating condition which are ordinarily incurred no more frequently than every five years, of the acquisitions and improvements for the Assessment District; and

WHEREAS, under the Act, this Council and for the annual levy of the Assessments, on May 21, 2024, has adopted Resolution No. 9911, a Resolution of the City Council of the City of Santa Fe Springs of Intention to Levy Annual Assessments for the City of Santa Fe Springs Heritage Springs Assessment District 2001-1 for Fiscal Year 2024/2025 (the "Intention Resolution") and approved the Engineer's Report (the "Engineer's Report") prepared pursuant to the Act for purposes of the levy of assessments for Fiscal Year 2024/2025; and

WHEREAS, as specified in the Intention Resolution, and upon notice as required by the Act, this Council held a public hearing on the issue of the levy of the assessments for the Next Fiscal Year, and all persons desiring to be heard were given an opportunity to be heard, and all objections to the assessment were considered by this Council.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SANTA FE SPRINGS DOES RESOLVE AS FOLLOWS:

1. Objections Overruled. Any and all objections and protests against the annual levy of assessments for the Assessment District, as a whole or as to any part

thereof, or against the estimate of costs and the assessments, in whole or in part, written and oral, are hereby overruled.

- 2. Public Interest. The public interest, convenience and necessity require the levy of annual assessments for the Assessment District.
- 3. District Described. The District specially benefited and to be assessed to pay the costs and expenses thereof, and the exterior boundaries thereof, are as shown by the assessment diagram thereof filed in the offices of the City Clerk, which map is made a part hereof by reference thereto.
- 4. Engineer's Report Approved. The Engineer's Report, in the form on file with the City Clerk and to which reference is hereby made for further particulars, including the estimates of costs and expenses, the apportionment of assessments and the assessment diagram contained in the Engineer's Report, was adopted on May 21, 2024, by Resolution No. 9910 shall stand as the Engineer's Report for FY 2024/2025.
- 5. Benefits Determined. Based on the oral and documentary evidence, including the Engineer's Report, offered and received at the public hearing, this Board expressly finds and determines that each of the several subdivisions of land in the Assessment District will be specially benefited.
- 6. Collection of Assessments. The assessments herein confirmed shall be collected in the same manner and upon the same roll as general taxes of the County of Los Angeles are collected. The Director of Finance and Administrative Services or other authorized official of the City is hereby authorized and directed to cause such collections to be made for the Next Fiscal Year.
 - 7. Effective. This resolution shall take effect from and after its adoption.

PART I – DESCRIPTION OF IMPROVEMENTS

The assessments in the District shall be levied for the maintenance of improvements as follows, and shall include all incidental expenses, including administration, legal, establishment of reserves, collection and contracting.

The improvements proposed to be maintained may be generally described as Hawkins Street, east of Norwalk Boulevard, and Palm Drive, south of Hawkins Street. The maintenance of such improvements is proposed to consist of the continued maintenance and operation of such improvements, including the maintenance of pavement and appurtenant facilities that are located in and along such streets, including but not limited to, personnel, electrical energy, utilities, materials, contracting services, and other items necessary for the satisfactory maintenance of these improvements described as follows:

PART IV - METHOD OF APPORTIONMENT

The assessments are apportioned according to the special benefits received by the parcels of land within the Assessment District in accordance with the apportionment of costs at the time of formation. The assessment is necessary to maintain the level of special benefit from the construction of the improvements funded by the District. The proportionate special benefit derived by each parcel is determined in relationship to the entirety of the maintenance cost of the improvements. No assessment has been apportioned on any parcel that exceeds the reasonable cost of the proportional special benefit conferred on that parcel.

Only special benefits may be assessed and any general benefits shall be separated from the special benefits for purposes of this Report. Based on the nature of the improvements to be funded herein, there are no general benefits.

Under this Report, the assessment for the District are apportioned in accordance with the foregoing and using the following criteria:

The net acreage of each parcel of land is determined by excluding acreage which will not have direct access to the improvements from Hawkins Street or Palm Drive, and by excluding acreage to be dedicated as roadway, road rights-of-way, or sidewalk easement. Special benefit is determined based on the net acreage of each parcel relative to the total net acreage (the "Benefit Percentage").

The annual maintenance assessment for Fiscal Year 2024-25, as shown in Part II of this Report, is apportioned on a percentage basis using the Benefit Percentages, as shown below:

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SANTA FE SPRINGS, CALIFORNIA, DECLARING ITS INTENTION TO PROVIDE FOR AN ANNUAL LEVY AND COLLECTION OF ASSESSMENTS FOR CERTAIN MAINTENANCE IN AN EXISTING DISTRICT, PURSUANT TO THE PROVISIONS OF DIVISION 12 OF THE STREETS AND HIGHWAYS CODE OF THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA, AND SETTING A TIME AND PLACE FOR PUBLIC HEARING THEREON

WHEREAS, this Council has conducted proceedings under and pursuant to the Municipal Improvement Act of 1913, Division 12, California Streets and Highways Code to form the Heritage Springs Assessment District 2001-1 ("Assessment District"), in what is known and designated as:

CITY OF SANTA FE SPRINGS Herltage Springs Assessment District 2001-1

WHEREAS, at this time, this City Council is desirous to take proceedings to provide for the annual levy of assessments for the next ensuing fiscal year, to provide for the costs and expenses necessary for continual maintenance of improvements within said Assessment District; and,

WHEREAS, at this time there has been presented and approved by this City Council, the Engineer's "Report" as required by law, and this City Council is desirous of proceeding with the proceedings for said annual levy.

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. That the above recitals are true and correct.

PUBLIC INTEREST

SECTION 2. That the public interest and convenience requires, and it is the intention of this City Council, to undertake proceedings for the annual levy and collection of special assessments for the continual maintenance of certain improvements, all to serve and benefit said Assessment District as said area is shown and delineated on a map as previously approved by this City Council and on file in the Office of the City Cierk, open to public inspection, and herein so referenced and made a part hereof, and proposed changes thereto are set forth in the "Report" of the Engineer, incorporated herein as a part hereof.

REPORT

SECTION 3. That the "Report" of the Engineer regarding the annual levy for said District, which "Report" is for maintenance for the Fiscal Year 2024/2025 is hereby approved and is directed to be filed in the Office of the City Clerk.

SECTION 4. That the public interest and convenience requires, and it is the intention of this City Council to order the annual assessment levy for the Assessment District as set forth and described in said Engineer's "Report," and further it is determined to be in the best public interest and convenience to levy and collect annual assessments to pay the costs and expenses of said maintenance and improvement as estimated in said "Report."

DESCRIPTION OF MAINTENANCE

SECTION 5. The assessments levled and collected shall be for the maintenance of certain improvements, as set forth in the Engineer's "Report," referenced and so incorporated herein.

COUNTY AUDITOR

SECTION 6. The County Auditor shall enter on the County Assessment Roll the amount of the assessments, and shall collect sald assessments at the time and in the same manner as County taxes are collected. After collection by the County, the net amount of the assessments, after the deduction of any compensation due to the County for collection, shall be paid to the Treasurer for purposes of paying for the costs and expenses of said Assessment District.

SPECIAL FUND

SECTION 7. That all monles collected shall be deposited in a special fund known as $\,$

SPECIAL FUND CITY OF SANTA FE SPRINGS Heritage Springs Assessment District 2001-1

Payment shall be made out of sald fund only for the purpose provided for in this Resolution, and in order to expedite the making of this maintenance and improvement, the City Council may transfer into

said special fund, from any available source, such funds as it may deem necessary to expedite the proceedings. Any funds shall be repaid out of the proceeds of the assessments provided for in this Resolution.

BOUNDARIES OF THE DISTRICT

SECTION 8. Sald contemplated maintenance work is, in the opinion of this City Council, of direct benefit to the properties within the boundaries of the Assessment District, and this City Council makes the costs and expenses of sald maintenance chargeable upon a district, which district said City Council declares to be the district benefited by sald improvement and maintenance, and to be further assessed to pay the costs and expenses thereof. Said Assessment District, shall include each and every parcel of land within the boundaries of said Assessment District, as said Assessment District is shown on a map as approved by this City Council and on file in the Office of the City Clerk, and designated by the name of the Assessment District.

PUBLIC HEARING

SECTION 9. NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT TUESDAY, THE 16th DAY OF JULY, 2024, AT THE HOUR OF 6:00 O'CLOCK P.M., IN THE REGULAR MEETING OF THE CITY COUNCIL, BEING THE COUNCIL CHAMBERS, IS THE TIME AND PLACE FIXED BY THIS CITY COUNCIL FOR THE HEARING OF PROTESTS OR OBJECTIONS IN REFERENCE TO THE ANNUAL LEVY OF ASSESSMENTS, TO THE EXTENT OF THE MAINTENANCE, AND ANY OTHER MATTERS CONTAINED IN THIS RESOLUTION, ANY PERSONS WHO WISH TO OBJECT TO THE PROCEEDINGS FOR THE ANNUAL LEVY SHOULD FILE A WRITTEN PROTEST WITH THE CITY CLERK PRIOR TO THE TIME SET AND SCHEDULED FOR SAID PUBLIC HEARING.

NOTICE

SECTION 10. That the City Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to publish a copy of this Resolution. Said publication shall be not less than ten (10) days before the date for said Public Hearing.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council:

- 1) Conduct a Public Hearing and consider adopting Resolution No. 9920 confirming the Fiscal Year 2024-25 Engineer's Report for the Annual Santa Fe Springs Lighting District No. 1; and,
- 2) Authorize the Levying of the Fiscal Year 2024-25 Assessments; and,
- 3) Take such additional, related, action that may be desirable.

FISCAL IMPACT

The recommended resolution provides for the continued levying of assessments in Fiscal Year 2024/2025 for Santa Fe Springs Lighting District No. 1. By special benefit assessments, the Lighting District provides a portion of the funding for the installation, maintenance and operation of the street lighting system in the City of Santa Fe Springs. The net assessment to be distributed over the Lighting District for Fiscal Year 2024/2025 is \$193,765.

BACKGROUND

On May 21, 2024, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 9909 declaring its intention to provide an annual levy and collection of assessments for certain maintenance in an existing district. Resolution No. 9909 also set the Public Hearing for 6:00 p.m. on July 16,

2024, with the notice published in the Whittier Daily News. The Proof of Publication of the hearing notice is included in Attachment C.

The net assessment to be distributed over the Lighting District for Fiscal Year 2024/2025 is \$193,765. This sum shall be assessed according to the benefits received by properties located within Lighting District No. 1. The methodology for the distribution of assessments and the assessment rates over the Lighting District complies with the requirements of State Proposition 218.

ANALYSIS

Resolution No. 9920 (Attachment A) establishes approval and confirmation of the Engineer's Report for Lighting District No. 1 (Attachment B) and authorizes the levying of such assessments. These actions are required in order to complete the direct assessment process with the County Auditor and place the appropriate parcel assessments on the County Assessment Roll.

SUMMARY/NEXT STEPS

The City Council will consider the adoption of Resolution No. 9920 confirming the Engineer's Report for FY 2024-25 Lighting District No. 1 and authorizing the levying of such assessments. NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SANTA FE SPRINGS DOES RESOLVE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1: That the above recitals are true and correct.

<u>Section 2:</u> That upon the conclusion of the Public Hearing, written protests filed, and not withdrawn, did not represent property owners owning more than fifty percent (50%) of the area of assessable lands within the District, and all protests are overruled and denied.

<u>Section 3:</u> That this City Council hereby confirms the diagram and assessment as submitted and orders the annual levy of the assessment for the fiscal year and in the amounts as set forth in the Engineer's Report and as referred to in the Resolution of Intention as previously adopted relating to said annual assessment levy.

<u>Section 4:</u> That the diagram and assessment as set forth and contained in said Engineer's Report are hereby confirmed and adopted by this City Council.

<u>Section 5:</u> That the adoption of this Resolution constitutes the levy of the assessment for the fiscal year.

<u>Section 6:</u> That the estimates of costs, the assessment diagram, the assessments and all other matters, as set forth in the Engineer's Report," pursuant to said "Landscaping and Lighting Act of 1972," as submitted, are hereby approved, adopted by this City Council and hereby confirmed.

Section 7: That the maintenance works of improvements contemplated by the Resolution of Intention shall be performed pursuant to law and the County Auditor shall enter on the County Assessment Roll the amount of the Assessment, and said assessment shall then be collected at the same time and in the same manner as the County taxes are collected. After collection by said County, the net amount of the assessment shall be paid to the City Treasurer of said City.

Section 8: That the City Treasurer has previously established a special fund known as the:

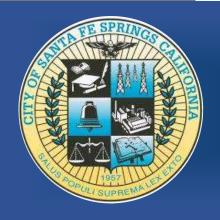

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I. OVERVIEW

A. INTRODUCTION

The City of Santa Fe Springs (hereafter referred to as "City") annually levies and collects special assessments in order to provide and maintain the improvements within the Santa Fe Springs Lighting District No. 1 (hereafter referred to as "District"). The District was formed on May 26, 1982 and is annually levied pursuant to the Landscaping and Lighting Act of 1972, Part 2 of Division 15 of the California Streets and Highways Code (hereafter referred to as the "1972 Act"). The annual assessments levied on parcels within the District are based on the special benefits received, and partially fund the costs associated with the installation, maintenance, operation and administration of the public streetlight system within the District.

This Engineer's Report (hereafter referred to as the "Report") has been prepared pursuant to the order of the City Council as required by the provisions *Chapter 3*, of the 1972 Act (*commencing with Section 22620*), which outlines the procedures for the annual levy of assessments. This Report provides an update of the District including the proposed expenses and revenues, any substantial change in the improvements or the District, and the proposed assessments to be levied on the County of Los Angeles (the "County") tax roll for Fiscal Year 2024/2025 and has been prepared pursuant to the requirements of *Article 4, Chapter 1*, of the 1972 Act (*inclusive of Sections 22565 through 22574*). In addition to the provisions of the 1972 Act, it has been determined that the existing annual assessments for this District have been previously levied in accordance with the provisions of the *California Constitution Article XIIID* which was enacted as a result of the passage of Proposition 218, approved by the California voters in November 1996.

The annual assessment rate for the District has not increased since Fiscal Year 1992/1993, although the costs of providing the improvements that benefit the properties within the District have continued to rise. Initially, the rising costs to provide streetlights within the District were offset by the District fund balance and an assessment increase was not necessary. Eventually the District fund balance was exhausted and the City began making increasingly greater contributions each year to the District expenses, not only to cover the general benefit portion of the costs, but also to subsidize the special benefit costs not recovered by the annual assessments.

In 2004, the City performed an extensive review of the District including the boundaries of the District, the properties therein, the special benefit properties received from the improvements, the general benefit the improvements may provide to properties outside the District or to the public at large, as well as the current and long-term costs and expenses associated with providing the improvements. Based on this review and evaluation, the City Council determined that it was necessary and in the best interest of the property owners within the District to conduct a property owner protest ballot proceeding for an increase to the annual assessments for Fiscal Year 2004/2005 in accordance with the



provisions of the *California Constitution Article XIIID*. Based on the ballot tabulation conducted on July 8, 2004, a majority protest existed, and the proposed assessment increase was not imposed.

The word "parcel", for the purposes of this Report, refers to an individual property assigned its own Assessment Parcel Number by the Los Angeles County Assessor's Office. The Los Angeles County Auditor/Controller uses Assessment Parcel Numbers and specific Fund Numbers to identify, on the tax roll, properties assessed for special district benefit assessments.

At a noticed annual Public Hearing, the City Council will consider public testimony regarding the District. The City Council will review the Engineer's Annual Report and may order amendments to the Report or confirm the Report as submitted. Following final approval of the Report and confirmation of the assessments, the Council will order the levy and collection of assessments for Fiscal Year 2024/2025 pursuant to the 1972 Act. In such case, the assessment information will be submitted to the County of Los Angeles (the "County") Auditor/Controller for inclusion on the property tax roll for each parcel in Fiscal Year 2024/2025. If any parcel submitted for collection is identified by the County Auditor/Controller to be an invalid parcel number for the current Fiscal Year, a corrected parcel number and/or new parcel numbers will be identified and resubmitted to the County. The assessment amount to be levied and collected for the resubmitted parcel or parcels shall be based on the method of apportionment and assessment rate approved by the City Council.

B. COMPLIANCE WITH THE CURRENT LEGISLATION

As a result of the passage of Proposition 218 in November 1996, *Articles XIIIC and XIIID* were added to the California Constitution. *Article XIIID* specifically addressed both the substantive and procedural requirements to be followed for assessments. The procedural and approval process for assessments outlined in this article apply to assessment districts, with the exception of those existing assessments that met one or more of the exemptions set forth in *Section 5* of the Article. Specifically as it relates to Lighting District No. 1, the exemption provision set forth in *Section 5(a) of Article XIIID* states:

"...assessments existing on the effective date of this Article shall be exempt from the procedures and approval process set forth in Section 4 [if they were] imposed exclusively to finance the capital costs or maintenance and operation expenses for sidewalks, streets, sewers, water, flood control, drainage systems or vector control."

The District's streetlight assessments were established in Fiscal Year 1982/1983 and have not been increased since Fiscal Year 1992/1993. These assessments have funded improvements that are classified as street improvements as defined herein based on the definitions provided by the Office of the Controller for the State



of California in the "Guidelines Relating to Gas Tax Expenditures" published by the Division of Local Government Fiscal Affairs. The state's gas tax program is administered in city agencies, but audited by the Office of the State Controller. The proceeds of the gas tax are statutorily limited to expenditures for streets and roads. Because the funds are restricted to street and road expenditures, the State Controller has developed the "Street Purpose Definitions and Guidelines" based on the "Manual of Uniform Highway Accounting and Financial Management Procedures" developed by the American Association of State Highway Officials. Street improvement, as it relates to this District, is defined as the construction, operation, or maintenance of facilities within the right of way used for street or road purposes including but not limited to the following:

- Installation or expansion of the streetlight system including replacement of old equipment with superior equipment, installation of traffic signals at intersections and railroad crossings, replacement of equipment as required for relocations for street purposes, and purchase and installation of traffic signal control equipment.
- Servicing lighting systems and street or road traffic control devices including, repainting and repairing traffic signals and lighting standards; and furnishing of power for street and road lighting and traffic control devices.

Therefore, the existing District assessments (assessment rates and method of apportionment) approved and levied prior to the passage of Proposition 218, are exempt from both the substantive and procedural approval process defined by *Article XIIID*, *Section 4*, until such time the assessments are increased.



II. DESCRIPTION OF THE DISTRICT AND SERVICES

A. BOUNDARIES OF THE DISTRICT

The boundary of the District is completely within the City limits of the City and is shown on the Assessment Diagram, which is on file in the office of the City Clerk at the City Hall of Santa Fe Springs, a depiction of which is shown in Exhibit A of this Report. The parcels of real property included within the District are identified by land use categories ("Use Codes"). A listing of the Use Codes that may be applicable to parcels within this District and typically utilized by the Los Angeles County Assessor's Office for identification of property land uses is provided in the Method of Apportionment section of this Report. Excluded from assessments are utility easements, rights-of-way, common areas, public schools, public streets, residential properties, and other public properties. The parcels within the District are described in detail on the assessor parcel maps on file in the Los Angeles County Assessor's Office, which by reference are made a part of this Report.

B. IMPROVEMENTS AUTHORIZED BY THE 1972 ACT

As applicable or may be applicable to this proposed District, the 1972 Act defines improvements to mean one or any combination of the following:

- The installation or construction of public lighting facilities.
- The installation or construction of any facilities which are appurtenant to any
 of the foregoing or which are necessary or convenient for the maintenance
 or servicing thereof, including, but not limited to, grading, clearing, removal
 of debris, the installation or construction of curbs, gutters, walls, sidewalks,
 or paving, or water, irrigation, drainage, or electrical facilities.
- The maintenance or servicing, or both, of any of the foregoing.
- The acquisition of any existing improvement otherwise authorized pursuant to this section.



Incidental expenses associated with the improvements including, but not limited to:

- The cost of preparation of the report, including plans, specifications, estimates, diagram, and assessment;
- The costs of printing, advertising, and the publishing, posting and mailing of notices;
- Compensation payable to the County for collection of assessments;
- Compensation of any engineer or attorney employed to render services;
- Any other expenses incidental to the construction, installation, or maintenance and servicing of the improvements;
- Any expenses incidental to the issuance of bonds or notes pursuant to Section 22662.5; and
- Costs associated with any elections held for the approval of a new or increased assessment.

The 1972 Act defines "maintain" or "maintenance" to mean furnishing of services and materials for the ordinary and usual maintenance, operation, and servicing of any improvement, including:

- Repair, removal, or replacement of all or any part of any improvement.
- Providing for the life, growth, health, and beauty of landscaping, including cultivation, irrigation, trimming, spraying, fertilizing, or treating for disease or injury.
- The removal of trimmings, rubbish, debris, and other solid waste.
- The cleaning, sandblasting, and painting of walls and other improvements to remove or cover graffiti.

C. IMPROVEMENTS, PLANS AND SPECIFICATIONS

The annual special benefit assessments levied on parcels within the District provide funding for a portion of the annual expenses related to the installation, maintenance, operation and administration of the streetlight system within the District boundaries. The costs associated with the improvements are equitably spread among benefiting parcels in proportion to their special benefits. Streetlight improvements within the City but not within the District's boundaries and that portion of the District's improvements determined to be general benefit are funded by other revenue sources. Only improvements, services and incidental expenses



permitted under provisions of the 1972 Act that are necessary for the ongoing maintenance, operation and administration of the District streetlight system that provides special benefits to the parcels within the District are included in the annual assessment.

Maintenance of the streetlight system within the District may include, but is not limited to removal, repair, replacement, modification, or relocation of the light standards, poles, bulbs, fixtures, and appurtenances. Servicing of the Southern California Edison Company-owned streetlights is furnished by the Southern California Edison Company or by its successors or assignees. The rates charged by the Edison Company include both the power and maintenance costs and are regulated and authorized by the Public Utilities Commission of the State of California. The City's Public Works Department provides for the servicing of the City-owned streetlights. The energy rates charged for City-owned streetlights is also regulated and authorized by the Public Utilities Commission.



Approximately eight percent (8%) of the streetlights within the District are owned and maintained by Southern California Edison Company. The remaining ninety-two percent (92%) of the streetlights are owned by the City and are maintained by the City. The following table provides a summary of the streetlight inventory within the District for Fiscal Year 2024/2025:

The proposed improvements for Fiscal Year 2024/2025 are unchanged from the previous Fiscal Year. Streetlight Inventory Maps showing the location of the various streetlights within the District are on file in the office of the City Clerk at the City Hall and by reference are made part of this Report.



III. METHOD OF APPORTIONMENT

A. GENERAL

The 1972 Act permits the establishment of assessment districts by agencies for the purpose of providing certain public improvements which include the construction, maintenance and servicing of streetlights and appurtenant facilities. The 1972 Act further requires that the cost of these improvements be levied according to benefit:

"The net amount to be assessed upon lands within an assessment district may be apportioned by any formula or method which fairly distributes the net amount among all assessable lots or parcels in proportion to the estimated benefits to be received by each such lot or parcel from the improvements."

The formula used for calculating assessments in this District reflects the composition of the parcels, and the improvements and services provided, to fairly apportion the costs based on estimated benefit to each parcel.

In addition, pursuant to *Article XIIID, Section 4*, a parcel's assessment may not exceed the reasonable cost of the proportional special benefit conferred on that parcel, only special benefits may be assessed and the costs associated with general benefit must separate from the special benefits. Therefore, in compliance with these requirements only the District costs that have been identified as "Special Benefit" are assessed, the costs of any improvements considered to be "General Benefit" have been eliminated from the net amount to be assessed.

B. BENEFIT ANALYSIS

The District's improvements, the associated costs and proposed assessments described in this Report, have been carefully reviewed and have been identified and allocated based on a benefit calculation that proportionally allocates the net cost to the benefiting properties pursuant to the provisions of *Article XIIID* and the 1972 Act. The location and extent of the various streetlight improvements within the District and the associated costs have been identified as either "General Benefits" (not assessed) or "Special Benefits".

Special Benefits

The method of apportionment (method of assessment) established for this District utilizes commonly accepted engineering practices and is based on the premise that each of the assessed parcels within the District receives special benefit from the improvements maintained and financed by District assessments. The desirability and security of properties within the District is enhanced by the presence of streetlights in close proximity to those properties.

The primary benefits of streetlights are for the convenience, safety and protection of people as well as the security and protection of property, property improvements



and goods. Specifically, the benefits of adequate and well-maintained streetlights that benefit both the properties and property owners within the District include:

- Improves ingress and egress to property, provides customers, suppliers and employees an enhanced environment in which to access the properties.
- Enhanced deterrence of crime and the aid to police protection and security activities.
- Reduced vulnerability to criminal assault of employees, patrons and owners at night.
- The promotion of increased business activities during nighttime hours.
- Increased nighttime safety on roads and highways.
- Reduced vandalism and other criminal acts and damage to improvements or personal property.
- Improved traffic circulation and reduced nighttime accidents and personal property loss.
- Reduction of dumping, graffiti and loitering typically associated with poorly lighted areas.
- Enhances desirability of properties and the ability to conduct or expand business opportunities through association with an area that has sufficient streetlights.

The intensity or degree of illumination provided within the District can enhance these benefits and is a significant factor in determining the benefits properties receive from streetlights improvements. The number and intensity of the streetlights provided in this District are significantly greater than the residential areas of the City and are generally more extensive than the streetlights provided in similar commercial and industrial areas of other cities. For these reasons, it has been determined that the streetlight improvements provided by the District are a special benefit to the properties within the District.

General Benefit

Although the improvements clearly provide special benefits to properties within the District, it is recognized that some of these facilities by the nature of their location may also benefit properties outside the District that are not assessed and to a lesser extent may provide some benefit to the public at large. Therefore, a portion of the cost to operate, maintain, and service the streetlight improvements within the District are identified as general benefit and not included in the annual assessments as special benefit. In a detailed evaluation of the entire streetlight system within the City it was determined that, over eighty percent (80%) of the cost to maintain and service the City's streetlights is attributable to the streetlights within this District. The remaining twenty percent (20%) of the City's annual costs for streetlights is associated primarily with the residential areas of the City and these streetlights are currently funded by other revenues sources. Approximately seven percent (7%) of the streetlight improvement costs within the District itself are attributable to streetlight facilities that benefit properties outside the District as well



as properties within the District. Based on this evaluation, it has been determined that twenty-seven percent (27%) of the District's annual costs budgeted for Fiscal Year 2024/2025 is considered general benefit. This is a quantifiable percentage based on the current City streetlight system and expenditures. Although not as quantifiable, it is also reasonable to assume that the District improvements also provide some general benefit to the public at large and a reasonable percentage of this benefit should not exceed three percent (3%) for a total general benefit of thirty percent (30%) of the District's costs. The cost of providing the District improvements that are considered general benefit include benefits conferred on real property or to the public at large. These costs shall not be included in the annual assessments and shall be funded by other revenue sources available to the City. These funds are shown in the annual budget of this Report as a General Fund contribution and the amount to be levied as assessments for the District represent only the special benefit portion of the District expenses.

C. ASSESSMENT METHODOLOGY

Pursuant to the 1972 Act, the costs of the District may be apportioned by any formula or method that fairly distributes the net amount to be assessed among assessable parcels in proportion to the estimated benefits to be received by each such parcel from the improvements. The apportionment of costs used should reflect the composition of the parcels and the improvements and services provided based on each parcel's estimated special benefit.

Benefit Assessment Unit

To assess benefits equitably, it is necessary to relate the different types of parcel improvements to each other. A value of one unit has been assigned as the basic benefit assessment unit. The benefit assessment unit consists of three classifications of benefit: people, security and intensity. The Benefit Factor for each property type is equal to the aggregate amount of benefit assessment units that a parcel receives.

The following table summarizes the various property types within the District by use code and the applicable benefit assessment units that are applied to those properties.

Special Use Codes

The following Use Codes have been listed separately because of their unique operations inherent to their classifications, the size of real property, and the high use as a result of their specific operation. The total benefit assessment unit assigned to each parcel is calculated based on the parcel's acreage and a specified weighting factor applied to that use code designation (formula). However, the minimum benefit units assigned to a parcel shall not be less than the Benefit Factor shown on the "Use Code and Benefit Assessment Units" table shown on the previous page unless the parcel fronts on a street without lights. In this case, the Benefit Factor may be reduced below this minimum. (Refer to the table for "Streets Without Lights").

Use Code 99 is a special use code not found in the Los Angeles County Assessor's listing and is assigned to distribution centers for this District only. Parcels of land in Use Code 99 typically run continual 24-hour operations and receive substantial benefit from the District's streetlight improvements.

Streets Without Lights

The total Benefit Assessment Units of any parcel identified on the "Use Code and Benefit Assessment Units" table shown on the previous page that front on a street without District streetlights shall be assessed for people-related benefits only. It has been determined that these parcels do not receive the same special benefits from security or intensity that other parcels in the District receive.



The Special Use Code parcels on streets with no District streetlight facilities are reduced by approximately 1/3 (of Table 3) to account for their reduced special benefits from security or intensity. The calculation of this reduced benefit is outlined in the following table for Special Use Codes:

D. BENEFIT FORMULA

The benefit formula applied to each parcel is based on the preceding Benefit Assessment Unit tables. Each parcel's Benefit Factor is equal to the aggregate amount of benefit assessment units that a parcel receives and correlates to the parcel's special benefit received as compared to other parcels in the District.

The following formulas are used to calculate each property's assessment:

People Benefit Assessment Unit + Security Benefit Assessment Unit + Intensity Benefit Assessment Unit = Parcel's Benefit Factor

Total Balance to Levy/ Aggregate of Benefit Factors = Levy per Benefit Factor (Assessment Rate)

Assessment Rate x Parcel's Benefit Factor = Parcel Levy Amount

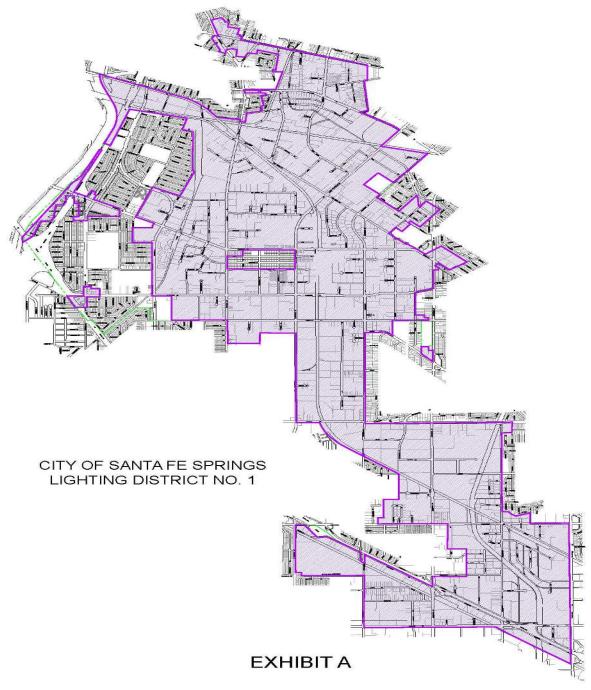




EXHIBIT B - 2024/2025 ASSESSMENT COLLECTION ROLL

Parcel identification for each lot or parcel within the District shall be the parcel as shown on the Los Angeles County Assessor's map for the year in which this Report is prepared.

The land use classification for each parcel has been based on the Los Angeles County Assessor's Roll. A listing of parcels assessed within this District, along with the proposed assessment amounts, has been submitted to the City Clerk and by reference is made part of this Report.

Approval of the Annual Engineer's Report (as submitted or as modified) confirms the method of apportionment and the assessment rate to be levied against each eligible parcel and thereby constitutes the approved levy and collection of assessments for Fiscal Year 2024/2025. The listing of parcels and the amount of assessment to be levied shall be submitted to the County Auditor/Controller and included on the property tax roll for each parcel in Fiscal Year 2024/2025.

If any parcel submitted for collection is identified by the County Auditor/Controller to be an invalid parcel number for the current Fiscal Year, a corrected parcel number and/or new parcel numbers will be identified and resubmitted to the County Auditor/Controller. The assessment amount to be levied and collected for the resubmitted parcel or parcels shall be based on the method of apportionment and assessment rate approved in this Report. Therefore, if a single parcel has changed to multiple parcels, the assessment amount applied to each of the new parcels shall be recalculated and applied according to the approved method of apportionment and assessment rate rather than a proportionate share of the original assessment.

PUBLIC INTEREST

SECTION 2. That the public interest and convenience requires, and it is the intention of this City Council, to undertake proceedings for the annual levy and collection of special assessments for the continual maintenance of certain improvements, all to serve and benefit said District as said area is shown and delineated on a map as previously approved by this City Council and on file in the Office of the City Clerk, open to public inspection, and herein so referenced and made a part hereof, and proposed changes thereto are set forth in the "Report" of the Engineer, incorporated herein as a part hereof.

SECTION 3. That the "Report" of the Engineer regarding the annual levy for said District, which "Report" is for maintenance for the Fiscal Year 2024/2025 is hereby approved and is directed to be filled in the Office of the City Clerk.

SECTION 4. That the public interest and convenience requires, and it is the intention of this City Council to order the annual assessment levy for the District as set forth and described in said Engineer's "Report," and further it is determined to be in the best public interest and convenience to levy and collect annual assessments to pay the costs and expenses of said maintenance and improvement as estimated in said "Report."

DESCRIPTION OF MAINTENANCE

SECTION 5. The assessments levled and collected shall be for the maintenance of certain improvements, as set forth in the Engineer's "Report," referenced and so incorporated herein.

COUNTY AUDITOR

SECTION 6. The County Auditor shall enter on the County Assessment Roll the amount of the assessments, and shall collect said assessments at the time and in the same manner as County taxes are collected. After collection by the County, the net amount of the assessments, after the deduction of any compensation due to the County for collection, shall be paid to the Treasurer for purposes of paying for the costs and expenses of said District.

SPECIAL FUND

FISCAL IMPACT

Approval of Resolution No. 9921 would authorize the allocation of \$138,385 in CDBG funding towards the City's Teen and Home Improvement Programs.

BACKGROUND

The City of Santa Fe Springs participates in the Los Angeles Urban County Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program, a U.S. Department of Housing & Urban Development (HUD) entitlement program administered by the County of Los Angeles Community Development Commission (LACDC). Although the funds are an

"entitlement," every year, the City must make specific application to the County defining the projects to be funded. The application requires public participation subject to proper notification of at least 30 days. Accordingly, notices were posted from May 8, 2024 to June 11, 2024, at City Hall, the kiosk at Town Center Hall, the and City Library advising the public of this hearing.

For FY 2024-2025, the City has been granted a CDBG allocation in the amount of \$138,385. These funds can be utilized for a proposed CDBG project that meets one of the following three national objectives:

- 1. Benefit low- and moderate-income persons;
- 2. Elimination of slums or blight;
- 3. Meet an urgent need.

Based on staff review, it is recommended that the City's CDBG funding for FY 2024-25 be allocated pursuant to the funding breakdown outlined below. Approval of the allocation and proposed programs allows staff to comply with the Community Development Commission requirement to report a preliminary summary of the projected use of our annual CDBG allocation. These programs and budget allocations can be further modified or amended when City Council reviews the City's Fiscal Year 2024-25 budget.

CDBG Allocation Projections New Year Funds = \$138,385

Public Service Authority – Teen Program
 Home Improvement Program
 45% \$20,757
 85% \$117,628

Teen Program - The City is able to utilize \$20,757 or 15% of the CDBG allocation for public service programming. Traditionally, the City uses this amount to partially fund the Teen Program, which is known as The Club and operates out of Town Center Hall.

Home Improvement Program – This project would provide financial assistance in the form of a grant of up to a maximum of \$20,000, to families from low-to-moderate income households for the rehabilitation of owner-occupied, single family dwellings, and or condominiums/townhomes.

It is recommended that the City Council:

- 1) Adopt Resolution No. 9922, requesting the Board of Supervisors of the County of Los Angeles to consolidate a general municipal election to be held on November 5, 2024, with the statewide general election to be held on that date; and
- 2) Adopt Resolution No. 9923, calling for the holding of a general municipal election to be held on Tuesday, November 5, 2024, for the election of certain officers and for the consideration of a tax measure as required by the provisions of the laws of the State of California relating to general law cities.

FISCAL IMPACT

Conducting a Municipal Election incurs various expenses, including those associated with coordination and administration. While it's premature to estimate the exact cost of the upcoming November 5, 2024, General Municipal Election, a not to exceed amount of \$60,000 has been earmarked in the proposed 2024-25 General Fund budget. Typically, the County issues the final invoice for election expenses around March of the subsequent year. Depending on the actual expenses incurred, adjustments to future budgets may be necessary.

If the voters approve the dedicated parcel tax, the tax is expected to generate approximately \$6 Million per year, for 25 years, beginning in FY 2025-26. The amount

generated will increase by approximately 2% per year thereafter (as a result of a 2% automatic rate adjustment built into the tax), but will vary somewhat to the extent land uses in the City change.

BACKGROUND

Elections

The City holds its general elections in each even-numbered year, on the same day as the statewide general elections and presidential elections. These general elections are consolidated with these statewide elections, and administered by the Los Angeles County elections office. This year's presidential election will be held on November 5, 2024.

Councilmembers serve staggered four-year terms. Mayor Jay Sarno and Councilmember Joe Angel Zamora's current terms are in their fourth year. The two seats they currently hold are therefore due to be up for election at the November election.

Parcel Taxes

The City has the authority to levy a parcel tax on land in the City. A parcel tax cannot be levied based on land value, and proceeds of the tax must be legally earmarked for a specific purpose. Parcel taxes are collected on the annual property tax bill administered and collected by the County. Any parcel tax must be approved by the voters by a two-thirds vote.

The City's Roads

The City receives dedicated funding for transportation and road repair/construction from several sources on an annual basis including primarily: 1) Los Angeles County Transportation Authority Sales Tax Local Return Funds (Measure R, Measure M and Proposition C); 2) State Gas Tax; and 3) State Road Repair and Accountability Act of 2017 (SB1). These funding sources total approximately \$2.1 million annually. In addition to the State and LA County transportation funds described above, the City also annually allocates general funds for the City's Capital Improvement Program as available. This program includes all types of capital improvement projects, which makes the annual amount of general funds available for road improvements vary year by year, depending on the City's needs relative to other types of infrastructure. The total annual amount of City funding for roads, including dedicated funds and general funds typically allocated to that purpose, is insufficient to fund the City's pavement management program, including current and ongoing costs that continue to escalate. The existing transportation funding described herein will continue to be primarily dedicated to projects for the repair and rehabilitation of the City's local/residential roads.

Santa Fe Springs, like other largely commercial/industrial cities with proportionately small residential populations, is at a distinct disadvantage relative to most cities in California with respect to transportation funding from the state and the county. Transportation dollars are generally allocated to cities based on their residential population. But because of the extent of commercial and industrial development in the City, Santa Fe Springs has a disproportionately large daytime population compared to its residential population. Furthermore, a disproportionately large portion of the City's road capacity serves commercial and industrial land and the trucks and other vehicles that serve that land cause a disproportional amount of wear to the City's road system.

The City completed a pavement assessment report entitled "Truck Traffic Impact Report" dated August 25, 2021. The report was commissioned to assess the funding needed for the repair and rehabilitation of streets utilized by industrial/commercial truck traffic (Truck Routes) because previous tri-annual updates to the City's Pavement Management System had repeatedly identified a shortfall in annual funding for road repairs in general. The report estimated the total repair cost for Truck Route streets at \$97.4 million at that time.

The City recently updated the data from the 2021 report to account for inflation and the continued degradation of the existing pavement. As the pavement continues to degrade, the type and extent of pavement repair and rehabilitation becomes more complex and expensive. The data was updated to include 10 percent inflation in the cost of construction from 2021 to present day. The inflation along with the updating of pavement condition to account for three years of additional degradation resulted in an updated estimated total repair cost for Truck Route streets of \$116 million. The monies collected from the proposed dedicated parcel tax will be utilized for the repair and rehabilitation of these streets.

DISCUSSION

<u>Election</u>

The accompanying resolutions call the November election. They also take the steps necessary for the County to conduct the election as a consolidated election.

The nomination period for prospective candidates concludes on Friday, August 9, 2024, at 5:00 p.m. In the event that neither of the incumbent candidates submits their candidacy papers by the August 9 deadline, the nomination period for non-incumbent candidates will be extended until Wednesday, August 14, 2024, at 5:00 p.m.

Tax Measure

The accompanying resolutions also submits to the voters an ordinance that imposes a dedicated parcel tax for roads.

The rates of this tax are:

- 7 cents per square foot for commercial parcels.
- 3.5 cents per square foot for industrial parcels.
- 3.5 cents per square foot for vacant parcels.

The tax would be authorized for 25 years. Tax rates would automatically escalate by 2% annually. Residential parcels would be exempt from the tax, as would be parcels (such as church property and most property owned by charitable nonprofits) that are exempt from the County's basic 1% annual tax on property value, parcels that are state-assessed (generally railroad parcels), and parcels that the City is legally prohibited from taxing.

It is estimated that tax proceeds, before the deduction of collection expenses by the County would be approximately \$6 Million in the initial year. Total proceeds over the 25 years are estimated at approximately \$196 Million. Proceeds of the tax, net of administrative expenses, would be usable solely for the purpose of maintaining and repairing the City's roads. The tax would be subject to audits and public reporting requirements.

The ordinance creates a Citizens' Advisory Committee, which would be composed of (i) two residents of the City and (ii) three owners of land subject to the tax or of businesses located on such land. All members would be appointed by the City Council, which would consider membership recommendations of the Chamber of Commerce with respect to the three seats for land or business owners.

The City would be able to issue bonds against the tax, and pay debt service on those bonds using proceeds of the dedicated parcel tax. The City's municipal advisor has modeled that if the City uses a combination of bond financing and pay-as-you-go work, the City could accelerate the work.

WHEREAS, under the provisions of the laws relating to general law cities in the State of California, a General Municipal Election shall be held on November 5, 2024, for the election of Municipal Officers; and

WHEREAS, Elections Code section 9222 and Government Code section 53722 authorize the City Council to submit special tax measures to the voters; and

WHEREAS, the City Council desires to call the election and to submit a dedicated parcel tax measure to the voters at the election.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SANTA FE SPRINGS, CALIFORNIA, DOES RESOLVE, DECLARE, DETERMINE AND ORDER AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. - <u>SECTION 2</u>. That adoption of this measure requires a two-thirds vote of those voting on the matter. The type of tax, rate of tax, and manner of collection are set forth in the Ordinance.
- <u>SECTION 3</u>. That the ballots to be used at the Election shall be in form and content as required by law.
- <u>SECTION 4.</u> That the City Clerk is authorized, instructed and directed to coordinate with the County of Los Angeles Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk to procure and furnish any and all official ballots, notices, printed matter and all supplies, equipment and paraphernalia that may be necessary in order to properly and lawfully conduct the Election.
- SECTION 5. That the vote centers for the election shall be open at seven o'clock a.m. of the day of the Election and shall remain open continuously from that time until eight o'clock p.m. of the same day when the vote centers shall be closed, pursuant to § 10242 of the Elections Code, except as provided in Sections 14212 and 14401 of the Elections Code of the State of California.
- <u>SECTION 6.</u> That in all particulars not recited in this resolution, the Election shall be held and conducted as provided by law for holding municipal elections.
- <u>SECTION 7</u>. That notice of the time and place of holding the Election is given and the City Clerk is authorized, instructed and directed to give further or additional notice of the Election, in time, form and manner as required by law.
- <u>SECTION 8.</u> That in the event of a tie vote (if any two or more persons receive an equal and the highest number of votes for an office) as certified by the County of Los Angeles Registrar-Recorder/County Clerk, the City Council, in accordance with Election Code section 15651(b), shall conduct a special runoff election to resolve the tie vote and such special runoff election is to be held on a Tuesday not less than 40 days nor more than 125 days after the administrative or judicial certification of the election which resulted in a tie vote.
- <u>SECTION 9.</u> The City Council authorizes the City Clerk to administer the Election and all reasonable and actual election expenses shall be paid by the City upon presentation of a properly submitted bill.
- SECTION 10. That pursuant to Section 9282 of the Elections Code of the State of California, the City Council, or any member or members of the City Council authorized by the body, or any individual voter who is eligible to vote on the measure or bona fide association of citizens, or any combination of voters and associations, may file a written argument, not to exceed 300 words in length, accompanied by the printed name(s) and signature(s) of the person(s) submitting it, or if submitted on behalf of an organization, the name of the organization, and the printed name and signature of at least one of its

principal officers, for or against the measure. In the event that more than one argument for or against a measure is timely submitted, the City's elections official shall give preference and priority first, to arguments submitted by member(s) of the City Council, as authorized by this Resolution, and second, to individual voters, bona fide associations, or a combination thereof, in the order set forth in Section 9287 of the Elections Code.

SECTION 11. That the City Council elects to authorize rebuttal arguments pursuant to Elections Code section 9285. When the City's elections official has selected the arguments for and against the measure to will be printed and distributed to the voters, the elections official shall send copies of the argument in favor of the measure to the authors of the argument against, and copies of the argument against to the authors of the argument in favor. The author or a majority of the authors of an argument relating to the foregoing city measure may prepare and submit a rebuttal argument not to exceed two hundred and fifty (250) words in length. A rebuttal argument may not be signed by more than five (5) authors. The rebuttal arguments shall be filed with the City Clerk not more than ten (10) days after the final date for filing direct arguments. Rebuttal arguments shall be printed in the same manner as direct arguments. Each rebuttal argument shall immediately follow the direct argument which it seeks to rebut.

<u>SECTION 12.</u> That the City Clerk is directed to transmit a copy of the Ordinance to the City Attorney for preparation of an impartial analysis pursuant to Government Code section 9280.

<u>SECTION 13.</u> That the City Clerk shall certify to the passage and adoption of this Resolution and enter it into the book of original Resolutions.

Tax Ordinance

AN ORDINANCE OF THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF SANTA FE SPRINGS AMENDING PROVISIONS OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE TO ENACT A SPECIAL PARCEL TAX FOR ROADS

WHEREAS, trucks and other heavy vehicles are the cause of a disproportionate amount of the damage and wear to the City's roads; and

WHEREAS, the best way to prevent potholes and road deterioration is through a program that repairs and maintains roads by rehabilitating road surfaces and otherwise improving the roads; and

WHEREAS, such a program can help to protect the City's groundwater from contaminants originating from vehicles that use the roads; and

WHEREAS, the People of the City of Santa Fe Springs desire that the City's roads be returned to a better condition; and

WHEREAS, the City has been funding road rehabilitation projects using available funds budgeted for that purpose, and will continue to do so regardless of whether this Ordinance is adopted; and

WHEREAS, the People desire that the pace of road rehabilitation be accelerated beyond what is possible using current budget resources; and

WHEREAS, the People desire to create a dedicated source of funds that the City can use solely to fund repair and maintenance of the City's roads; and

WHEREAS, the People can approve a dedicated parcel tax that will be collected by Los Angeles County on property tax bills; and

WHEREAS, the People do not desire to impose a tax on homes and residences; and

WHEREAS, the People desire to levy a dedicated parcel tax on non-residential land to fund the maintenance and repair of the City's roads.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE PEOPLE OF THE CITY OF SANTA FE SPRINGS DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

<u>SECTION 1</u>. The foregoing recitals are true and correct.

<u>SECTION 2</u>. Chapter 35 (Taxation) of Title III (Administration) of the Santa Fe Springs Municipal Code is hereby amended to add a new Subchapter, beginning at Section 35.140, relating to the Roads Dedicated Parcel Tax to read as follows:

ROADS DEDICATED PARCEL TAX

Section 35.140 SHORT TITLE.

This subchapter may be referred to as the City of Santa Fe Springs Roads Dedicated Parcel Tax Ordinance.

Section 35.141 PURPOSE.

The purpose of this subchapter is solely to raise funds for the specific purpose set forth in this subchapter and not for regulation. The dedicated parcel tax imposed by this subchapter is neither an ad valorem tax on real property nor a transaction or sales tax on the sale of property.

Section 35.1424 SPECIAL PURPOSE.

The net proceeds of the dedicated parcel tax shall be used solely for the purpose of maintaining and repairing the roads in the City of Santa Fe Springs.

Section 35.1432 DEFINITIONS.

For the purpose of this subchapter, the following definitions shall apply unless the context clearly indicates or requires a different meaning.

DEDICATED PARCEL TAX. The Roads Dedicated Parcel Tax imposed by Section 35.1443 of this subchapter.

NET PROCEEDS. Proceeds of the dedicated parcel tax that are received by the city from the Los Angeles County Tax Collector (or other officer of the County), less (i) any charges imposed by the county or any department of the county for services associated with the collection of the dedicated parcel tax and (ii) the city's costs of administering the dedicated parcel tax.

ROAD. Any road, street, avenue, or similar thoroughfare that is owned or maintained by the city.

PARCEL. A parcel of property as shown on the records of Los Angeles County Assessors Office.

SPECIAL FUND. The special fund established pursuant to Section 35.15<u>1</u>0 of this subchapter.

TAX ADMINISTRATOR. The Director of Finance and Administrative Services (or such other official designated by the City Council) or designee.

TAX YEAR. The period running from July 1 of a year to June 30 of the following year.

Section 35.1443 TAX IMPOSED.

There is hereby imposed a special tax, to be referred to as the "Roads Dedicated Parcel Tax," on each parcel in the city. The dedicated parcel tax shall be assessed upon a parcel unless that parcel is exempt from the *ad valorem* property tax or is state-assessed property owned by a public utility. Where a parcel is exempted from the dedicated parcel tax by the previous sentence, the dedicated parcel tax shall be imposed on any taxable possessory interest in the parcel based on the characteristics of that possessory interest.

Section 35.1454 COLLECTION.

The dedicated parcel tax shall be collected on the Los Angeles County property tax bill in the same manner and subject to the same penalty as the *ad valorem* property tax collected by the county. The county may deduct its reasonable costs incurred for the services provided to the city under this section before remittal of the balance to the city. The tax administrator shall take such actions as are necessary to obtain the services of the county.

Section 35.1465 TAX RATE.

The annual rate of the dedicated parcel tax shall be:

- A. 7 cents per square foot for commercial parcels.
- B. 3.5 cents per square foot for industrial parcels.
- C. 3.5 cents per square foot for vacant parcels.

Section 35.1476 ANNUAL ADJUSTMENT.

The tax rates listed in Section 35.1465 are the rates that will apply for the 2025-26 tax year. For the 2026-27 tax year, and each subsequent tax year, each tax rate shall automatically adjust upward by two percent (2%) from the rates for the previous tax year.

Section 35.1487 RESIDENTIAL EXEMPTION.

Parcels solely in residential use shall be exempt from the dedicated parcel tax.

Section 35.1498 DETERMINATION OF PARCEL TYPE AND CALCULATION OF SQUARE FOOTAGE.

A. Except as otherwise provided in this section, the taxable square footage of a parcel shall include the entire surface area of the parcel.

- B. Where a parcel includes some combination of residential, industrial and commercial improvements, the square footage of the entire surface area of the parcel shall be apportioned proportional to the square footage of the footprints of the different types of improvements of the parcel. Square footage apportioned to "residential" use shall be excluded from the calculation of the tax. If a building is developed for more than one use (as in a mixed-use residential development with ground floor retail space), for purposes of the preceding sentence, the square footage of the footprint of the mixed use structure shall be divided amongst the uses proportionally to the building square footage of such building.
- C. A parcel shall be considered a "vacant" parcel only if that parcel is developed with no structures with a footprint larger than 20 square feet.
- D. Square footage shall be excluded from the surface area of a parcel if that square footage meets all of the following criteria: (i) it is at a slope of more than four percent (4%) or, by reason of its topography, it is not usable for vehicle parking, (ii) it is not improved with a structure, and (iii) it is not paved in any way and is not planted with grass or other landscaping.

Section 35.449150 DURATION.

The initial tax year in which the annual dedicated parcel tax shall be levied in the 2025-26 tax year. The final year in which the tax shall be levied is the 2049-50 tax year.

Section 35.1510 SPECIAL FUND.

Proceeds of the dedicated parcel tax shall be deposited into a separate fund. All money in that fund shall be used solely for the purpose set forth in Section 35.1424 of this subchapter.

Section 35.1524 APPURTENANCES.

For purposes of Section 35.141 of this subchapter, "repair" includes, but is not limited to, rehabilitation and improvement of an existing road in order to correct the condition of that road. The repair of a segment of road also includes the associated necessary or useful repair, rehabilitation, replacement or improvement of appurtenances to the road segment, such as such storm drains, curbs, gutters, landscaping, lighting, and sidewalks that are embedded in or adjacent to the road segment.

Section 35.1532 FINANCING.

As permitted by law, the city may pledge proceeds of the dedicated parcel tax and the balance of the special fund in connection with the issuance of debt or a financing transaction such as a certificate of participation. However, if it does borrow against such proceeds and/or against the special fund, the proceeds of such debt or financing transaction shall be used exclusively to fund (i) the uses set forth in Section 25.1424 of this subchapter, (ii) incidental expenses associated with the debt or financing transaction, such as fees or discounts charged by an underwriter, bond counsel, municipal advisor, trustee, fiscal agent, rating agency, credit enhancer, credit insurer, printer, or other professional or entity that provides services to the city in connection with the issuance of such debt or financing transaction, and (iii) the funding of a reserve fund or similar fund backing the bond or other financing and pledged to its repayment. Proceeds of the dedicated parcel tax and balances of the special fund may be used to pay debt service on such a bond or other financing transaction as well as incidental costs to the administration of such bond or other financing transaction.

Section 35.1543 ANNUAL ACCOUNTABILITY REPORTS AND AUDITS.

The Director of Finance & Administrative Services shall, at least once per year, file an accountability report with the City Council stating (i) the amount of dedicated parcel tax revenues collected and expended by the city, (ii) the status of any project or work authorized to be funded by the proceeds of this tax, and (iii) the balance of the special fund established by this subchapter that carries over to the next reporting period. The Director shall annually arrange for an independent audit of the accounting for, and expenditure of, the proceeds of the dedicated parcel tax. Each accountability report filed pursuant to this section and any report of the independent audit required by this section shall be made available to the public without charge. Any accountability report may be produced as a part of the city's Annual Comprehensive Financial Report any and audit required by this section may be a part of the city's annual independent audit of the city's finances.

Section 35.1554 CITIZENS' OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE.

- A. The City Council shall establish a Citizens' Oversight Committee in connection with the dedicated parcel tax.
- B. The terms, composition, and specific duties of the Citizens' Oversight Committee shall be established by resolution of the City Council; however the Citizens' Oversight Committee shall be composed of five members. All members of the Citizens' Oversight Committee shall be appointed by the City Council. Two of the members must be residents of the city. The other three must be owners (or representatives of owners) of property subject to the dedicated parcel tax or owners (or representatives of owners) of businesses located on such parcels. The City Council shall consider the recommendation

- of the Santa Fe Springs Chamber of Commerce when appointing the three "owner" members, if such recommendations are provided to the City at or prior to the meeting of the City Council at which such appointments are made.
- C. The Citizens' Oversight Committee shall meet at least twice per year, and the chair of the Citizens' Oversight Committee may call additional meetings as the chair finds advisable.
- D. The Citizens' Oversight Committee shall review the annual report required by Section 35.153 of this subchapter and may make such recommendations to the City Council as it deems necessary or useful.
- E. Upon request of the Citizens' Oversight Committee, the Director of Finance and Administrative Services and the Director of Public Works shall make reasonable efforts to meet with the Citizens' Oversight Committee and to discuss prioritization of the work to be funded from proceeds of the dedicated special tax.
- F. The Citizens' Oversight Committee may, by a majority vote of its membership, choose to publish a report, in which event such report, if approved by a majority of the members, shall be published on the city's internet page.
- G. In the event the City Council, the Citizens' Oversight Committee, the city, any employee of the city, or any member of the City Council or the Citizens' Oversight Committee fails to take an action required by this section, any court of competent jurisdiction may order that the action be taken. However, such failure to act shall not (i) invalidate the levy of any tax or the city's authority to levy any tax, (ii) in any way affect the ongoing collection of any tax, (iii) invalidate any expenditure of funds made pursuant to this subchapter, or (iv) affect any contractual obligation assumed by the city.

Section 35.1565 ADMINISTRATION.

The tax administrator shall have charge of the enforcement and interpretation of this subchapter, and may issue such administrative rules and regulations, not inconsistent with this subchapter or any regulation adopted by resolution of the City Council, as the tax administrator finds useful or necessary.

Section 35.1576 PRESUMPTIONS.

A. The tax administrator may rebuttably rely upon parcel data maintained by the Los Angeles County Assessor's Office for the classification and square footage of a parcel that is subject to the dedicated parcel tax. Where parcel data obtained from the County uses a term other than "industrial", "commercial", "residential" or "vacant" to describe a parcel, the tax administrator may assign

- that parcel to the one of these uses that is most appropriate for the actual use of the parcel,
- B. Except with respect to parcels that are entirely exempt from the dedicated parcel tax, the tax administrator shall rebuttably presume that the entire square footage of the surface of the parcel is subject to taxation.

Section 35.1587 ADJUSTMENT OF CLASSIFICATION AND SQUARE FOOTAGE.

- A. The owner of a parcel of property in the city may apply to the tax administrator for a recalculation of the tax upon that parcel for a tax year.
- B. Such application may be submitted before the beginning of the tax year or at any time during the tax year.
- C. The tax administrator may create a form for such application, in which case an application shall only be considered if it is submitted on such form.
- D. Any application must (i) state the number of square feet that the owner believes should be subject to the dedicated parcel tax, (ii) state which portion of those square feet should be taxable at which tax rate, (iii) explain how this square footage and classification is consistent with the provisions of this subchapter and applicable law, and (iv) provide evidence regarding the square footage, improvement and use of the parcel.
- E. In making a determination on the application, the tax administrator shall consider the contents of the application and any other information the tax administrator finds relevant.
- F. The tax administrator shall, upon written request of the property owner, provide a written determination to the property owner within 45 days of the receipt of such written request. If the administrator does not then timely provide a written determination, the application shall be deemed denied.
- G. The written determination or denial of an application may be appealed in writing to the City Manager within 30 days of the issuance of the determination or of the date on which the application is deemed denied. The City Manager shall, in considering the appeal, consider all information filed with the tax administrator as part of the application, all information provided in the written appeal, and such other information the City Manager finds relevant. If the City Manager does not provide a written response to the appeal, the appeal shall be deemed denied. The decision of the City Manager is final.
- H. If, after review of the application by the tax administrator or a review of an appeal by the City Manager, an adjustment of the taxable square footage or

classification of such square footage is deemed to be warranted, the tax administrator shall recalculate the tax due and then shall either (i) submit such adjusted tax to the county for collection as part of the usual submission of taxes to the county, (ii) request that the appropriate county official reduce the amount of the tax that has been entered onto the tax roll, or (iii) refund the amount paid by the taxpayer to the county in excess of the adjusted tax.

Section 35.1598 SAVINGS CLAUSE.

No section, clause, part, or provision of this subchapter shall be construed as requiring the payment of any tax that would be in violation of the Constitution or laws of the United States or of the Constitution or laws of the State of California.

Section 35.16059 AMENDMENT OF ORDINANCE.

The City Council may, without a vote of the people, amend this subchapter. However, the City Council may not, without a vote of the people, increase the rate of the dedicated parcel tax or extend the duration of the dedicated parcel tax beyond the 2049-50 tax year.

SECTION 3. This Ordinance shall become effective upon adoption by the People.

<u>SECTION 4</u>. If any word, phrase, sentence, part, section, subsection, or other portion of this Ordinance, or any application thereof to any person or circumstance is declared void, unconstitutional, or invalid for any reason, then such word, phrase, sentence, part, section, subsection, or other portion, or the prescribed application thereof, shall be severable, and the remaining provisions of this title, and all applications thereof, not having been declared void, unconstitutional or invalid, shall remain in full force and effect. The People hereby declares that they would have passed this Ordinance, and each section, subsection, sentence, clause, and phrase thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, sentences, clauses, or phrases had been declared invalid or unconstitutional.

RECOMMENDATION(S):

It is recommended that the City Council:

- 1) Direct staff to engage with EnFuegoU to explore partnership possibilities for Little Lake Park and the Santa Fe Springs Athletic Fields; and
- 2) Take such additional, related action that may be desirable

FISCAL IMPACT

Engaging with EnFuegoU to explore partnership possibilities has no immediate fiscal impact. Any future agreements or projects resulting from these discussions will be presented to the City Council with detailed fiscal implications for approval.

BACKGROUND

The Santa Fe Springs Athletic Fields and Little Lake Park are integral parts of our community's recreational infrastructure. Over the years, these facilities have supported various community events, youth sports programs, and other recreational activities. To further enhance the offerings and upkeep of these facilities, the City has received a proposal from EnFuegoU, an organization dedicated to youth sports development and community engagement.

ANALYSIS

EnFuegoU has proposed several enhancements for the Santa Fe Springs Athletic Fields and Little Lake Park, which include renovation of existing fields, construction of a new professional-level playing field, and the installation of a new hitting facility. They also seek a long-term operating agreement to manage the fields and maintain them to high standards.

ENVIRONMENTAL

By directing staff to engage with EnFuegoU, we can thoroughly explore the details of the proposed partnership, address any concerns, and begin to negotiate terms that are beneficial to the city and its residents. This proactive approach will ensure that any future developments align with our community's needs and standards.

SUMMARY/NEXT STEPS

Upon approval from the City Council, the Parks & Recreation Department will initiate discussions with EnFuegoU to explore the feasibility of the proposed partnership. This will include detailed negotiations on terms, scope of work, and fiscal responsibilities. The findings and any proposed agreements will be brought back to the City Council for review and approval.

The Santa Fe Springs Public Financing Authority (PFA) is a City entity that has periodically issued debt for the benefit of the Santa Fe Springs community. The following is a brief status report on the debt instruments currently outstanding that were issued through the PFA.

Bond Repayment

The former Community Development Commission (CDC) issued a number of tax allocation bonds before it was dissolved by State law effective February 1, 2012 which are administered by the City acting as Successor Agency under the oversight of the appointed Oversight Board. The Successor Agency no longer receives tax increment.

Instead, distributions from the Redevelopment Property Tax Trust Fund (RPTTF) are received based on approved obligations. It is anticipated that sufficient allocations from the RPTTF will continue to be made to the Successor Agency to meet ongoing debt service obligations.

Unspent Bond Proceeds

Under an approved Bond Expenditure Agreement, unspent bond proceeds of the former CDC in the amount of approximately \$19 million were transferred to the City in July 2014. The funds are to be spent in accordance with the original bond documents. The unspent proceeds continue to be a source of funding within the City's capital improvement program (CIP).

2016 Bond Refunding

In July 2016, the Successor Agency issued its 2016 Tax Allocation Refunding Bonds, which paid off several bond issuances of the former CDC. The bonds were originally issued through the Public Financing Authority and included the 2001 Series A, 2002 Series A, 2003 Series A, the current interest portion of the 2006 Series A, and 2006 Series B bond issuances.

2017 Bond Refunding

In December 2017, the Successor Agency issued its 2017 Tax Allocation Refunding Bonds, which paid off the 2007 Tax Allocation Bonds of the former CDC. The 2007 Bonds were originally issued through the Public Financing Authority.

The Successor Agency will continue to request sufficient distributions from the RPTTF to make required bond payments through maturity on September 1, 2028.

The funds were restricted for use on water system improvements. In August 2013 the Water Utility Authority Board appropriated the proceeds for the Equipping Water Well No. 12 Project and all proceeds were since used on this project.

In January 2018 the Water Utility Authority issued the 2018 Water Revenue Bonds in the amount of \$1,800,000. The bonds refunded the existing 2005 Water Revenue Bonds (issued through the Public Financing Authority). No additional funds were raised through the issuance of the 2018 Water Revenue Bonds.

The WUA was formed in June of 2009. Water revenue bonds issued prior to this date were issued through the City of Santa Fe Springs Public Financing Authority.

FISCAL IMPACT

The adopted Fiscal Year 2024-25 Budget included \$155,000 for valve maintenance services. No additional appropriation is recommended at this time.

BACKGROUND

The Santa Fe Springs Water Utility Authority's public water system covers an area of approximately eight (8) square miles within its boundaries. The water conveyance system consists of 108 miles of pipeline ranging in size from 4 inches to 16 inches in diameter and includes 1,150 fire hydrants. A critical component of this water system is its 3,152 inline water valves.

Water valve functionality is paramount to a healthy water system, as they are integral in

controlling the flow of water within the underground pipe system. This control allows for the necessary work to take place when water needs to be shut off or redirected as in a mainline break, or in the repair and replacement of fire hydrants. In order to keep water valves in optimal usable condition, it is important to exercise them periodically.

On August 31, 2022, the Division of Drinking Water of the State Water Resources Control Board conducted a routine inspection of the drinking water system as part of a Sanitary Survey. This Sanitary Survey included a review of the City's water quality routine monitoring and reporting, record-keeping verification, water system management and operations, and operator compliance with the State requirements. The following deficiency was noted:

The City must improve the implementation of its valve maintenance program. The City's Valve Exercise Program dated June 2022 must be revised to include the inventory of the valves in the distribution system and the schedules to exercise these valves. The revised written valve exercises and maintenance program must be submitted to the Division by December 31, 2022. The City must plan to exercise all valves within the next 3 years.

ANALYSIS

The Santa Fe Springs Water Utility Authority has historically utilized field staff to perform water valve assessment and exercising activities when the workload allows. However, due to the current workload, increasing state requirements, and current personnel vacancies, staff will not be able to meet the requirements by the due date without assistance from an outside entity. After careful evaluation, staff determined that iWater, Inc. best met the experience and established criteria for providing water valve assessment services.

ENVIRONMENTAL

Not applicable.

DISCUSSION

On October 12, 2023, the City of Monterey Park entered into an agreement with iWater, Inc. to provide water valve assessment maintenance and other general services, as necessary, commencing on November 1, 2023 to October 31, 2024 (Attachment A). This agreement was established through a competitive bidding process.

iWater, Inc. has agreed to enter into an agreement with the City of Santa Fe Springs to provide a water valve assessment program at the same rate as their agreement with Monterey Park. The proposed agreement (Attachment B) with iWater, Inc. complies with Santa Fe Springs Code Section 34.18(B) with respect to cooperative and piggyback

MAINTENANCE AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CITY OF MONTEREY PARK AND IWATER, INC.

[CANNOT BE USED FOR CONSTRUCTION, RECONSTRUCTION, ERECTION, ALTERATION, RENOVATION, IMPROVEMENT, DEMOLITION, REPAIR WORK, PAINTING OR MAJOR REPAINTING]

THIS MAINTENANCE AGREEMENT ("Agreement") is made and entered into this 12th day of October, 2023 by and between the CITY OF MONTEREY PARK, a general law city and municipal corporation ("CITY") and IWATER, INC., a California Corporation ("CONTRACTOR").

The Parties agree as follows:

1. CONSIDERATION.

- A. As partial consideration, CONTRACTOR agrees to perform the work listed in Exhibit "A:"
- B. As additional consideration, CONTRACTOR and CITY agree to abide by the terms and conditions contained in this Agreement;
- C. As additional consideration, CITY agrees to pay CONTRACTOR for CONTRACTOR's services not to exceed a total of \$59,007 for the work. CITY will pay for work on the basis of the hourly rates and cost reimbursement rates as specified in the attached Exhibit "A," which is incorporated by reference.
- 2. **TERM**. The term of this Agreement will be from November 1, 2023 to October 31, 2024. The Agreement may be renewed upon mutual consent of the parties by amending this Agreement.

3. SCOPE OF SERVICES.

- A. This Agreement may be used for "maintenance services" which include the following:
 - i. Routine, recurring, and usual work for the preservation or protection of any publicly owned or publicly operated facility for its intended purposes.

- ii. Minor repainting.
- iii. Resurfacing of streets and highways at less than one inch.
- iv. Landscape maintenance.
- v. Work performed to keep, operate, and maintain publicly owned water, power, or waste disposal systems and electrical transmission lines of 230,000 volts and higher.
- vi. Carpentry, electrical, plumbing, glazing, and other craftwork;
- B. CONTRACTOR will perform the maintenance services listed in the attached Exhibit "A," which is incorporated by reference. The provisions contained in this Agreement supersede any conflicting provisions in Exhibit "A."
- C. Maintenance services required by CITY will be provided on an as-needed basis with CITY determining and advising CONTRACTOR as to when specific services are required to be performed or completed by CONTRACTOR. Requests must be memorialized using a notice to proceed that may be in the form of a purchase order. The provisions contained in this Agreement supersede any conflicting provisions in a purchase order issued for maintenance services.
- D. CONTRACTOR will, in a workmanlike manner, furnish all of the labor, technical, administrative, professional and other personnel, all supplies and materials, equipment, printing, vehicles, transportation, office space and facilities, and all tests, testing and analyses, calculation, and all other means whatsoever, except as herein otherwise expressly specified to be furnished by CITY, necessary or proper to perform and complete the work and provide the professional services required of CONTRACTOR by this Agreement.

4. PREVAILING WAGES.

A. Pursuant to Labor Code § 1720, and as specified in 8 California Code of Regulations § 16000, CONTRACTOR must pay its workers prevailing wages. It is CONTRACTOR's responsibility to interpret and implement any prevailing wage requirements and CONTRACTOR agrees to pay any penalty or civil damages resulting from a violation of the prevailing wage laws.

- B. In accordance with Labor Code § 1773.2, copies of the prevailing rate of per diem wages are available upon request from CITY's Engineering Division or the website for State of California Prevailing wage determination at http://www.dir.ca.gov/DLSR/PWD. CONTRACTOR must post a copy of the prevailing rate of per diem wages at the job site.
- C. CITY directs CONTRACTOR's attention to Labor Code §§ 1777.5, 1777.6 and 3098 concerning the employment of apprentices by CONTRACTOR or any subcontractor.
- D. Labor Code § 1777.5 requires CONTRACTOR or subcontractor employing tradesmen in any apprenticeship occupation to apply to the joint apprenticeship committee nearest the site of the public works project and which administers the apprenticeship program in that trade for a certificate of approval. The certificate must also fix the ratio of apprentices to journeymen that will be used in the performance of the contract. The ratio of apprentices to journeymen in such cases will not be less than one to five except:
 - i. When employment in the area of coverage by the joint apprenticeship committee has exceeded an average of 15 percent in the 90 days before the request for certificate, or
 - ii. When the number of apprentices in training in the area exceeds a ratio of one to five, or
 - iii. When the trade can show that it is replacing at least 1/30 of its membership through apprenticeship training on an annual basis state-wide or locally, or
 - iv. When CONTRACTOR provides evidence that CONTRACTOR employs registered apprentices on all of his contracts on an annual average of not less than one apprentice to eight journeymen.
 - v. CONTRACTOR is required to make contributions to funds established for the administration of apprenticeship programs if CONTRACTOR employs registered apprentices or journeymen in any apprenticeable trade on such contracts and if other contractors on the public works site are making such contributions.
 - vi. CONTRACTOR and any subcontractor must comply with Labor Code §§ 1777.5 and 1777.6 in the employment of apprentices.

- vii. Information relative to apprenticeship standards, wage schedules and other requirements may be obtained from the Director of Industrial Relations, ex-officio the Administrator of Apprenticeship, San Francisco, California, or from the Division of Apprenticeship Standards and its branch offices.
- E. CONTRACTOR and its subcontractors must keep an accurate certified payroll records showing the name, occupation, and the actual per diem wages paid to each worker employed in connection with this Agreement. The record will be kept open at all reasonable hours to the inspection of the body awarding the contract and to the Division of Labor Law Enforcement. If requested by CITY, CONTRACTOR must provide copies of the records at its cost.

5. PAYMENTS.

- A. For CITY to pay CONTRACTOR as specified by this Agreement, CONTRACTOR must submit a detailed invoice to CITY.
- B. CITY's city manager may make payments up to \$60,000 for special items of work not included in the project scope of work and services. Payments for special work will only be made after CITY issues a written notice to proceed for the specific special tasks. A written scope of work, an agreed upon additional fee, a schedule for starting and completing the special tasks, and an agreed upon extension of the time for performance, if needed to complete the special work, will be required before CITY issues a notice to proceed for special work. All special work will be subject to all other terms and provisions of this Agreement.

FAMILIARITY WITH WORK.

- A. By executing this Agreement, CONTRACTOR represents that CONTRACTOR has
 - i. Thoroughly investigated and considered the scope of services to be performed;
 - ii. Carefully considered how the services should be performed; and
 - iii. Understands the facilities, difficulties, and restrictions attending performance of the services under this Agreement.

B. If services involve work upon any site, CONTRACTOR warrants that CONTRACTOR has or will investigate the site and is or will be fully acquainted with the conditions there existing, before commencing the services hereunder. Should CONTRACTOR discover any latent or unknown conditions that may materially affect the performance of the services, CONTRACTOR will immediately inform CITY of such fact and will not proceed except at CONTRACTOR's own risk until written instructions are received from CITY.

7. INSURANCE.

A. Before commencing performance under this Agreement, and at all other times this Agreement is effective, CONTRACTOR will procure and maintain the following types of insurance with coverage limits complying, at a minimum, with the limits set forth below:

Type of Insurance	Limits (combined single)
Commercial general liability:	\$2M
Business automobile liability	\$1M
Workers compensation	Statutory requirement.

- B. Commercial general liability insurance will meet or exceed the requirements of ISO-CGL Form No. CG 00 01 11 85 or 88. The amount of insurance set forth above will be a combined single limit per occurrence for bodily injury, personal injury, and property damage for the policy coverage. Liability policies will be endorsed to name City, its officials, and employees as "additional insureds" under said insurance coverage and to state that such insurance will be deemed "primary" such that any other insurance that may be carried by City will be excess thereto. Such insurance will be on an "occurrence," not a "claims made," basis and will not be cancelable or subject to reduction except upon thirty (30) days prior written notice to City.
- C. Automobile coverage will be written on ISO Business Auto Coverage Form CA 00 01 06 92, including symbol 1 (Any Auto).
- D. CONTRACTOR will furnish to City duly authenticated Certificates of Insurance evidencing maintenance of the insurance required under this Agreement, endorsements as required herein, and such other evidence of insurance or copies of policies as may be reasonably required by City from time to time. Insurance must be placed with insurers with a current A.M.

Best Company Rating equivalent to at least a Rating of "A:VII." Certificate(s) must reflect that the insurer will provide thirty (30) day notice of any cancellation of coverage. CONTRACTOR will require its insurer to modify such certificates to delete any exculpatory wording stating that failure of the insurer to mail written notice of cancellation imposes no obligation, and to delete the word "endeavor" with regard to any notice provisions.

- E. Should CONTRACTOR, for any reason, fail to obtain and maintain the insurance required by this Agreement, City may obtain such coverage at CONTRACTOR's expense and deduct the cost of such insurance from payments due to CONTRACTOR under this Agreement or terminate.
- 8. **TIME FOR PERFORMANCE**. CONTRACTOR will not perform any work under this Agreement until:
 - A. CONTRACTOR furnishes proof of insurance as required under Section 7 of this Agreement; and
 - B. CITY gives CONTRACTOR a written notice to proceed.
 - C. Should CONTRACTOR begin work in advance of receiving written authorization to proceed, any such professional services are at CONTRACTOR's own risk.

9. **TERMINATION**.

- A. Except as otherwise provided, CITY may terminate this Agreement at any time with or without cause. Notice of termination will be in writing.
- B. CONTRACTOR may terminate this Agreement upon providing written notice to CITY at least thirty (30) days before the effective termination date.
- C. Should the Agreement be terminated pursuant to this Section, CITY may procure on its own terms services similar to those terminated.
- D. By executing this document, CONTRACTOR waives any and all claims for damages that might otherwise arise from CITY's termination under this Section.

10. INDEMNIFICATION.

- A. CONTRACTOR indemnifies and holds CITY harmless from and against any claim, action, damages, costs (including, without limitation, attorney's fees), injuries, or liability, arising out of this Agreement, or its performance. Should CITY be named in any suit, or should any claim be brought against it by suit or otherwise, whether the same be groundless or not, arising out of this Agreement, or its performance, CONTRACTOR will defend CITY (at CITY's request and with counsel satisfactory to CITY) and will indemnify CITY for any judgment rendered against it or any sums paid out in settlement or otherwise.
- B. For purposes of this section "CITY" includes CITY's officers, officials, employees, agents, representatives, and certified volunteers.
- C. It is expressly understood and agreed that the foregoing provisions will survive termination of this Agreement.

11. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR. CITY and CONTRACTOR agree that CONTRACTOR will act as an independent contractor and will have control of all work and the manner in which is it performed. CONTRACTOR will be free to contract for similar service to be performed for other employers while under contract with CITY. CONTRACTOR is not an agent or employee of CITY and is not entitled to participate in any pension plan, insurance, bonus or similar benefits CITY provides for its employees. Any provision in this Agreement that may appear to give CITY the right to direct CONTRACTOR as to the details of doing the work or to exercise a measure of control over the work means that CONTRACTOR will follow the direction of the CITY as to end results of the work only.

12. NOTICES.

A. All notices given or required to be given pursuant to this Agreement will be in writing and may be given by personal delivery or by mail. Such noticing does not include day-to-day communications between CITY's and CONTRACTOR's project managers. Notice sent by mail will be addressed as follows:

- B. When addressed in accordance with this paragraph, notices will be deemed given upon deposit in the United States mail, postage prepaid. In all other instances, notices will be deemed given at the time of actual delivery.
- C. Changes may be made in the names or addresses of persons to whom notices are to be given by giving notice in the manner prescribed in this paragraph.
- 13. **TAXPAYER IDENTIFICATION NUMBER**. CONTRACTOR will provide CITY with a Taxpayer Identification Number.
- 14. **WAIVER**. A waiver by CITY of any breach of any term, covenant, or condition contained in this Agreement will not be deemed to be a waiver of any subsequent breach of the same or any other term, covenant, or condition contained in this Agreement, whether of the same or different character.
- 15. **CONSTRUCTION.** The language of each part of this Agreement will be construed simply and according to its fair meaning, and this Agreement will never be construed either for or against either party.
- 16. **SEVERABLE.** If any portion of this Agreement is declared by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unenforceable, then such portion will be deemed modified to the extent necessary in the opinion of the court to render such portion enforceable and, as so modified, such portion and the balance of this Agreement will continue in full force and effect.
- 17. **CAPTIONS.** The captions of the paragraphs of this Agreement are for convenience of reference only and will not affect the interpretation of this Agreement.
- 18. **WAIVER.** Waiver of any provision of this Agreement will not be deemed to constitute a waiver of any other provision, nor will such waiver constitute a continuing waiver.
- 19. **INTERPRETATION**. This Agreement was drafted in, and will be construed in accordance with the laws of the State of California, and exclusive venue for any action involving this agreement will be in Los Angeles County.

- 20. **AUTHORITY/MODIFICATION.** This Agreement may be subject to and conditioned upon approval and ratification by the Monterey Park City Council. This Agreement is not binding upon CITY until executed by the City Manager. The Parties represent and warrant that all necessary action has been taken by the Parties to authorize the undersigned to execute this Agreement and to engage in the actions described herein. This Agreement may be modified by written agreement. CITY's city manager may execute any such amendment on behalf of CITY.
- 21. ACCEPTANCE OF ELECTRONIC SIGNATURES. This Agreement may be executed with electronic signatures in accordance with Government Code § 16.5. Such electronic signatures will be treated in all respects as having the same effect as an original signature.
- 22. **EFFECT OF CONFLICT**. In the event of any conflict, inconsistency, or incongruity between any provision of this Agreement, its attachments, the purchase order, or notice to proceed, the provisions of this Agreement will govern and control.
- 23. **CAPTIONS.** The captions of the paragraphs of this Agreement are for convenience of reference only and will not affect the interpretation of this Agreement.
- 24. **FORCE MAJEURE**. Should performance of this Agreement be prevented due to fire, flood, explosion, war, terrorist act, embargo, government action, civil or military authority, the natural elements, or other similar causes beyond the Parties' control, then the Agreement will immediately terminate without obligation of either party to the other.
- 25. **ENTIRE AGREEMENT.** This Agreement and its one attachment constitutes the sole agreement between CONTRACTOR and CITY respecting water valve exercising services. To the extent that there are additional terms and conditions contained in Exhibit "A" that are not in conflict with this Agreement, those terms are incorporated as if fully set forth above. There are no other understandings, terms or other agreements expressed or implied, oral or written.

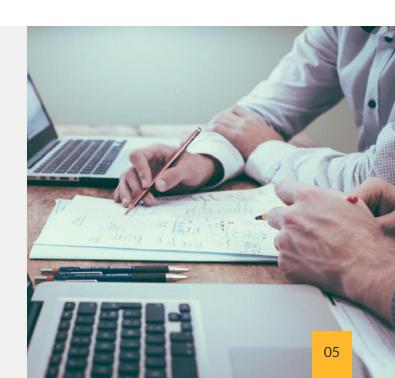

PREVIOUS PROJECTS



San Juan Capistrano, CA

The City of San Juan Capistrano contracted iWater to perform a multi-year Valve and Hydrant Assessment. This project consisted of exercising all residential and arterial valves (4,086) including capturing GPS Coordinates (Sub-Meter Accuracy). Valve lids were removed and crews vacuum cleaned the can. iWater field crews operated valves completely from open to closed position, two times, and recorded the number of turns and any characteristics like hard to turn, packing leak, inoperable, unable to locate or needing repair.

iWater Field Crews performed flushing on 1,698 Hydrants within the water system based on a pre-planned route. Starting at or near a source of supply and working outward the operator would close the hydrant isolation valve and verify closure by opening the 4" port on a hydrant. After confirmation, closed the 4" port and opened the isolation valve slowly. Lastly the 4" hydrant port was opened and flushed to remove water in the lateral. Flushed water was diffused through a dechlorinator and coconut baffles used to keep water in the gutter. Chlorine Residuals were also captured for Water Quality purposes.



Rowland Water District, CA

Rowland Water District contracted iWater to perform a multi-year Valve Assessment. This included the exercising of 3,550 valves and GPS'ing valves to Sub-Foot Accuracy. All data including condition, depth to nut, torque and turns were provided back to the District, so that the GIS could be updated based on iWater Field Crews findings.



La Habra, CA

Provided GPS Data Collection and GIS updates for 30,000+ Water and Sewer Assets. As part of this project iWater Field Crews exercised 3,800 valves. All updates are now available in their *infraMAP*® Cloud Maintenance Management System.

PROJECT APPROACH

Valve Exercising

iWater will establish a valve maintenance service program providing a complete turnkey solution for valve maintenance, documentation of valve operation, condition and whether or not a valve lid needs to be raised. All data will be recorded directly into the City of Monterey Park's *infraMAP®* Cloud Maintenance Management Software which generates real time data including operation information and torque data.

iWater field crews are equipped with state-ofthe-art technology. Trucks are fully outfitted with advanced vacuum systems to clear any obstructions that may be present in the valve can. iWater valve exercising follows AWWA procedures with the lowest amount of torque applied and the maximum of 400 ft/lbs of torque will be applied. Additional torque and valves greater than 14" will be attempted after notification is made to the City of Monterey Park (project manager or water superintendent) and a schedule will be defined for the operation. Each isolation valve shall be exercised until complete closure is achieved or will be noted if a problem exists. If a valve cannot be turned by hand, an on-board EH Wachs ERV-750 hydraulic valve machine will be utilized to safely operate the valve.

iWater trucks have arrow boards, warning lights and provide proper delineation/signed for each project. Proper traffic delineation as outlined in the WATCH handbook will be followed at all times.

Valve Lid Painting

Distribution Valve lids will be painted Blue and Hydrant Valves Half Blue/Half Yellow after each valve has been successfully exercised. White paint will be used for Inoperable Valves. The City of Monterey Park shall supply lids and cans as needed for repairs while performing valve maintenance on this project.

GPS Data Collection

All valve features not currently in the GIS will be GPS'd at Sub-Foot Accuracy or Better. At least six satellites are required to be considered accurate with real-time differential correction.

GPS Accuracy will also be recorded into the database so that team members can QA/QC the accuracy of each GPS Point.

PDOP (Position Dilution of Precision) shall be less than 5 for this project with an Elevation Mask of 15 degrees above the horizon.



RESULT

The City of Monterey Park will receive a finished product of properly operating Water Distribution System Valves. All data collected during the project will be available via *infraMAP®* Cloud. Tasks will also be created for valves that may need repair, replacement and inoperable.

CITY OF SANTA FE SPRINGS WATER UTILITY AUTHORITY PROFESSIONAL SERVICES AGREEMENT WITH IWATER, INC.

This Professional Services Agreement ("Agreement") is made and effective as of July 16, 2024 (the "Effective Date"), by and between the City of Santa Fe Springs Water Utility Authority, a California municipal corporation, ("City") and iWater, Inc., a California corporation ("Contractor"). In consideration of the mutual covenants and conditions set forth herein, the parties agree as follows:

1. TERM

This Agreement shall commence on the Effective Date and shall remain and continue in effect until the services described herein are completed, unless sooner terminated pursuant to the provisions of this Agreement.

2. SERVICES

Contractor shall perform the services described and set forth in Exhibit A attached hereto and incorporated herein as though set forth in full ("Services"). Contractor shall complete the Services according to any schedule of performance set forth in Exhibit A. To the extent that Exhibit A contains provisions inconsistent with this Agreement, the provisions of this Agreement shall govern.

3. PERFORMANCE

Contractor shall at all times faithfully, competently and to the best of Contractor's ability, experience, and talent, perform all tasks described herein. Contractor shall employ, at a minimum, generally accepted standards and practices utilized by persons engaged in providing similar services as are required of Contractor under this Agreement.

4. CITY MANAGEMENT

The Water Utility Authority Executive Director shall represent the City in all matters pertaining to the administration of this Agreement, including review and approval of all products submitted by Contractor.

5. PAYMENT

A. City agrees to pay Contractor based upon work completed and invoiced for the prior month and shall be paid within 30 days of receipt, in accordance with the payment rates and terms and the schedule of payment as set forth in Exhibit A. This amount shall not exceed One Hundred Fifty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$155,000.00) for the total term of the Agreement unless additional payment is approved as provided in this Agreement.

- B. Contractor shall not be compensated for any services rendered in connection with its performance of this Agreement which are in addition to those set forth herein, unless such additional services are authorized in advance and in writing by the Executive Director or designee. Contractor shall be compensated for any additional services in the amounts and in the manner as agreed to in writing by the City and Contractor at the time the City's written authorization is given to Contractor for the performance of said services.
- C. Contractor will submit invoices monthly for actual Services performed. Contractor agrees to participate in the City's Electronic Funds Transfer program and to receive electronic payments for the Services. Payment shall be made within thirty (30) days of receipt of each invoice as to all non-disputed fees. If the City disputes any of Contractor's Services or fees, it shall give written notice to Contractor within thirty (30) days of receipt of an invoice of any disputed fees set forth on the invoice. Any final payment under this Agreement shall be made within forty-five (45) days of receipt of an invoice therefor.

6. TERMINATION OF AGREEMENT WITHOUT CAUSE

- A. The City may at any time, for any reason, without cause, suspend or terminate this Agreement, or any portion hereof, by serving upon Contractor at least ten (10) days' prior written notice. Upon receipt of said notice, Contractor shall immediately cease all Services under this Agreement, unless the notice provides otherwise. If the City suspends or terminates a portion of this Agreement, such suspension or termination shall not make void or invalidate the remainder of this Agreement.
- B. In the event this Agreement is terminated pursuant to this section, the City shall pay to Contractor the actual value of the Services performed up to the time of termination, unless the City disputes any of the Services performed or fees. Upon termination of the Agreement pursuant to this section, Contractor will submit an invoice to the City pursuant to Section 5.

7. DEFAULT OF CONTRACTOR

If the City determines that Contractor is in default in the performance of any of the terms or conditions of this Agreement, the City shall serve Contractor a written notice of the default. Contractor shall have seven (7) days after service of said notice to cure the default. In the event that Contractor fails to cure the default within such period of time or fails to present the City with a written plan for the diligent cure of default if such default cannot be cured within seven days, the City shall have the right, notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, to terminate this Agreement without further notice and without prejudice to any other remedy to which it may be entitled at law, in equity or under this Agreement. Contractor shall be responsible for costs incurred by the City due to Contractor's failure to comply with this section. The City shall have the right to offset against the amount of any fees due to Contractor any costs incurred by the City as a result of Contractor's default.

8. OWNERSHIP OF DOCUMENTS

- A. Contractor shall maintain complete and accurate records with respect to tasks, costs, expenses, receipts, and other such information required by the City that relate to the performance of Services under this Agreement. Contractor shall maintain adequate records of Services provided in sufficient detail to permit an evaluation of Services. All such records shall be maintained in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles and shall be clearly identified and readily accessible. Contractor shall provide free access to the representatives of the City or its designees at reasonable times to such books and records; shall give the City the right to examine and audit said books and records; shall permit the City to make transcripts or copies therefrom as necessary; and shall allow inspection of all Services, data, documents, proceedings, and activities related to this Agreement. Such records, together with supporting documents, shall be maintained for a period of three (3) years after receipt of final payment.
- B. Upon completion of, or in the event of termination or suspension of this Agreement, all original documents, designs, drawings, maps, models, computer files, surveys, notes, and other documents prepared in the course of providing the Services shall become the sole property of the City and may be used, reused, or otherwise disposed of by the City without the permission of Contractor. With respect to computer files, Contractor shall make available to the City, at the Contractor's office and upon reasonable written request by the City, the necessary computer software and hardware for purposes of accessing, compiling, transferring, copying and/or printing computer files. Contractor hereby grants to the City all right, title, and interest, including any copyright, in and to the documents, designs, drawings, maps, models, computer files, surveys, notes, and other documents prepared by Contractor in the course of providing the Services under this Agreement.

9. <u>INDEMNIFICATION AND DEFENSE</u>

A. Indemnification. To the fullest extent permitted by law, Contractor shall indemnify and hold harmless the City and any and all of its officials, employees, agents, and/or volunteers ("Indemnified Parties"), from and against any and all claims, demands, actions, suits, losses, liabilities, damages, costs, and expenses, including attorney's fees and costs, arising out of or in any way connected with the performance of Contractor, its officers, agents, employees, and/or subcontractors (or any agency or individual that Contractor shall bear the legal liability thereof) under this Agreement, including all acts or omissions, willful misconduct, or negligent conduct, whether active or passive, on the part of Contractor, its officers, agents, employees, and/or subcontractors. Contractor's duty to indemnify and hold harmless the Indemnified Parties shall not extend to the sole negligence or willful misconduct of the Indemnified Parties.

- B. Duty to Defend. In the event the Indemnified Parties, individually or collectively, are made a party to any claim, action, lawsuit, or other adversarial proceeding arising or alleged to arise out of or is in any way connected with the performance of Contractor's services under this Agreement, and upon demand by the City, Contractor shall immediately defend the Indemnified Parties at Contractor's cost or at the City's option to reimburse the City for its costs of defense, including reasonable attorney's fees and costs incurred in the defense of such matters, regardless of whether or not Contractor, its officers, agents, employees, and/or subcontractors are specifically named or otherwise asserted to be liable, and regardless of whether or not there is any evidence of finding of fault or wrongdoing by Contractor, its officers, agents, employees and/or subcontractors. Payment by the City is not a condition precedent to enforcement of this provision.
- C. In the event of any dispute between Contractor and the City as to whether liability arises from the sole negligence or willful misconduct of the City or its officials, employees, agents, and/or volunteers, Contractor will be obligated to pay for the City's defense until such time as a final judgment has been entered adjudicating the Indemnified Parties as solely negligent or to have acted with willful misconduct. Contractor will not be entitled in the absence of such a determination to any reimbursement of defense costs, including but not limited to attorney's fees, expert fees, and costs of litigation.

10. INSURANCE

Contractor shall maintain prior to the beginning of and for the duration of this Agreement insurance coverage as specified in Exhibit B attached hereto and made a part of this Agreement.

11. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR

- A. Contractor is and shall at all times remain as to the City a wholly independent Contractor and/or independent contractor. The personnel performing the services under this Agreement on behalf of Contractor shall at all times be under Contractor's exclusive direction and control. Neither the City nor any of its officers, employees, or agents shall have control over the conduct of Contractor or any of Contractor's officers, employees, or agents, except as set forth in this Agreement. Contractor shall not at any time or in any manner represent that Contractor or any of Contractor's officers, employees, or agents are in any manner officers, employees, or agents of the City. Contractor shall not incur or have the power to incur any debt, obligation, or liability whatever against the City, or bind the City in any manner.
- B. No employee benefits shall be available to Contractor in connection with the performance of this Agreement. Except for the fees paid to Contractor as provided in the Agreement, the City shall not pay salaries, wages, or other compensation to Contractor for performing services hereunder for the City. The City shall not be liable for compensation or indemnification to Contractor for injury or sickness

arising out of performing services hereunder. Contractor shall secure, at its sole expense, and be responsible for any and all payment of Income Tax, Social Disability Insurance Compensation, Unemployment Security. State Compensation, and other payroll deductions for Contractor and its officers, agents, and employees, and all business licenses, if any are required, in connection with the services to be performed hereunder. Contractor shall indemnify and hold the City harmless from any and all taxes, assessments, penalties, and interest asserted against the City by reason of the independent contractor relationship created by this Agreement. Contractor further agrees to indemnify and hold the City harmless from any failure of Contractor to comply with the applicable worker's compensation laws. The City shall have the right to offset against the amount of any fees due to Contractor under this Agreement as a result of Contractor's failure to promptly pay to the City any reimbursement or indemnification arising under this paragraph.

- C. In the event that Contractor or any employee, agent, or subcontractor of Contractor providing Services under this Agreement claims or is determined by a court of competent jurisdiction or the California Public Employees Retirement System (CalPERS) to be eligible for enrollment in CalPERS as an employee of the City, Contractor shall indemnify, defend, and hold harmless the City for the payment of any employee and/or employer contributions for CalPERS benefits on behalf of Contractor or its employees, agents, or subcontractors, as well as for the payment of any penalties and interest on such contributions, which would otherwise be the responsibility of the City.
- D. Notwithstanding any other agency, state or federal policy, rule, regulation, law or ordinance to the contrary, Contractor and any of its employees, agents, and subcontractors providing service under this Agreement shall not qualify for or become entitled to, and hereby agree to waive any claims to, any compensation, benefit, or any incident of employment by the City, including but not limited to eligibility to enroll in CalPERS as an employee of the City and entitlement to any contribution to be paid by City for employer contribution and/or employee contributions for CalPERS benefits.

12. <u>LEGAL RESPONSIBILITIES</u>

- A. Contractor shall keep itself informed of State and Federal laws and regulations which in any manner affect those employed by it or in any way affect the performance of Services pursuant to this Agreement. Contractor shall at all times observe and comply with all such laws and regulations. The City and its officials, officers, employees, and agents, shall not be liable at law or in equity occasioned by failure of Contractor to comply with this Section.
- B. This Project is a public work as defined in California Labor Code Section 1720. Contractor and any subcontractors are required to pay all workers employed in the execution of the Services not less than the general prevailing wage rates of per diem wages and overtime and holiday wages determined by the Director of the

Department of Industrial Relations ("DIR") under Section 1720 et seq. of the California Labor Code. The Director's determination of prevailing rates are on file with the City and are available online at www.dir.ca.gov/dlsr/DPreWageDetermination.htm and are referred to and made a part hereof as though fully set forth herein.

- C. Contractor is aware of and stipulates that Contractor will also comply with the following sections of the California Labor Code:
- (1) Section 1771 Contractor and any subcontractor shall pay not less than the general prevailing rate per diem wages.
- (2) Section 1775 Contractor and any subcontractor will forfeit to City as a penalty up to \$200 for each calendar day, or portion of a day, for each worker paid less than the applicable prevailing wage rate, in addition to paying each worker the difference between the applicable wage rate and the amount actually paid.
- (3) Contractor and any subcontractor must maintain certified payroll records in compliance with Labor Code sections 1776 and 1812, and all implementing regulations promulgated by the DIR. For each payroll record, Contractor and its subcontractors must certify under penalty of perjury that the information in the record is true and correct, and that it has complied with the requirements of Labor Code sections 1771, 1811, and 1815. Contractor must electronically submit certified payroll records to the Labor Commissioner as required under California law and regulations.
- (4) Section 1777.5 prescribes the terms and conditions for employing registered apprentices.
- (5) Section 1810 eight hours of labor constitutes a legal day's work.
- (6) Section 1813 Contractor will forfeit to the City as a penalty the sum of \$25 for each day during which a worker employed by Contractor or any subcontractor is required or permitted to work more than eight hours during any one calendar day, or more than 40 hours per calendar week, unless such workers are paid overtime wages under Labor Code section 1815.
- (7) Sections 1725.5 and 1771.1 require all general contractors and subcontractors to be registered with the DIR.
- (8) Contractor must also post all job site notices required by laws or regulations pursuant to Labor Code section 1771.4.

13. <u>UNDUE INFLUENCE</u>

Contractor declares and warrants that no undue influence or pressure was used against or in concert with any officer or employee of the City in connection with the award, terms or implementation of this Agreement, including any method of coercion, confidential financial arrangement, or financial inducement. No officer or employee of the City has or will receive compensation, directly or indirectly, from Contractor, or from any officer, employee or agent of Contractor, in connection with this Agreement or any Services to be conducted as a result of this Agreement. Violation of this section shall be a material breach of this Agreement entitling the City to any and all remedies at law or in equity.

14. NO BENEFIT TO ARISE TO CITY EMPLOYEES

No member, officer, or employee of the City, or their designees or agents, and no public official who exercises authority over or responsibilities with respect to the Services during his/her tenure or for one year thereafter, shall have any interest, direct or indirect, in any Agreement or sub-agreement, or the proceeds thereof, for Services to be performed under this Agreement.

15. RELEASE OF INFORMATION/CONFLICTS OF INTEREST

- A. All information gained by Contractor in performance of this Agreement shall be considered confidential and shall not be released by Contractor without the City's prior written authorization, unless the information is clearly public. Contractor, its officers, employees, agents, or subcontractors, shall not without written authorization from the Executive Director or designee, or unless requested by the City's attorney, voluntarily provide declarations, letters of support, testimony at depositions, response to interrogatories, or other information concerning the Services performed under this Agreement or relating to the City. Response to a subpoena or court order shall not be considered "voluntary" provided Contractor gives the City notice of such court order or subpoena.
- B. Contractor shall promptly notify the City should Contractor, its officers, employees, agents, and/or subcontractors be served with any summons, complaint, notice of deposition, request for documents, interrogatories, request for admissions, or other discovery request ("Discovery"), court order, or subpoena from any person or party regarding this Agreement and the Services performed hereunder or with respect to any project or property located within the City, unless the City is a party to any lawsuit, arbitration, or administrative proceeding connected to such Discovery, or unless Contractor is prohibited by law from informing the City of such Discovery. The City retains the right, but has no obligation, to represent Contractor and/or be present at any deposition, hearing, or similar proceeding as allowed by law. Unless the City is a party to the lawsuit, arbitration, or administrative proceeding and is adverse to Contractor in such proceeding, Contractor agrees to cooperate fully with the City and to provide the opportunity to review any response to discovery requests provided by Contractor. However, the City's right to review any such response does not imply or mean the right by the City to control, direct, or rewrite said response, or that the City has an obligation to review any such response or verifies any response it has reviewed.

16. NOTICES

Any notices which either party may desire to give to the other party under this Agreement must be in writing and may be given either by (i) personal service, (ii) delivery by a reputable document delivery service, such as but not limited to, Federal Express, which provides a receipt showing date and time of delivery, or (iii) mail by the United States Postal Service, certified mail, postage prepaid, return

receipt requested, addressed to the address of the party as set forth below or at any other address as that party may later designate by notice:

17. ASSIGNMENT

Contractor shall not assign the performance of this Agreement, nor any part thereof, nor any monies due hereunder, without prior written consent of the City. Before retaining or contracting with any subcontractor for any services under this Agreement, Contractor shall provide the City with the identity of the proposed subcontractor, a copy of the proposed written contract between Contractor and such subcontractor which shall include and indemnity provision similar to the one provided herein and identifying the City as an indemnified party, or an incorporation of the indemnity provision provided herein, and proof that such proposed subcontractor carries insurance at least equal to that required by this Agreement or obtain a written waiver from the City for such insurance.

18. LICENSES

At all times during the term of this Agreement, Contractor shall have in full force and effect all licenses required of it by law for the performance of the Services described in this Agreement.

19. GOVERNING LAW

The City and Contractor understand and agree that the laws of the State of California shall govern the rights, obligations, duties, and liabilities of the parties to this Agreement and also govern the interpretation of this Agreement. Any litigation concerning this Agreement shall take place in the municipal, superior, or federal district court with jurisdiction over the City.

20. ENTIRE AGREEMENT

This Agreement contains the entire understanding between the parties relating to the obligations of the parties described in this Agreement. All prior or contemporaneous agreements, understandings, representations, and statements, oral or written and pertaining to the subject of this Agreement or with respect to the terms and conditions of this Agreement shall be of no further force or effect. Each party is entering into this

Agreement based solely upon the representations set forth herein and upon each party's own independent investigation of any and all facts such party deems material.

21. <u>AMENDMENTS</u>

Any amendments to this Agreement must be in writing and executed by the parties hereto, or their respective successors and assigns, in order to be valid.

22. NON-EXCLUSIVE AGREEMENT

Contractor acknowledges that the City may enter into agreements with other Contractors for services similar to the services that are subject to this Agreement or may have its own employees perform services similar to those services contemplated by this Agreement.

23. ATTORNEYS' FEES

In the event that litigation is brought by any party in connection with this Agreement, the prevailing party shall be entitled to recover from the opposing party all costs and expenses, including reasonable attorneys' fees, incurred by the prevailing party in the exercise of any of its rights or remedies hereunder or the enforcement of any of the terms, conditions, or provisions hereof.

24. CONSTRUCTION

The parties hereto have participated jointly in the negotiation and drafting of this Agreement. In the event an ambiguity or question of intent or interpretation arises with respect to this Agreement, this Agreement shall be construed as if drafted jointly by the parties and in accordance with its fair meaning. There shall be no presumption or burden of proof favoring or disfavoring any party by virtue of the authorship of any of the provisions of this Agreement.

25. WAIVER

The delay or failure of any party at any time to require performance or compliance by the other of any of its obligations or agreements shall in no way be deemed a waiver of those rights to require such performance or compliance. No waiver of any provision of this Agreement shall be effective unless in writing and signed by a duly authorized representative of the party against whom enforcement of a waiver is sought. The waiver of any right or remedy in respect to any occurrence or event shall not be deemed a waiver of any right or remedy in respect to any other occurrence or event, nor shall any waiver constitute a continuing waiver.

26. **SEVERABILITY**

If any provision of this Agreement is determined by a court of competent jurisdiction to be unenforceable in any circumstance, such determination shall not affect the validity or enforceability of the remaining terms and provisions hereof or of the offending provision in any other circumstance. Notwithstanding the foregoing, if the value of this Agreement,

based upon the substantial benefit of the bargain for any party, is materially impaired, which determination made by the presiding court or arbitrator of competent jurisdiction shall be binding, then both parties agree to substitute such provision(s) through good faith negotiations.

27. COUNTERPARTS

This Agreement may be executed in one or more counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original. All counterparts shall be construed together and shall constitute one agreement.

28. <u>AUTHORITY TO EXECUTE THIS AGREEMENT</u>

The persons executing this Agreement on behalf of the parties warrant and represents that they have the authority to execute this Agreement on behalf of said parties and has the authority to bind the parties to the provisions of this Agreement.

29. <u>ELECTRONIC SIGNATURES</u>

The parties acknowledge and agree that execution of this Agreement by electronic signature or electronic transmittal of signatures shall have the same effect as handwritten signatures for the purposes of validity, enforceability, and admissibility.

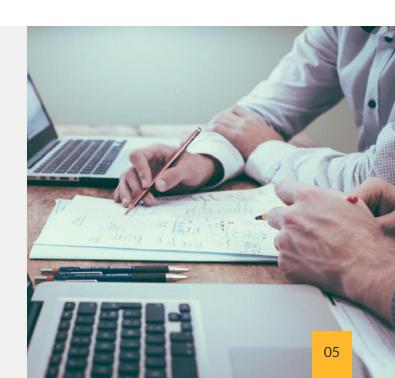

PREVIOUS PROJECTS



San Juan Capistrano, CA

The City of San Juan Capistrano contracted iWater to perform a multi-year Valve and Hydrant Assessment. This project consisted of exercising all residential and arterial valves (4,086) including capturing GPS Coordinates (Sub-Meter Accuracy). Valve lids were removed and crews vacuum cleaned the can. iWater field crews operated valves completely from open to closed position, two times, and recorded the number of turns and any characteristics like hard to turn, packing leak, inoperable, unable to locate or needing repair.

iWater Field Crews performed flushing on 1,698 Hydrants within the water system based on a pre-planned route. Starting at or near a source of supply and working outward the operator would close the hydrant isolation valve and verify closure by opening the 4" port on a hydrant. After confirmation, closed the 4" port and opened the isolation valve slowly. Lastly the 4" hydrant port was opened and flushed to remove water in the lateral. Flushed water was diffused through a dechlorinator and coconut baffles used to keep water in the gutter. Chlorine Residuals were also captured for Water Quality purposes.



Rowland Water District, CA

Rowland Water District contracted iWater to perform a multi-year Valve Assessment. This included the exercising of 3,550 valves and GPS'ing valves to Sub-Foot Accuracy. All data including condition, depth to nut, torque and turns were provided back to the District, so that the GIS could be updated based on iWater Field Crews findings.



La Habra, CA

Provided GPS Data Collection and GIS updates for 30,000+ Water and Sewer Assets. As part of this project iWater Field Crews exercised 3,800 valves. All updates are now available in their *infraMAP*® Cloud Maintenance Management System.

PROJECT APPROACH

Valve Exercising

iWater will establish a valve maintenance service program providing a complete turnkey solution for valve maintenance, documentation of valve operation, condition and whether or not a valve lid needs to be raised. All data will be recorded directly into the City of Santa Fe Springs's *infraMAP*® Cloud Maintenance Management Software which generates real time data including operation information and torque data.

iWater field crews are equipped with state-ofthe-art technology. Trucks are fully outfitted with advanced vacuum systems to clear any obstructions that may be present in the valve can. iWater valve exercising follows AWWA procedures with the lowest amount of torque applied and the maximum of 400 ft/lbs of torque will be applied. Additional torque and valves greater than 14" will be attempted after notification is made to the City of Santa Fe Springs (project manager or water superintendent) and a schedule will be defined for the operation. Each isolation valve shall be exercised until complete closure is achieved or will be noted if a problem exists. If a valve cannot be turned by hand, an on-board EH Wachs ERV-750 hydraulic valve machine will be utilized to safely operate the valve.

iWater trucks have arrow boards, warning lights and provide proper delineation/signed for each project. Proper traffic delineation as outlined in the WATCH handbook will be followed at all times.

Valve Lid Painting

Distribution Valve lids will be painted Blue and Hydrant Valves Half Blue/Half Yellow after each valve has been successfully exercised. White paint will be used for Inoperable Valves. The City of Santa Fe Springs shall supply lids and cans as needed for repairs while performing valve maintenance on this project.

GPS Data Collection

All valve features not currently in the GIS will be GPS'd at Sub-Foot Accuracy or Better. At least six satellites are required to be considered accurate with real-time differential correction.

GPS Accuracy will also be recorded into the database so that team members can QA/QC the accuracy of each GPS Point.

PDOP (Position Dilution of Precision) shall be less than 5 for this project with an Elevation Mask of 15 degrees above the horizon.



RESULT

The City of Santa Fe Springs will receive a finished product of properly operating Water Distribution System Valves. All data collected during the project will be available via *infraMAP*® Cloud. Tasks will also be created for valves that may need repair, replacement and inoperable.

QA/QC shall continue throughout the entire project. iWater GIS Specialist will monitor the project and adjust water main's where necessary. This will be based on new valves that are GPS'd during the valve exercising program.

Upon project completion the City of Santa Fe Springs will have a complete valve maintenance plan. *infraMAP®* Cloud will be continually updated so that the City has the latest and most accurate information available at their fingertips.

EXHIBIT B

INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS

Without limiting Contractor's indemnification of the City, and prior to commencement of Services, Contractor shall obtain, provide, and maintain at its own expense during the term of this Agreement, policies of insurance of the type and amounts described below and in a form satisfactory to the City. If Contractor maintains higher limits than the minimum limits shown below, the City requires and shall be entitled to coverage for the higher limits maintained by the Contractor. Any available insurance proceeds in excess of the specified minimum limits of insurance and coverage shall be available to the City.

General liability insurance. Contractor shall maintain commercial general liability insurance with coverage at least as broad as Insurance Services Office form CG 00 01, in an amount not less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence, \$2,000,000 general aggregate, for bodily injury, personal injury, and property damage. The policy must include contractual liability that has not been amended. Any endorsement restricting standard ISO "insured contract" language will not be accepted.

Automobile liability insurance. Contractor shall maintain automobile insurance at least as broad as Insurance Services Office form CA 00 01 covering bodily injury and property damage for all activities of the Contractor arising out of or in connection with Services to be performed under this Agreement, including coverage for any owned, hired, non-owned or rented vehicles, in an amount not less than \$1,000,000 combined single limit for each accident.

Workers' compensation insurance. Contractor shall maintain Workers' Compensation Insurance (Statutory Limits) and Employer's Liability Insurance (with limits of at least \$1,000,000 per accident for bodily injury or disease).

Contractor shall submit to the City, along with the certificate of insurance, a Waiver of Subrogation endorsement in favor of the City, its officers, agents, employees, and volunteers.

Other provisions or requirements

Proof of insurance. Contractor shall provide certificates of insurance to the City as evidence of the insurance coverage required herein, along with a waiver of subrogation endorsement for workers' compensation. Insurance certificates and endorsements must be approved by the City's Risk Manager prior to commencement of performance. Current certification of insurance shall be kept on file with the City at all times during the term of this Agreement. The City reserves the right to require complete, certified copies of all required insurance policies at any time.

Duration of coverage. Contractor shall procure and maintain for the duration of the Agreement insurance against claims for injuries to persons or damages to property, which

may arise from or in connection with the performance of the Services hereunder by Contractor, or Contractor's agents, representatives, employees or subContractors.

Primary/noncontributing. Coverage provided by Contractor shall be primary and any insurance or self-insurance procured or maintained by the City shall not be required to contribute with it. The limits of insurance required herein may be satisfied by a combination of primary and umbrella or excess insurance. Any umbrella or excess insurance shall contain or be endorsed to contain a provision that such coverage shall also apply on a primary and non-contributory basis for the benefit of the City before the City's own insurance or self-insurance shall be called upon to protect it as a named insured.

The City's rights of enforcement. In the event any policy of insurance required under this Agreement does not comply with these specifications or is canceled and not replaced, the City has the right but not the duty to obtain the insurance it deems necessary and any premium paid by the City will be promptly reimbursed by Contractor or the City will withhold amounts sufficient to pay premium from Contractor payments. In the alternative, the City may immediately terminate this Agreement.

Acceptable insurers. All insurance policies shall be issued by an insurance company currently authorized by the Insurance Commissioner to transact business of insurance or is on the List of Approved Surplus Line Insurers in the State of California, with an assigned policyholders' Rating of A- (or higher) and Financial Size Category Class VI (or larger) in accordance with the latest edition of Best's Key Rating Guide, unless otherwise approved by the City's Risk Manager.

Waiver of subrogation. All insurance coverage maintained or procured pursuant to this Agreement shall be endorsed to waive subrogation against the City, its elected or appointed officers, agents, officials, employees and volunteers or shall specifically allow Contractor or others providing insurance evidence in compliance with these specifications to waive their right of recovery prior to a loss. Contractor hereby waives its own right of recovery against the City, and shall require similar written express waivers and insurance clauses from each of its subContractors.

Enforcement of Agreement provisions (non estoppel). Contractor acknowledges and agrees that any actual or alleged failure on the part of the City to inform Contractor of non-compliance with any requirement imposes no additional obligations on the City nor does it waive any rights hereunder.

Requirements not limiting. Requirements of specific coverage features or limits contained in this Agreement are not intended as a limitation on coverage, limits or other requirements, or a waiver of any coverage normally provided by any insurance. Specific reference to a given coverage feature is for purposes of clarification only as it pertains to a given issue and is not intended by any party or insured to be all inclusive, or to the exclusion of other coverage, or a waiver of any type.

Notice of cancellation. Contractor agrees to oblige its insurance agent or broker and insurers to provide to the City with a thirty (30) day notice of cancellation (except for nonpayment for which a ten (10) day notice is required) or nonrenewal of coverage for each required coverage.

Additional insured status. General liability policies shall provide or be endorsed to provide that the City and its officers, officials, employees, agents, and volunteers shall be additional insureds under such policies. This provision shall also apply to any excess/umbrella liability policies.

Prohibition of undisclosed coverage limitations. None of the coverages required herein will be in compliance with these requirements if they include any limiting endorsement of any kind that has not been first submitted to the City and approved of in writing.

Separation of insureds. A severability of interests provision must apply for all additional insureds ensuring that Contractor's insurance shall apply separately to each insured against whom claim is made or suit is brought, except with respect to the insurer's limits of liability. The policy(ies) shall not contain any cross-liability exclusions.

Pass through clause. Contractor agrees to ensure that its subContractors, subcontractors, and any other party involved with the Services who is brought onto or involved in the Services by Contractor, provide the same minimum insurance coverage and endorsements required of Contractor. Contractor agrees to monitor and review all such coverage and assumes all responsibility for ensuring that such coverage is provided in conformity with the requirements of this section. Contractor agrees that upon request, all agreements with Contractors, subContractors, and others engaged in the Services will be submitted to the City for review.

The City's right to revise specifications. The City reserves the right at any time during the term of the Agreement to change the amounts and types of insurance required by giving Contractor ninety (90) days advance written notice of such change. If such change results in substantial additional cost to Contractor, City and Contractor may renegotiate Contractor's compensation or come to some other agreement to address the additional cost.

Self-insured retentions. Any self-insured retentions must be declared to and approved by the City. The City reserves the right to require that self-insured retentions be eliminated, lowered, or replaced by a deductible. Self-insurance will not be considered to comply with these specifications unless approved by the City.

Timely notice of claims. Contractor shall give the City prompt and timely notice of claims made or suits instituted that arise out of or result from Contractor's performance under this Agreement, and that involve or may involve coverage under any of the required liability policies.

Additional insurance. Contractor shall also procure and maintain, at its own cost and expense, any additional kinds of insurance, which in its own judgment may be necessary for its proper protection and prosecution of the Services.

MINUTES OF THE SPECIAL MEETINGS OF THE CITY COUNCIL

March 28, 2024

CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Sarno called the meeting to order at 5:04 p.m.

ROLL CALL

Members present: Councilmembers Martin, Rodriguez, Zamora Mayor Pro Tem Rounds, and Mayor Sarno.

Members absent: None

PUBLIC COMMENTS

There was no one wishing to speak during public comments.

CITY COUNCIL

STUDY SESSION

1. FY 2024-2025 BUDGET WORKSHOP – DEPARTMENT PRESENTATIONS

City Manager, René Bobadilla provided information on the budget process and articulated the steps that are going to be taken for this presentation and future budget workshops. He highlighted the organizational changes amongst departments, and also talked about budget changes which include consolidating activities and quarterly updates.

Director of Finance, Lana Dich talked about budget basics and revenue and expenditure tables. She talked about department budgets and also talked about the capital improvement plan, water fund, and other related financial and operational appendices. She elaborated on collaboration and partnerships within departments. She talked about the budget preparation timeline, and City Manager Bobadilla provided additional information on budget preparation and closing procedures. Director Dich continued to talk about the general fund and other funding sources, which highlighted the major dependence on sales tax. Lastly, she talked about the future outlook of the City and introduced Assistant City Manager, Nicholas Razo to talk about the City Manager's Department. He highlighted the specific responsibilities of the City Clerk's Office, Human Resources Office, and IT Office. He talked about the proposed budget positions for Human Resources, and also highlighted noteworthy budget talking points for the current fiscal year.

Mayor Pro Tem Rounds talked about the SASSFA offerings, such as meals on wheels and asked if the City could increase the donation amount for SASSFA from \$20,000 to \$35,000. Councilmember Zamora asked for an increase to the Little Lake Enrichment Foundation, from \$2,500 to \$5,000. It was agreed to increase the amount to \$10,000 and

also to condense certain expenditures into broader categories. Specific items would be tracked separately.

Director of Community Development, Cuong Nguyen provided an introduction to the Community Development Department. In terms of proposed positions, his goal is to reclassify the administrative assistant to executive assistant and to fill the vacant City Planner position. He talked about noteworthy achievements during the current fiscal year including the opening of the Chick-Fil-A restaurant on Telegraph Road, and also the updated zoning ordinance and zoning map in alignment with the 2040 General Plan.

Director of Community Services, Maricela Balderas provided information on the Community Services Department, and showcased her proposed organizations for the upcoming fiscal year. She talked about noteworthy highlights from the Community Services administration, Library & Cultural Services, and Family & Human Services divisions. She highlighted the objectives for the upcoming fiscal year for each department. City Manager Bobadilla provided information on a proposed CAP Program to provide infield mental and physical health services and resources for un-housed individuals & families in conjunction with the Fire and Police Services Departments.

Director of Finance and Administrative Services, Lana Dich provided an introduction to her department, including proposed positions for the upcoming fiscal year. She talked about the essential services provided by Finance, and also provided information on the new services implemented during the current fiscal year such as ACH/ Direct Deposit Payment options, introduction of Planet Bids, and issued an RFP for water utility billing software. Lastly, she talked about goals and objections for the upcoming fiscal year as well as supplemental budget requests.

Fire Chief, Chad Van Meeteren introduced the Department of Fire-Rescue and provided an overview of the department, including the administration, suppression, prevention, and environmental divisions. He talked about noteworthy budget highlights like the grants received. He also talked about the implementation of the "Healing Our Own" Program which establishes a peer-to-peer mental health awareness program, as well as the implementation of a digital plan review. He talked about the plans for the upcoming fiscal year, such as the study for an additional paramedic unit to serve the community and an ambulance feasibility study. Additional goals include purchasing of fire equipment, updating the local hazard mitigation plan, and fire headquarters office space update. He added that the department will continue to pursue grants and also update the aging 1958 Seagrave Fire Truck.

Director of Parks and Recreation, Gus Hernandez spoke about the special events, sports, classes, and activities offered to City residents. He spoke about the proposed additions to his department for the next fiscal year, and also talked about the noteworthy highlights for the current fiscal year such as the number of classes and attendants at City events. He outlined Goals and Objectives such as the establishment of a master plan for recreation facilities, and the fostering of relationships for resource optimization. Council was in agreement that the health of residents and staff continues to be a top priority.

Director of Police Services, Dino Torres spoke about his department which oversees the management of law enforcement services within the City. It is comprised of administrative

personnel, public safety officers, code enforcement inspectors, Family & Youth Intervention Team, and Whittier Police Department officers. He provided noteworthy accomplishments such as the increased number of ALPR Cameras and the security camera rebate program. Some of the goals for the upcoming fiscal year include to enhance crime prevention efforts and traffic safety, as well as to advance the use of technology to improve services.

Director of Public Works, James Enriquez provided information about his department, including notable achievements which include the relocation of the Building & Safety services from Planning to Public Works, and the rapid storm response times. He also spoke about the noteworthy budget highlights during the current fiscal year, such as the delivery of CIP projects and the initiation of restructuring of the Municipal Services Yard for increased operational efficiency. He talked about objectives for the next fiscal year which include improve coordination with LA County Consolidated Sewer Maintenance District, and the growth of the Environmental Services Division.

City Manager Bobadilla provided closing comments on the budget process. Mayor Sarno commended staff on the progressive changes to the budget preparation. Council provided closing comments.

STUDY SESSION

3. FY 2024-2025 BUDGET WORKSHOP # 2 - DEPARTMENT PRESENTATIONS

City Manager, René Bobadilla provided a brief recap of the budget workshop, where the budget was defined, and the budget timeline was introduced, and each department provided an overview of accomplishments during the current fiscal year. He explained that the purpose of this second workshop was to provide an overview of next fiscal year's budget and to review expenditures at the department level to identify specific changes impacting the budget.

Director of Finance, Lana Dich then spoke about the proposed budget highlights which detailed funding for new positions and position adjustments, funding for labor agreements, and funding to implement a class and compensation study. She provided a general fund summary and briefly touched on the sales tax history of the city, while also providing details about the monetary "buckets" that have been implemented to keep balances for things such as unfunded liability, CIP projects, equipment replacement, and economic contingencies. Lastly, she presented information on the annual pension costs and funding plan, while also providing an overview of Kosmont Companies, who provides pension advisory experience.

Assistant City Manager, Nicholas Razo began the department presentations by talking about the proposed budget for the City Manager's Office, which totals \$9.30 million. He provided details on the Community Organization Support Budget which includes new support for local high schools. Lastly, he talked about proposed personnel changes and a focus on completing the IT Assessment.

Director of Public Works, James Enriquez spoke about his proposed budget for his department which totals \$19.9 million: \$15.4 million for maintenance services and \$4.5 million for engineering services. He provided details on the highlights for next year's changes which include adding a Civil Engineer Assistant I and a Principal Engineer, while also including additional engineering and safety consultants. On the maintenance side, he highlighted the need for additional funding to maintenance and operation issues such as equipment maintenance, streets, parks, and facilities upkeep. He concluded by highlighting the position listings for the engineering, maintenance, and water divisions.

Director of Police Services, Dino Torres spoke about his proposed budget which totals \$20.1 million. He highlighted the additions to personnel, which include a Lead Public Safety Officer, a Public Safety Officer II, and a Management Analyst II. He also underlined the move of the Emergency Preparedness division to the Fire, the move of Facilities Operation to Public Works, and the Family and Youth Intervention move to Parks and Recreation. Lastly, he detailed the Police Services contract cost with the City of Whittier to be \$12.7 million.

Director of Parks and Recreation, Gus Hernandez provided an overview of his newly created department, with a proposed budget of \$6.29 million. He highlighted the changes for the upcoming fiscal year which include 6 new positions, the incorporation of a Parks & Recreation Manager, a supervisor for ballfield maintenance, and the creation of a Parks Master Plan.

Fire Chief, Chad Van Meeteren explained the proposed budget for his department which totals \$26.7 million. Some of the highlights include the addition of a Housing Compliance Inspector I, a Management Analyst I, and a refinement of the Local Hazard Mitigation Plan and a Community Emergency Response Team (CERT). He also spoke on the need for environmental consultants, replacement of certain emergency vehicles, and the creation of a Community Assistance Program, which provides a dedicated mobile response unit.

Director of Finance, Lana Dich gave an overview of her department with an estimated budget of \$7 million. Highlights include the addition of a Principal Accountant, Account

Clerk, and an Executive Assistant, as well as new software such as Planet Bids and ClearGov that will help the City stay current with modern technology.

Family & Human Services Manager, Ed Ramirez provided an overview of the Community Services Department, which totals \$8.3 million. He talked about specific changes to personnel include the absorption of Transportation Services, reclassification of various full-time positions, and additional funds for hourly positions. Additional goals for the next fiscal year include the expansion of Human Services resources, expansion of Transit Services with weekend operations, and the initiation of a City re-branding campaign.

Director of Community Development, Cuong Nguyen provided information on his department with an estimated budget of \$2.91 million. Highlights and changes include the removal of the Building division, a comprehensive zoning code update, the incorporation of consultant services for things such as objective development standards, and new software/hardware (RealQuest).

Council thanked staff for their presentations.

STUDY SESSION

4. FISCAL YEAR 2024-25 PROPOSED BUDGET – BUDGET INTRODUCTION

City Manager, René Bobadilla began by talking about the major differences between this proposed budget and previous budgets. He spoke about the organizational changes and also the new format which details revenue summary and revenues by major categories. The new budget also shows total expenditures by departments as opposed to having splintered costs that used to span across several departments, such as the cost of utilities.

Director of Finance, Lana Dich explained the FY 23-24 General Fund Year-End Projection and as well as the general fund, water fund, and special revenue. The water fund deficit is under 1 million for the current fiscal year because money was pulled from general fund to help bring down amount owned. City Manager Bobadilla added that water issues need to be addressed in the near future, as it is expensive to keep purchasing water. Councilmember Zamora asked about water rights. Director of Public Works, James Enriquez answered that there is ongoing pricing negotiations, but nothing has been finalized.

Assistant City Manager, Nicholas Razo talked about City Manager's Office budget. He highlighted the incorporation of the Human Resources and Information Technology divisions under the City Manager department, as well as the combination of certain community organization support details. Lastly, he provided details about the IT assessment. Councilmember Zamora asked about an internship summer program for middle school aged children. Council gave direction to have the City Manager work with Human Resources into how the program can be implemented and incorporated.

Director of Public Works, James Enriquez talked about the proposed changes for the upcoming fiscal year, which include adding personnel and in the engineering and maintenance sections. Mayor Sarno asked about available consultants, and Director Enriquez said that they can pull from already established lists in case there is a specific job that needs to be completed. Mayor Sarno requested to increase the amount to \$220,000 to street maintenance (asphalt/concrete repair). City Manager Bobadilla gave direction to move \$220,000 from M&O to the CIP project total.

Director of Police Services, Dino Torres began his presentation by speaking about the budget highlights which include the addition of new positions. Mayor Sarno asked about increases in code enforcement. Director Torres stated that the increase is due to two additional positions. Councilmember Martin asked about partnering with SEAACA for licensing and capture. Director

Torres explained revenue sharing and highlighted the customer service provided by in-house staff. City Manager Bobadilla said that they will look into partnering with SEAACA and will bring an item back at a subsequent meeting.

Director of Parks & Recreation, Gus Hernandez talked about how park maintenance was overseen by Public Works but will now be overseen by Parks & Recreation in the form of field maintenance and staffing. Councilmember Zamora suggested running tournaments in-house. Mayor Pro Tem Rounds asked about the maintenance of the grounds around the sculpture garden. City Manager Bobadilla answered that amendments with Merchants are in talks to add additional items to existing agreements, which would incorporate the grounds surrounding the sculpture garden.

Fire Chief, Chad Van Meeteren introduced his budget changes, which include the addition of a Housing Compliance Inspector I and a Management Analyst I. Mayor Sarno asked about the possibility of inspecting homes that are being sold to ensure that they are compliant with city laws. Chief Van Meeteren said that they are meeting staffing needs, and that there is an ongoing study to assess their effectiveness. Councilmember Zamora asked how often Fire inspects facilities, to which Fire Chief Van Meeteren responded that hazardous materials inspections are conducted once a year. Council directed to use funds from the Heritage Arts fund to maintain the Seagrave Pumper (Wheezer).

Family & Human Services Manager, Ed Ramirez provided information on the upcoming Community Services budget, which includes the creation of the Creative Media & Communications team and the incorporation of Transportation Services from Public Works. Councilmember Zamora asked about the Community Services Supervisor position for busses. City Manager Bobadilla stated that talks are ongoing of having those operations operate out of the Gus Velasco Neighborhood Center. Council provided direction to consolidate the Fiestas Patrias and Fiestas de Octubre events, and to explore the possibility of hosting the 5K in May during City's birthday.

Director of Community Development, Cuong Nguyen talked about his budgeted changes, which include the removal of the Building Division to Public Works and the reclassification of an Administrative Assistant II to Executive Assistant. He also talked about a comprehensive zoning code update.

City Manager Bobadilla concluded the presentation by providing information about potential measures on the November ballot.

A warrant is drawn upon funds of the city treasury. The City Council may authorize practices with respect to form, issuance, delivery, endorsement, and payment of warrants by resolution in conformance with applicable state law. Except as may otherwise be set by resolution of the City Council, warrants will be signed by the Mayor or the City Manager and countersigned by the Director of Finance and Administrative Services in the director's capacity as Treasurer.

SECTION 2. Any provision of the Code of Santa Fe Springs inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance, to the extent of such inconsistencies and no further, is hereby repealed or modified to that extent necessary to effect the provisions of this Ordinance.

SECTION 3. If any section, subsection, phrase, or clause of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be unconstitutional, such decision will not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance. The City Council hereby declares that it would have passed this Ordinance and each section, subsection, phrase, or clause thereof irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, phrases, or clauses may be declared unconstitutional.

SECTION 4. The City Clerk shall certify to the adoption of this Ordinance, including the vote for and against and shall post a certified copy of this ordinance, within 15 days after its passage to be posted in at least three (3) public places within the City as established by ordinance, and, in compliance with Section 36933 of the Government Code.

The salary of City Council members has not been adjusted since 2012. WHEREAS, Government Code section 36515(a) establishes city council salaries and provides for specified increases; and

WHEREAS, Senate Bill 329 was passed in 2023 and amended Government Code section 36515 in order to increase city council salaries to reflect the important work done by city council members, to take into account the impacts of inflation and economic realities on those who serve as city council members, and to encourage people to consider service as council members by making the compensation more reflective of the time and work being performed; and

WHEREAS, the salary of the Santa Fe Springs City Council has not been increased since 2012; and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that an increase in salary within the limits set forth in Government Code section 36515 will help support the governance of the City and takes into account the importance of such governance and the impacts of inflation and economic realities.

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SANTA FE SPRINGS DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. Section 30.03 of Title III of the Code of Santa Fe Springs is hereby deleted in its entirety and replaced with the following:

§ 30.03 SALARY OF COUNCIL MEMBERS.

In accordance with the provisions of Section 36516 of the Government Code, the compensation of the members of the City Council shall be \$1,019.38 per month. Pursuant to the provisions of Section 36516.5 of the Government Code, this section shall take effect as to all Council members when one or more members begin a new term of office following the 2024 general municipal election.

SECTION 2. Any provision of the Code of Santa Fe Springs inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance, to the extent of such inconsistencies and no further, is hereby repealed or modified to that extent necessary to effect the provisions of this Ordinance.

SECTION 3. If any section, subsection, phrase, or clause of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be unconstitutional, such decision will not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance. The City Council hereby declares that it would have passed this Ordinance and each section, subsection, phrase, or clause thereof irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, phrases, or clauses may be declared unconstitutional.

SECTION 4. The City Clerk shall certify to the adoption of this Ordinance, including the vote for and against and shall post a certified copy of this ordinance, within 15 days after its passage to be posted in at least three (3) public places within the City as established by ordinance, and, in compliance with Section 36933 of the Government Code.

BACKGROUND

Prior to January 1, 2005, State statute required the City Treasurer to render to the City Council an annual Investment Policy ("Policy"). Although the law changed to eliminate this requirement, an annual review of the Policy for legal compliance and subsequent submittal to the City Council is a good fiscal practice.

Mr. Richard D. Babbe, Senior Managing Consultant with PFM Asset Management, LLC ("PFMAM"), regularly meet with Staff to review the City's investment portfolio performance, including discussion on compliance with the City's Policy and any recommended changes to the Policy.

DISCUSSION

The current Policy was originally adopted on June 25, 2015. Minor updates have been made since that time to ensure compliance with changes to the California Government Code ("Code").

At this time, PFMAM is recommending the City update two policy sections. First, PFMAM recommends that City add a sentence to the Section 8. Authorized and Suitable Investment toe state that a security's term to maturity at purchase is measured from settlement date. This will eliminate any uncertainty on how to determine a security's term to maturity at purchase. This incorporates a Code revision made as part of Senate Bill 1489, which took effect January 1, 2023. This Bill made explicit that an investment's remaining maturity is to be measured from the settlement date of the purchase to its final maturity.

Second, PFMAM recommends the City update Section 8.16 Asset-Back Securities (ABS) to incorporate a minor Code revision that took effect January 1, 2024. Senate Bill 882, Local Government Omnibus Act of 2023, made various minor edits to state statues, including a change to Code Section 53601(o). The Bill codified the common Code interpretation that mortgage-backed securities issued by federal agencies are excluded from the Code's requirements described in Section 53601(o) for privately issued assets-and mortgage-backed securities. This changes does not otherwise modify the Code's or the Policy's requirements for the purchase of agency mortgage-backed securities.

The current Policy with recommended changes and the final version from PFMAM outlining the recommended changes are attached to this report.

The current policy is in compliance with the requirements of the Code and are modeled after the recommended language endorsed by the California Municipal Treasurer's Association ("CMTA"). The proposed policy retains the existing overall investment objectives, in priority order, to be (1) safety (2) liquidity and (3) return on investment:

Safety — Safety of principal is the foremost objective of the investment program.

Investments will be undertaken in a manner that seeks to ensure preservation of capital in the portfolio.

Liquidity — The investment portfolio will remain sufficiently liquid to enable the City to meet its cash flow requirements.

Return on Investment — The investment portfolio will be designed with the objective of attaining a market rate of return throughout budgetary and economic cycles, taking into consideration with the investment risk constraints of safety and liquidity needs.

1. Policy

The intent of the Investment Policy of City of Santa Fe Springs is to define the parameters within which funds are to be managed. In methods, procedures and practices, the policy formalizes the framework for the City's investment activities that must be exercised to ensure effective and judicious fiscal and investment management of the City's funds. The guidelines are intended to be broad enough to allow the investment officer to function properly within the parameters of responsibility and authority, yet specific enough to adequately safeguard the investment assets.

The City will invest its funds in such a manner as to comply with applicable state laws (California Government Code Section 53600, et seq. and 53630, et seq.), ensure prudent money management, provide for daily cash flow needs, and meet the City's investment objectives.

2. Scope

The Investment Policy applies to all funds and investment activities of the City except for the investment of bond proceeds, which are governed by the appropriate bond documents, and any pension or other post-employment benefit funds held in a trust that has a separate investment policy.

Except for funds in certain restricted and special funds, the City commingles its funds to maximize investment earnings and to increase efficiencies with regard to investment pricing, safekeeping and administration.

3. Prudence

The standard of prudence to be used by those authorized to invest on behalf of the City will be the "prudent investor" standard and will be applied in the context of managing an overall portfolio. The "prudent investor" standard states that:

"When investing, reinvesting, purchasing, acquiring, exchanging, selling, or managing public funds, a trustee shall act with care, skill, prudence, and diligence under the circumstances then prevailing, including, but not limited to, the general economic conditions and the anticipated needs of the agency, that a prudent person acting in a like capacity and familiarity with those matters would use in the conduct of funds of a like character and with like aims, to safeguard the principal and maintain the liquidity needs of the agency."

4. Objectives

The primary objectives, in priority order, of the investment activities of the City are:

- Safety Safety of principal is the foremost objective of the investment program.
 Investments will be undertaken in a manner that seeks to ensure preservation of capital in the portfolio.
- 2. Liquidity The investment portfolio will remain sufficiently liquid to enable the City to meet its cash flow requirements.
- Return on Investment The investment portfolio will be designed with the
 objective of attaining a market rate of return throughout budgetary and economic
 cycles, taking into consideration with the investment risk constraints of safety and
 liquidity needs.

5. Delegation of Authority

The City Council's management responsibility for the investment program is hereby delegated for a one-year period to the City Treasurer. Subject to review, the City Council may renew the delegation of authority pursuant to this section each year. The City Treasurer, and the Treasurer's designees, will monitor and review all investments for consistency with this Investment Policy. The City Treasurer may delegate day-to-day investment decision making and execution authority to an investment advisor. Eligible investment advisors must be registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) under the Investment Advisors Act of 1940. The advisor will follow the Policy and such other written instructions as are provided.

6. Ethics and Conflict of Interest

Officers and employees involved in the investment process will refrain from personal business activities that could conflict with proper execution of the investment program, or which could impair their ability to make impartial decisions. Employees and investment officials will disclose to the City Manager any material financial interests in financial institutions that conduct business within their jurisdiction, and they will further disclose any large personal financial/investment positions that could be related to the performance of the City's portfolio.

7. Authorized Financial Dealers and Institutions

The City Treasurer will maintain a list of financial dealers and institutions qualified and authorized to transact business with the City.

The purchase by the City of any investment other than those purchased directly from the issuer, will be purchased either from an institution licensed by the State as a broker-dealer, as defined in Section 25004 of the Corporations Code, who is a member of Financial Industry Regulatory Authority (FINRA), or a member of a Federally regulated securities exchange, a National or State Chartered Bank a Federal or State Association (as defined by Section 5102 of the Financial Code), or a brokerage firm designated as a Primary Government Dealer by the Federal Reserve Bank.

The City Treasurer will investigate all institutions that wish to do business with the City, in order to determine if they are adequately capitalized, make markets in securities appropriate to the City's needs, and agree to abide by the conditions set forth in the City's Investment Policy and any other guidelines that may be provided. This

will be done annually by having the financial institutions submit in writing that they have read and will abide by the City's Investment Policy and submit its most recent audited Financial Statement within 120 days of the institution's fiscal year end.

If the City has an investment advisor, the investment advisor may use its own list of authorized broker/dealers to conduct transactions on behalf of the City.

Purchase and sale of securities will be made on the basis of competitive bids and offers with a minimum of three quotes being obtained, whenever possible.

8. Authorized and Suitable Investment

The City will limit investments in any one issuer, except U.S. Treasuries, Federal Agencies, supranationals, and pooled funds (i.e., money market funds, local government investment pools, and LAIF), to no more than 5% regardless of security type. An investment's term to maturity at purchase is measured from the investment's settlement date to its final maturity.

Where this section specifies a percentage limitation for a particular security type, that percentage is applicable only at the date of purchase. Credit criteria listed in this section refers to the credit rating category (inclusive of modifiers) at the time the security is purchased. If an investment's credit rating falls below the minimum rating required at the time of purchase, the City Treasurer will perform a timely review and decide whether to sell or hold the investment.

- U.S. Treasuries. United States Treasury notes, bonds, bills, or certificates of indebtedness, or those for which the full faith and credit of the United States are pledged for the payment of principal and interest.
- U.S. Agency Obligations. Federal agency or United States government-sponsored
 enterprise obligations, participations, or other instruments, including those issued by or
 fully guaranteed as to principal and interest by federal agencies or United States
 government-sponsored enterprises.
- 3. California State and Local Agency Obligations. Obligations of the State of California or any local agency within the state, including bonds payable solely out of revenues from a revenue producing property owned, controlled or operated by the state or any local agency or by a department, board, agency or authority of the state or any local agency. Obligations eligible for investment under this subdivision with maturities in excess of one year must be rated in a rating category of "A," its equivalent, or better by a nationally recognized statistical rating organization (NRSRO). Obligations eligible for investment under this subdivision with maturities under one year must be rated in a rating category of "A-1," its equivalent, or better by a NRSRO. No more than 30% of the City's portfolio may be invested in municipal obligations (includes 4. Other State Obligations).
- 4. Other State Obligations. Registered treasury notes or bonds of any of the other 49 United States in addition to California, including bonds payable solely out of the revenues from a revenue-producing property owned, controlled, or operated by a state or by a department, board, agency, or authority of any of the other 49 United States, in addition to California. Obligations eligible for investment under this subdivision with maturities in excess of one year must be rated in a rating category of "A," its equivalent, or better by a NRSRO. Obligations eligible for investment under this subdivision with maturities under one year

must be rated in a rating category "A-1," its equivalent, or better by a NRSRO. No more than 30% of the City's portfolio may be invested in municipal obligations (includes 3. California State and Local Agency Obligations).

- 5. Bankers' Acceptances. Purchases of bankers' acceptances will have a maximum maturity of 180 days. No more than 40% of the City's portfolio may be invested in bankers' acceptances. Eligible bankers' acceptances must be rated in a rating category of "A-1," its equivalent, or better by a NRSRO.
- 6. Commercial Paper. Commercial paper of "prime" quality of the highest ranking or of the highest letter and number rating as provided for by a NRSRO. The entity that issues the commercial paper will meet all of the following conditions in either paragraph a or paragraph b:
 - a. The entity meets the following criteria: (i) Is organized and operating in the United States as a general corporation. (ii) Has total assets in excess of five hundred million dollars (\$500,000,000). (iii) Has debt other than commercial paper, if any, that is rated in a rating category of "A," its equivalent orhigher by a NRSRO.
 - b. The entity meets the following criteria: (i) Is organized within the United States as a special purpose corporation, trust, or limited liability company. (ii) Has program wide credit enhancements including, but not limited to, over collateralization, letters of credit, or surety bond. (iii) Has commercial paper that is rated in a rating category of "A-1," its equivalent or higher, or the equivalent, by aNRSRO.

Eligible commercial paper will have a maximum maturity of 270 days or less. No more than 25% of the City's portfolio may be invested in commercial paper.

- 7. **Medium-Term Notes.** Medium-term notes, defined as all corporate and depository institution debt securities with a maximum remaining maturity of five years or less, issued by corporations organized and operating within the United States or by depository institutions licensed by the U.S. or any state, and operating within the U.S. Medium-term notes must be rated in a rating category of "A," its equivalent, or better by a NRSRO. No more than 30% of the City's portfolio may be invested in medium-term notes.
- 8. Bank Deposits. FDIC-insured or fully collateralized demand deposit accounts, savings accounts, market rate accounts, time certificates of deposits ("TCDs") and other types of bank deposits in a state or national bank, savings association or federal association, federal or state credit union in California. The amount on deposit in any financial institution shall not exceed the shareholder's equity. In accordance with California Government Code Section 53635.2, to be eligible to receive City deposits, a financial institution will have received an overall rating of not less than "satisfactory" in its most recent evaluation by the appropriate federal financial supervisory agency of its record of meeting the credit needs of California's communities. The City will have a signed agreement with any depository accepting City funds per Government Code Section 53649.

The maturity of TCDs may not exceed three years. No more than 30% of the City's portfolio may be invested in TCDs.

- 9. Deposit Placement Services. The City may invest a portion of its portfolio in deposits at a commercial bank, savings bank, savings and loan association, or credit union in the State of California (the selected depository) that uses a private sector entity that assists in the placement of deposits in the United States. The full amount of each deposit placed and the interest that may accrue on each such deposit will at all times be insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) or the National Credit Union Administration. Additional required criteria for this investment type can be found in California Government Code Section 53601.8.
 - No more than 30% of the City's investment portfolio may be invested in deposit placement service deposits. No more than 10% of the City's portfolio may be invested with any one selected depository for placement services.
 - The City will monitor the financial institutions selected by deposit placement services to ensure that the City does not deposit more than the amount eligible for FDIC insurance in a single financial institution through non-negotiable CDs and deposit placement services.
- 10. Negotiable Certificates of Deposit. Negotiable certificates of deposit issued by a nationally or state-chartered bank, a savings association or a federal association (as defined by Section 5102 of the Financial Code), a state or federal credit union, or by a federally- or state-licensed branch of a foreign bank. Eligible negotiable CDs with maturities in excess of one year must be rated in a rating category of "A," its equivalent, or better by a NRSRO. Eligible negotiable CDs with maturities under one year must be rated in a rating category of "A-1," its equivalent, or better by a NRSRO. No more than 30% of the City's investment portfolio may be invested in negotiable CDs.
- 11. State of California's Local Agency Investment Fund (LAIF). The State Treasurer established LAIF for the benefit of local agencies. The City can invest up to the maximum amount permitted by the State Treasurer.
- 12. Los Angeles County Pooled Fund. The Los Angeles County Treasurer manages a Pooled Fund, in which the City can invest funds that are needed for short-term liquidity.
- 13. **Money Market Funds.** Shares of beneficial interest issued by diversified management companies that are money market funds registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission under the Investment Company Act of 1940 (15 U.S.C. Sec. 80a-1, etseq.). To be eligible for investment pursuant to this subdivision these companies will either:
 - a. Attain the highest-ranking letter or numerical rating provided by not less than two of the three largest NRSRO or
 - b. Have an investment advisor registered or exempt from registration with the Securities and Exchange Commission with not less than five years' experience managing money market mutual funds and with assets under management in excess of \$500,000,000.

No more than 20% of the City's portfolio may be invested in money market funds.

- 14. Local Government Investment Pools (LGIPs). Shares of beneficial interest issued by a joint powers authority organized pursuant to Government Code Section 6509.7 that invests in the securities and obligations authorized in subdivisions (a) to (q) of Government Code Section 53601, inclusive. Each share will represent an equal proportional interest in the underlying pool of securities owned by the joint powers authority. To be eligible under this section, the joint powers authority issuing the shares will have retained an investment adviser that meets all of the following criteria:
 - a. The adviser is registered or exempt from registration with the Securities and Exchange Commission.
 - b. The adviser has not less than five years of experience investing in the securities and obligations authorized in subdivisions (a) to (q) California GovernmentCode Section 53601, inclusive.
 - The adviser has assets under management in excess of five hundred million dollars (\$500,000,000).
- 15. Supranationals. United States dollar denominated senior unsecured unsubordinated obligations issued or unconditionally guaranteed by the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development (IBRD), International Finance Corporation (IFC), or Inter-American Development Bank (IADB), with a maximum remaining maturity of five years or less, and eligible for purchase and sale within the United States. Investments under this subdivision must be rated in a rating category of "AA," its equivalent or better by a NRSRO. No more than 30% of the City's portfolio may be invested in supranationals.
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Investments not described herein, including but not limited to stocks, inverse floaters, range notes, mortgage-derived, interest-only strips, or any security that could result in zero interest accrual if held to maturity are prohibited for purchased by the City, except as authorized by California Government Code Section 53601.6. The City will not leverage or borrow money for the purpose of investing.

10. Local Investment

The City will strive to make investments that benefit the local area. Placing monies in local commercial banks is one method of promoting this goal. Deposits may be placed

11. Non-Discrimination

The City has an obligation to be aware of the social and political impacts of its investments and to act responsibly in making its investment decisions. The City will not knowingly make any investments in any institution, company, corporation, subsidiary or affiliate that practices or supports directly or indirectly through its actions, discrimination on the basis of race, religion, color, creed, national or ethnic origin, age, sex, sexual preference, or physical disability.

12. Review of Investment Portfolio

California Government Code requires compliance be measured only at the time of purchase. Balance fluctuations can cause sector and issuer percentages to rise above the limits described above and changes in the financial environment can cause ratings to fall below minimum requirements. While these situations do not constitute non-compliance, the City Treasurer will monitor for these situations and decide whether they warrant making changes to the portfolio. Instances of non-compliance will be reported to the City Council at least quarterly, if any arise.

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Collateralization is required for deposits. Deposits must be collateralized as specified under Government Code Section 53630, et seq. The City, at its discretion, may waive the collateralization requirements for any portion that is covered by federal deposit insurance. Funds may be deposited in active or inactive accounts, but may not exceed the total paid-up capital and surplus in any depository.

APPENDIX A GLOSSARY

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DELIVERY VERSUS PAYMENT: There are two methods of delivery of securities: delivery versus payment and delivery versus receipt. Delivery versus payment is delivery of securities with an exchange of money for the securities. Delivery versus receipt is delivery of securities with an exchange of a signed receipt for the securities.

DIVERSIFICATION: Dividing investment funds among a variety of securities offering independent returns.

DURATION: A measure of the sensitivity of the price (the value of principal) of a fixed-income investment to a change in interest rates. Duration is expressed as a number of years. Rising interest rates mean falling bond prices, while declining interest rates mean rising bond prices.

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PORTFOLIO: Collection of securities held by an investor.

APPENDIX A

PRIMARY DEALER: A group of government securities dealers who submit daily reports of market activity and positions and monthly financial statements to the Federal Reserve Bank of New York and are subject to its informal oversight. Primary dealers include Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC)-registered securities broker-dealers, banks, and a few unregulated firms.

RATE OF RETURN: The yield obtainable on a security based on its purchase price or its current market price. This may be the amortized yield to maturity on a bond the current income return.

SAFEKEEPING: A service to customers rendered by banks for a fee whereby securities and valuables of all types and descriptions are held in the bank's vaults for protection.

SECURITIES & EXCHANGE COMMISSION: Agency created by Congress to protect investors in securities transactions by administering securities legislation.

SEC RULE 15(C)3-1: See Uniform Net Capital Rule.

UNIFORM NET CAPITAL RULE: Securities and Exchange Commission requirement that member firms as well as nonmember broker-dealers in securities maintain a maximum ratio of indebtedness to liquid capital of 15 to 1; also called net capital rule and net capital ratio. Indebtedness covers all money owed to a firm, including margin loans and commitments to purchase securities, one reason new public issues are spread among members of underwriting syndicates. Liquid capital includes cash and assets easily converted into cash.

Investment Policy June 30, 2024

1. Policy

The intent of the Investment Policy of City of Santa Fe Springs is to define the parameters within which funds are to be managed. In methods, procedures and practices, the policy formalizes the framework for the City's investment activities that must be exercised to ensure effective and judicious fiscal and investment management of the City's funds. The guidelines are intended to be broad enough to allow the investment officer to function properly within the parameters of responsibility and authority, yet specific enough to adequately safeguard the investment assets.

The City will invest its funds in such a manner as to comply with applicable state laws (California Government Code Section 53600, et seq. and 53630, et seq.), ensure prudent money management, provide for daily cash flow needs, and meet the City's investment objectives.

2. Scope

The Investment Policy applies to all funds and investment activities of the City except for the investment of bond proceeds, which are governed by the appropriate bond documents, and any pension or other post-employment benefit funds held in a trust that has a separate investment policy.

Except for funds in certain restricted and special funds, the City commingles its funds to maximize investment earnings and to increase efficiencies with regard to investment pricing, safekeeping and administration.

3. Prudence

The standard of prudence to be used by those authorized to invest on behalf of the City will be the "prudent investor" standard and will be applied in the context of managing an overall portfolio. The "prudent investor" standard states that:

"When investing, reinvesting, purchasing, acquiring, exchanging, selling, or managing public funds, a trustee shall act with care, skill, prudence, and diligence under the circumstances then prevailing, including, but not limited to, the general economic conditions and the anticipated needs of the agency, that a prudent person acting in a like capacity and familiarity with those matters would use in the conduct of funds of a like character and with like aims, to safeguard the principal and maintain the liquidity needs of the agency."

4. Objectives

The primary objectives, in priority order, of the investment activities of the City are:

- 1. Safety Safety of principal is the foremost objective of the investment program. Investments will be undertaken in a manner that seeks to ensure preservation of capital in the portfolio.
- 2. Liquidity The investment portfolio will remain sufficiently liquid to enable the City to meet its cash flow requirements.
- 3. Return on Investment The investment portfolio will be designed with the objective of attaining a market rate of return throughout budgetary and economic cycles, taking into consideration with the investment risk constraints of safety and liquidity needs.

5. Delegation of Authority

The City Council's management responsibility for the investment program is hereby delegated for a one-year period to the City Treasurer. Subject to review, the City Council may renew the delegation of authority pursuant to this section each year. The City Treasurer, and the Treasurer's designees, will monitor and review all investments for consistency with this Investment Policy. The City Treasurer may delegate day-to-day investment decision making and execution authority to an investment advisor. Eligible investment advisors must be registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) under the Investment Advisors Act of 1940. The advisor will follow the Policy and such other written instructions as are provided.

6. Ethics and Conflict of Interest

Officers and employees involved in the investment process will refrain from personal business activities that could conflict with proper execution of the investment program, or which could impair their ability to make impartial decisions. Employees and investment officials will disclose to the City Manager any material financial interests in financial institutions that conduct business within their jurisdiction, and they will further disclose any large personal financial/investment positions that could be related to the performance of the City's portfolio.

7. Authorized Financial Dealers and Institutions

The City Treasurer will maintain a list of financial dealers and institutions qualified and authorized to transact business with the City.

The purchase by the City of any investment other than those purchased directly from the issuer, will be purchased either from an institution licensed by the State as a broker-dealer, as defined in Section 25004 of the Corporations Code, who is a member of Financial Industry Regulatory Authority (FINRA), or a member of a Federally regulated securities exchange, a National or State Chartered Bank a Federal or State Association (as defined by Section 5102 of the Financial Code), or a brokerage firm designated as a Primary Government Dealer by the Federal Reserve Bank.

The City Treasurer will investigate all institutions that wish to do business with the City, in order to determine if they are adequately capitalized, make markets in securities appropriate to the City's needs, and agree to abide by the conditions set forth in the City's Investment Policy and any other guidelines that may be provided. This

will be done annually by having the financial institutions submit in writing that they have read and will abide by the City's Investment Policy and submit its most recent audited Financial Statement within 120 days of the institution's fiscal year end.

If the City has an investment advisor, the investment advisor may use its own list of authorized broker/dealers to conduct transactions on behalf of the City.

Purchase and sale of securities will be made on the basis of competitive bids and offers with a minimum of three quotes being obtained, whenever possible.

8. Authorized and Suitable Investment

The City will limit investments in any one issuer, except U.S. Treasuries, Federal Agencies, supranationals, and pooled funds (i.e., money market funds, local government investment pools, and LAIF), to no more than 5% regardless of security type. An investment's term to maturity at purchase is measured from the investment's settlement date to its final maturity.

Where this section specifies a percentage limitation for a particular security type, that percentage is applicable only at the date of purchase. Credit criteria listed in this section refers to the credit rating category (inclusive of modifiers) at the time the security is purchased. If an investment's credit rating falls below the minimum rating required at the time of purchase, the City Treasurer will perform a timely review and decide whether to sell or hold the investment.

- 1. **U.S. Treasuries.** United States Treasury notes, bonds, bills, or certificates of indebtedness, or those for which the full faith and credit of the United States are pledged for the payment of principal and interest.
- 2. **U.S. Agency Obligations.** Federal agency or United States government-sponsored enterprise obligations, participations, or other instruments, including those issued by or fully guaranteed as to principal and interest by federal agencies or United States government-sponsored enterprises.
- 3. California State and Local Agency Obligations. Obligations of the State of California or any local agency within the state, including bonds payable solely out of revenues from a revenue producing property owned, controlled or operated by the state or any local agency or by a department, board, agency or authority of the state or any local agency. Obligations eligible for investment under this subdivision with maturities in excess of one year must be rated in a rating category of "A," its equivalent, or better by a nationally recognized statistical rating organization (NRSRO). Obligations eligible for investment under this subdivision with maturities under one year must be rated in a rating category of "A-1," its equivalent, or better by a NRSRO. No more than 30% of the City's portfolio may be invested in municipal obligations (includes 4. Other State Obligations).
- 4. Other State Obligations. Registered treasury notes or bonds of any of the other 49 United States in addition to California, including bonds payable solely out of the revenues from a revenue-producing property owned, controlled, or operated by a state or by a department, board, agency, or authority of any of the other 49 United States, in addition to California. Obligations eligible for investment under this subdivision with maturities in excess of one year must be rated in a rating category of "A," its equivalent, or better by a NRSRO. Obligations eligible for investment under this subdivision with maturities under one year

must be rated in a rating category "A-1," its equivalent, or better by a NRSRO. No more than 30% of the City's portfolio may be invested in municipal obligations (includes 3. California State and Local Agency Obligations).

- 5. **Bankers' Acceptances**. Purchases of bankers' acceptances will have a maximum maturity of 180 days. No more than 40% of the City's portfolio may be invested in bankers' acceptances. Eligible bankers' acceptances must be rated in a rating category of "A-1," its equivalent, or better by a NRSRO.
- 6. **Commercial Paper**. Commercial paper of "prime" quality of the highest ranking or of the highest letter and number rating as provided for by a NRSRO. The entity that issues the commercial paper will meet all of the following conditions in either paragraph a or paragraph b:
 - a. The entity meets the following criteria: (i) Is organized and operating in the United States as a general corporation. (ii) Has total assets in excess of five hundred million dollars (\$500,000,000). (iii) Has debt other than commercial paper, if any, that is rated in a rating category of "A," its equivalent or higher by a NRSRO.
 - b. The entity meets the following criteria: (i) Is organized within the United States as a special purpose corporation, trust, or limited liability company. (ii) Has program wide credit enhancements including, but not limited to, over collateralization, letters of credit, or surety bond. (iii) Has commercial paper that is rated in a rating category of "A-1," its equivalent or higher, or the equivalent, by a NRSRO.

Eligible commercial paper will have a maximum maturity of 270 days or less. No more than 25% of the City's portfolio may be invested in commercial paper.

- 7. **Medium-Term Notes.** Medium-term notes, defined as all corporate and depository institution debt securities with a maximum remaining maturity of five years or less, issued by corporations organized and operating within the United States or by depository institutions licensed by the U.S. or any state, and operating within the U.S. Medium-term notes must be rated in a rating category of "A," its equivalent, or better by a NRSRO. No more than 30% of the City's portfolio may be invested in medium-term notes.
- 8. **Bank Deposits.** FDIC-insured or fully collateralized demand deposit accounts, savings accounts, market rate accounts, time certificates of deposits ("TCDs") and other types of bank deposits in a state or national bank, savings association or federal association, federal or state credit union in California. The amount on deposit in any financial institution shall not exceed the shareholder's equity. In accordance with California Government Code Section 53635.2, to be eligible to receive City deposits, a financial institution will have received an overall rating of not less than "satisfactory" in its most recent evaluation by the appropriate federal financial supervisory agency of its record of meeting the credit needs of California's communities. The City will have a signed agreement with any depository accepting City funds per Government Code Section 53649.

The maturity of TCDs may not exceed three years. No more than 30% of the City's portfolio may be invested in TCDs.

9. **Deposit Placement Services.** The City may invest a portion of its portfolio in deposits at a commercial bank, savings bank, savings and loan association, or credit union in the State of California (the selected depository) that uses a private sector entity that assists in the placement of deposits in the United States. The full amount of each deposit placed and the interest that may accrue on each such deposit will at all times be insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) or the National Credit Union Administration. Additional required criteria for this investment type can be found in California Government Code Section 53601.8.

No more than 30% of the City's investment portfolio may be invested in deposit placement service deposits. No more than 10% of the City's portfolio may be invested with any one selected depository for placement services.

The City will monitor the financial institutions selected by deposit placement services to ensure that the City does not deposit more than the amount eligible for FDIC insurance in a single financial institution through non-negotiable CDs and deposit placement services.

- 10. **Negotiable Certificates of Deposit.** Negotiable certificates of deposit issued by a nationally or state-chartered bank, a savings association or a federal association (as defined by Section 5102 of the Financial Code), a state or federal credit union, or by a federally- or state-licensed branch of a foreign bank. Eligible negotiable CDs with maturities in excess of one year must be rated in a rating category of "A," its equivalent, or better by a NRSRO. Eligible negotiable CDs with maturities under one year must be rated in a rating category of "A-1," its equivalent, or better by a NRSRO. No more than 30% of the City's investment portfolio may be invested in negotiable CDs.

RECOMMENDATION(S):

It is recommended that the City Council:

- Find and determine that the Ordinance is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to CEQA Guidelines Section 15061(b)(3); and
- Waive further reading and introduce Ordinance No. 1142 by title, amending Chapter 154 (Subdivisions) of Title 15 (Land Use) of the Santa Fe Springs Municipal Code; and
- 3) Take such additional, related, action that may be desirable.

FISCAL IMPACT

Amending the written language of the Santa Fe Springs Municipal Code will not have a fiscal impact.

BACKGROUND

Amendments to Chapter 154 (Subdivisions)

Currently, the Santa Fe Springs Municipal Code is silent on the procedures for processing lot line adjustments, lot consolidations and lot mergers/unmergers. Staff recommends the proposed Ordinance (Attachment A, Exhibit A) to define and identify those procedure:

- Section 154.20 is a new section that defines a lot line adjustment, a lot consolidation, a lot merger, and a lot unmerger.
- Section 154.21 is a new section to establish the application procedures for the previously mentioned subdivision maps.
- Section 154.22 is a new section that outlines the steps to finalize and record the previously mentioned subdivision maps.

ANALYSIS

The proposed Ordinance will create local standards for the processing of lot line adjustments, lot consolidations, lot mergers, and lot unmergers. This Ordinance aims to streamline the process of modifying property lines between adjacent lots, ensuring efficient land utilization while adhering to State Laws.

ENVIRONMENTAL

This Ordinance is exempt from CEQA pursuant to the common sense CEQA exemption (CEQA Guidelines Section 15061(b)(3)) which provides that CEQA applies only to projects which have the potential to have a "significant effect on the environment," as defined in Public Resources Code Section 21068 and in CEQA Guidelines Section 15382. The amendments to the City's Municipal Code will not have a significant effect on the environment.

SUMMARY

Staff is recommending that the City Council approve and adopt Ordinance No. 1142 to effectuate the proposed amendments to the text of the City's Municipal Code and determine that the Ordinance is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to CEQA Guidelines Section 15061(b)(3).

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SANTA FE SPRINGS AMENDING CHAPTER 154 (SUBDIVISIONS) OF TITLE 15 (LAND USE) OF THE SANTA FE SPRINGS MUNCIPAL CODE TO DEFINE AND ESTABLISH PROCEDURES RELATED TO LOT LINE ADJUSTMENTS, LOT CONSOLIDATIONS, AND LOT MERGERS/UNMERGERS

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SANTA FE SPRINGS DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. Findings:

- 1. The Exhibits attached to this Ordinance are each incorporated by reference and made a part of this Ordinance.
- 2. This Ordinance creates local standards for the processing of lot line adjustments, lot consolidations, lot mergers, and lot unmergers. This Ordinance aims to streamline the process of modifying property lines between adjacent lots, ensuring efficient land utilization while adhering to State Laws.
- 3. This Ordinance follows the standards, procedures and requirements contained in California Government Code sections 66410 to 66499.58 (Subdivision Map Act) regarding lot line adjustments, lot consolidations, lot mergers, and lot unmergers.

SECTION 2. Amendments:

Chapter 154 (Subdivisions) of Title 15 (Land Use) of the Santa Fe Springs Municipal Code is hereby amended as provided in Exhibit "A" attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference.

<u>SECTION 3</u>. Environmental Findings and Determination:

This Ordinance is exempt from CEQA because it falls within the common sense exemption, pursuant to CEQA Guidelines Section 15061(b)(3), which indicates that CEQA only applies to projects that have a "significant effect on the environment" as defined in Public Resources Code Section 21068 and in CEQA Guidelines Section 15382. These changes will not have a significant effect on the environment.

<u>Section 4</u>. If any section, subsection, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase in this Ordinance, or any part thereof, is held invalid or unconstitutional, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining sections or portions of this Ordinance or of Chapter 154, or any part thereof. The City Council hereby declares that it would have adopted each section, subsection, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase in

this Ordinance irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, subdivisions, paragraphs, sentences, clauses or phrases may be declared invalid or unconstitutional.

<u>Section 5.</u> The City Clerk shall certify to the passage and adoption of this ordinance and shall cause the same to be published in the same manner required by law. This ordinance shall become effective thirty (30) days from and after its passage.

Exhibit A – Amendments to Chapter 154 (Subdivisions) of Title 15 (Land Use) of the Santa Fe Springs Municipal Code

Code of Ordinances of the City of Santa Fe Springs Chapter 154, Section 154.20 LOT LINE ADJUSTMENT, LOT CONSOLIDATION, AND LOT MERGER/UNMERGER is hereby added as follows:

§ 154.20 LOT LINE ADJUSTMENT, LOT CONSOLIDATION AND LOT MERGER/UNMERGER.

- (A) A lot line adjustment is an adjustment between four or fewer adjoining parcels, where the land taken from one parcel is added to an adjoining parcel and where no additional parcels are created. Lot line adjustments may be used to merge four or fewer adjoining lots into a fewer number of lots. Except as otherwise specified in this Chapter 154, a lot line adjustment shall conform to the provisions of this section and shall be processed as provided for herein.
- (B) A lot consolidation is the consolidation of any number of existing contiguous parcels into one parcel provided that no new street is created and no existing street or public service easement is extinguished. No tentative map, parcel map or final map shall be required as a condition to the approval of a lot consolidation. The lot consolidation shall be reflected in a deed, which shall be recorded. No record of survey shall be required for a lot consolidation unless required by Section 8762 of the Business and Professions Code (California Government Code § 66412 (d)).
- (C) A lot merger is the merger of two or more contiguous parcels under one ownership into one or more parcels so as to comply with parcel size and zoning standards. All procedures and processes associated with the merging of lots shall be done in compliance with the applicable sections of the Subdivision Map Act of the State of California.
- (D) A lot unmerger is the ability to unmerge lots previously merged. All procedures and processes associated with the unmerging of lots shall be done in compliance with the applicable sections of the Subdivision Map Act of the State of California.

Code of Ordinances of the City of Santa Fe Springs Chapter 154, Section 154.21 APPLICATION PROCEDURES FOR LOT LINE ADJUSTMENT, LOT CONSOLIDATION, OR LOT MERGER/UNMERGER is hereby added as follows:

§ 154.21 APPLICATION PROCEDURES FOR LOT LINE ADJUSTMENT, LOT CONSOLIDATION OR LOT MERGER/UNMERGER.

(A) An application for a lot line adjustment, lot consolidation, or lot merger/unmerger shall be filed with the Community Development Department. Such application shall include:

- (1) Proof that the lots involved have been legally created;
- (2) A plot plan indicating existing lot dimensions and the location of existing structures, utilities, infrastructure and easements;
- (3) Deeds suitable for recording showing the proposed new lot configurations and if required by Business and Professions Code section 8762, a record of survey;
- (4) Any other information necessary to determine whether the proposed adjustment will conform with zoning and building codes; and
- (5) A fee in an amount to be determined by resolution of the City Council for the purpose of defraying costs to process the request.
- (B) The Community Development Director, or designee, shall act upon the application within 60 days from the date that the environmental documentation is completed or the determination is made that the project is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act.
- (C) The Community Development Director, or designee, shall approve or conditionally approve the application in writing after investigation and receipt of reports from other departments, if it is found that the proposed application conforms to all of the following requirements:
 - (1) Does not create an additional lot;
- (2) The resulting parcels conform to the City's General Plan, Zoning, and Building Codes:
 - (3) Does not cut off any lot from frontage on a public street or alley;
- (4) Does not cut off any lot from access to a public utility or easement, or create a need for a new utility or easement, other than relocation of existing utilities or easements:
- (5) Does not cause the need for a new or extended public street or easement other than relocation of an existing street easement;
- (6) Does not cause the need for any new infrastructure, other than the relocation of existing infrastructure;
- (7) Does not cause an existing building or structure located on the parcels to be in violation of the City's General Plan, Zoning, or Building Codes;
- (8) Complies with requirements as to area, easements, utilities, improvement, design, floodwater drainage, sanitary disposal facilities and water supply availability.

Code of Ordinances of the City of Santa Fe Springs Chapter 154, Section 154.22 FINALIZATION OF LOT LINE ADJUSTMENT, LOT CONSOLIDATION, OR LOT MERGER/UNMERGER is hereby added as follows:

§ 154.22 FINALIZATION OF LOT LINE ADJUSTMENT, LOT CONSOLIDATION OR LOT MERGER/UNMERGER.

- (A) Issuance of Certificate of Compliance. The approval of the lot line adjustment, consolidation, or merger/unmerger shall be evidenced by the issuance of a Certificate of Compliance and recordation of grant deeds reflecting the newly configured parcels. The property description or descriptions on the Certificate of Compliance shall describe the reconfigured parcel or parcels which will be recognized by the City as legal lots.
- (B) Recordation of Certificate of Compliance. The Certificate of Compliance, all deeds and other documents approved by the City shall be signed by the appropriate parties and notarized in accordance with applicable law. The recordation of the Certificate of Compliance shall be immediately followed by the recordation of the required deeds exchanging property between the affected parcels or consolidating the affected parcels and any necessary reconveyances or partial reconveyances or other documents to ensure that any deed of trust or similar encumbrance now describes the reconfigured parcel or parcels.
- (C) Recordation of deeds and other documents. Concurrently with the recordation of the Certificate of Compliance, all deeds exchanging property between the affected parcels or consolidating the affected parcels accompanied by reconveyances or partial reconveyances or other releases of deeds of trust or similar encumbrances on the subject property or amended deeds of trust or similar encumbrances describing the reconfigured parcels shall be submitted to the City for review and approval. The applicant shall be notified of any corrections requested by the City, and any corrected or new documents shall be promptly submitted to the City.
- (D) Payment of recording fees. The fees for the recording of all documents as established by the Office of the County Recorder of Los Angeles County shall be remitted by the applicant to the County Recorder at the time of recordation of such documents including the Certificate of Compliance, deeds and related documents.
- (E) Failure to submit required deeds and documents within one year or within the time permitted by an approved time extension. In the event the Certificate of Compliance or any deed, reconveyance or other document required for the finalization of the approved lot line adjustment, lot consolidation or lot merger/unmerger is not submitted to the County Recorder for recordation within one year following the effective date of the approval of such, or within the time permitted by an approved time extension (Section 154.08 parcel map extension), the Certificate of Compliance shall be void and of no further force and effect and shall not be recorded. If the applicant still wishes to proceed with the lot line adjustment, consolidation or merger/unmerger, a new application must be submitted in accordance with the provisions of this Chapter.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council:

- 1) Pursuant to Santa Fe Springs Municipal Code Section 34.23 and California Public Contract Code Section 22050, by a four-fifths vote authorize continuing the repairs without competitive bidding; and
- 2) Take such additional, related, action that may be desirable.

FISCAL IMPACT

Although the extent of the storm damage has been assessed, the total cost of the repair is not known at this time. Staff continues to solicit contractor proposals to complete the repair work as needed and as more information is gathered with respect to the needed repairs. The purchase orders executed to date are listed below. Staff will report at a future City Council meeting as further information develops and the complete scope of the repairs is determined and priced.

Expenses encumbered to date related to this emergency repair include:

- **Purchase Order #2240222:** \$43,610.60 for testing and construction demolition with Restoration Unlimited (Santa Fe Springs, CA)
- Purchase Order #2240262: \$115,680 for waterproofing with Innovative Painting & Waterproofing (Santa Fe Springs, CA)

 Purchase Order #2240337: \$45,985.38 for replacement of drywall, flooring and other finishes and furniture in order to restore the building interior with Restoration Unlimited (Santa Fe Springs, CA)

BACKGROUND

The severe storms that hit Southern California the week of February 4, 2024, resulted in historic rainfall totals throughout the region, prompting Governor Newsom to proclaim a state of emergency in various counties, including Los Angeles. The County of Los Angeles followed with the proclamation of a local state of emergency.

The intense and prolonged rainfall caused significant flooding of the City's Police Services Staging Facility located adjacent to the Municipal Services Yard. Flooding was experienced in both the Men's and Women's Locker Rooms and Restroom/Showers as well as the adjacent gym. The flooding rendered these areas uninhabitable and in need of repairs before the space can be reoccupied.

Public Works maintenance staff worked throughout the storms to sweep and vacuum the water to minimize the extent of the flooding, but were ultimately unable to keep up with the volume of water entering the building from the rear wall adjacent to the railroad right-of-way. Eventually, maintenance crews ceased water removal and began removing gym equipment and mats so that the source of the flooding could be more easily identified.

Although one location was identified where the majority of the water was entering the building, the extent of the flooding has saturated the walls in a significant portion of the facility. Under the City Manager's authority pursuant to Santa Fe Springs Municipal Code Section 34.23, staff continues to negotiate with contractors to provide various services to repair the damage.

The first step in the repair process required demolition work to assess the full extent of the damage and expose the source of the flooding in order to develop a scope of work for repairs to prevent future flooding and restore the damaged interior.

Staff contracted with Restoration Unlimited (Santa Fe Springs, CA) for the initial testing and demolition work. Sampling for preconstruction testing was conducted on March 6. Based on testing results, demolition was started on March 18, exposing the likely source of the rainwater intrusion. Staff solicited proposals from two waterproofing contractors. Waterproofing must be completed before restoration work to prevent further water damage. The proposal from Innovative Painting & Waterproofing, LLC (Santa Fe Springs) was selected and a purchase order was executed. The interior waterproofing work was completed on June 12.

A Right-of-Entry permit is required from BNSF Rail Road in order to complete the waterproofing work on the exterior rear wall of the building. The permit application was submitted on April 23 and BNSF provided the Right-of-Entry Agreement on May 21 with

final approval of insurance documentation received on June 12. Staff is currently scheduling the start of the exterior waterproofing work with BNSF. This work it is anticipated to begin in mid to late July and will take two weeks to complete.

Staff contracted with Restoration Unlimited (Santa Fe Springs, CA) for the restoration of the interior of the building. This work is scheduled to begin on June 24 and anticipated to be completed by the end of July. The building will be available for police staff to move in in August.

ENVIRONMENTAL

Not applicable.

DISCUSSION

Staff has been in close communication with the City Manager of the City of Whittier and police administration since the flooding began. Given the extent of the flooding, the City of Whittier provided notice on February 7, 2024, that they would temporarily vacate the facility until permanent repairs are completed. Limited staff and equipment was temporarily relocated to the City's Police Services Building on Jersey Avenue and the majority of the patrol operations were moved to the Whittier Police Station. The Police Staging building was vacated on February 26, 2024.

Repairs are currently estimated to be completed by the end of July. It should also be noted that this assumes all repairs are completed as an emergency, without competitive bidding. Competitive bidding would require the solicitation of services by an architect to develop plans and specifications. The solicitation process and the time to develop documents could add an additional 9 to 12 months to the schedule.

SUMMARY/NEXT STEPS

Upon the approval of the City Council of the recommended actions, City staff will continue to coordinate the emergency repairs of the facility. Pursuant to the Public Contract Code Section 22050, staff will provide updated reports at subsequent City Council meetings as the situation develops, more information is gathered, and a plan of action for the repairs is determined and scheduled.

The project is estimated to close with a surplus of approximately \$110,000.00. Surplus funds will be available to reprogram for other capital improvement projects.

The payment detail (Attachment A) represents the Final Payment (less 5% Retention) due, per the terms of the contract, for the work that has been completed and found to be satisfactory. The retention will be released following the mandatory waiting period following the filing of the Notice of Completion with the LA County Registrar-Recorder.

BACKGROUND

At the June 20, 2023 Capital Improvement Plan Subcommittee meeting, staff was requested to review the existing condition of the parking lot at the Clarke Estate and assess a possible pavement improvement plan.

Upon evaluating the parking lot, staff generated a project scope of work to give the existing parking lot a new revitalized appearance. The project scope of work included the removal and replacement of two (2) inches of the entire asphalt pavement parking lot, slurry sealing the driveway entrance from Pioneer Boulevard to the entry gate, removal/replacement of damaged concrete curbs, new parking lot striping and new traffic loop detectors located at the entry gate.

At the October 17, 2023 City Council Meeting, the City Council approved adding the Clarke Estate Parking Lot Paving Improvements Project to the Capital Improvement Plan, appropriated \$300,000 from the Utility Users Tax (UUT) Capital Improvement Plan Fund to the project, approved project specifications and authorized the City Engineer to advertise for construction bids.

On January 11, 2024, the City Council approved the award of a contract to Prestige Paving Company, Inc. in the amount of \$129,197.81 for the construction of the Clarke Estate Parking Lot Paving Improvements project. Construction was completed and staff authorized change orders in the aggregate amount of \$24,498. The authorized change orders were due to unforeseen conditions and additional scope, including adding an asphalt seal coat to the surface for a smoother finished surface. The final contract amount is \$153,756.86, which includes adjustments for final quantities for unit-priced items as measured during construction.

DISCUSSION

The completion of the Clark Estate Parking Lot Improvements project renewed the service life of the pavement and hardscape, and will help reduce maintenance repair costs for the City.

SUMMARY/NEXT STEPS

Upon the approval of the City Council of the recommended actions, the Public Works Department will coordinate with the Finance Department to issue a final payment to Prestige Paving Company and proceed to close the project. The Public Works Department will then file the Notice of Completion with the LA County Registrar-Recorder as a part of the project closure. Following the mandatory waiting period after the filing of the Notice of Completion, Public Works will work with the Finance Department to release the retention payment.

FISCAL IMPACT

The Shoemaker Avenue (Los Nietos Road to Cul-de-sac) and Broadway Avenue (550' South of Washington Boulevard) Street Improvement projects are approved Capital Improvement Program (CIP) projects funded with Redevelopment Project Tax Allocation Bond funds with an original budget of \$505,000 (Account No. PW220503) and \$325,000 (Account No. PW230504), respectively. The combined project budget is \$830,000. The

BACKGROUND

The subject street improvement projects are located on Shoemaker Avenue from Los Nietos Road to the end of the cul-de-sac and Broadway Avenue from Washington Boulevard to the southern city boundary (approximately 550 Feet). The Shoemaker Avenue scope of work consists of the removal of eleven inches of existing asphalt and base and the placement of fiber-reinforced asphalt concrete pavement over a cement-treated base. The Broadway Avenue scope of work consists of the removal of three inches of existing asphalt pavement and the placement of fiber-reinforced asphalt concrete pavement. Additionally, the project includes the removal and replacement of curb & gutter, sidewalks, curb ramps, and driveways, as needed. The new paving sections will support heavy repetitive traffic and increase pavement service life.

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Shoemaker Avenue and Broadway Avenue Street Improvement Project – Award of Contract

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To maximize economies of scale, both street projects went out to bid as a single project, so that one Contractor would complete them concurrently.

ANALYSIS

On April 16, 2024, the City Council authorized the advertisement for construction bids for the subject projects. The solicitation for construction bids was advertised on April 22, 2024 in accordance with the California Public Contract Code.

Bids were opened on May 30, 2024, and a total of seven bids were received. Per the project specifications, each Contractor's bid was based on the combination of both street cost proposals. City Staff reviewed the proposals and determined that all bid proposals comply with the project specifications. The apparent low bidder for the project was Sequel Contractors, Inc., of Santa Fe Springs, CA with a bid totaling \$807,165. The tabulated bid results are as follows:

The bid proposal submitted by Sequel Contractors, Inc., in the amount of \$807,165, is approximately 28% below the Engineer's Construction Estimate of \$1,116,500 and is acceptable.

The Department of Public Works has reviewed the bids and determined the low bid submitted by Sequel Contractors, Inc. to be responsive and responsible.

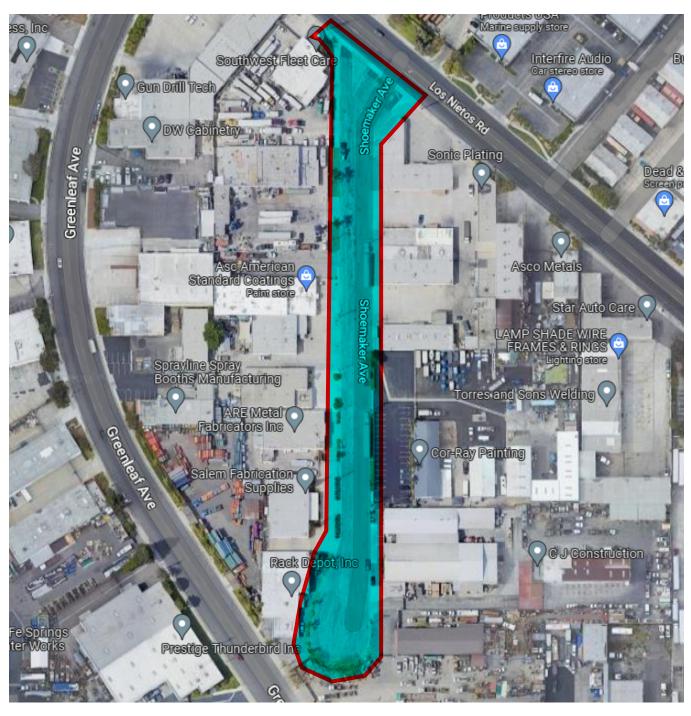

CONTRACTOR'S NAME

This Agreement for Construction ("Agreement") is entered into on this 16th day of July 2024, by and between the CITY OF SANTA FE SPRINGS, a California municipal corporation ("City") and SEQUEL CONTRACTORS, INC. a California Corporation, 13546 Imperial Highway, Santa Fe Springs, CA 90670, State Contractor's License No. 610600, ("Contractor"). Hereinafter, the City and the Contractor may be referred to collectively as the "Parties." The Parties mutually agree as follows: Contractor shall furnish all labor, equipment and materials for, and perform the work which is covered in the Contractor's Bid Proposal (the "Work), in accordance with the provisions and requirements in the Contract Documents as defined by this Agreement.

ARTICLE 1 – CONTRACT DOCUMENTS

- 1.1 <u>Definitions.</u> The meanings of all capitalized terms used herein and in the Contract Documents and not otherwise defined in this document shall be the same as those definitions set forth in the General and Standard Specifications and Special Provisions.
- 1.2 **Contract Documents.** The "Contract Documents," except for Modifications issued after execution of this Agreement, consist of the following documents, all of which are either attached hereto as exhibits or are incorporated herein by this reference, are intended to be correlative and constitute Contractor's performance obligations:
 - a. Permits from the City's Building, Planning, and Public Works Departments and similar Governmental Approvals for the Work required by applicable law.
 - b. Change Orders and other Modifications issued after execution of the Agreement.
 - c. This Agreement, as signed by the Parties, including the following exhibit, and Certificates of Insurance and Additional insured endorsements for Contractor:

d. Addenda with later Addenda having priority over earlier Addenda issued in connection with the Notice Inviting Bids, as follows:

Addendum No. 1, issued May 16, 2024, 2 pages.

e. Contractors Bid Proposal, for the above-referenced Bid No. CB No. 2024-01 (comprised of Notice Inviting Bids, Instructions to Bidders and attachments, Bid Schedule of Prices, List of Subcontractors, Proposal, Signature

- Certification/Authorization, Bid Guaranty, and where applicable, Contractor Qualification Statement and/or Subcontractor Qualification Statement.
- f. Special Provisions, General Specifications and Standard Specifications.
- g. City and other agency's Standard Drawings.
- h. All documents, maps, texts and items referred to in the foregoing documents.
- 1.3 <u>Interpretation</u>. In the event of any conflict between any of the Contract Documents, the document highest in the order of precedent shall control. The order of precedent shall be the same as that set forth in the 2018 Edition of the Standard Specifications for Public Works Construction, unless otherwise revised in the Special Provisions.
- 1.4 Entire Agreement. This Agreement together with all other Contract Documents represents the entire and integrated agreement between City and Contractor and supersedes any prior written or oral agreements between them concerning the subject matter contained in the Contract Documents. There are no representations, agreements, arrangements or understandings, oral or written, between the Parties hereto, relating to the subject matter contained in the Contract Documents, which are not fully expressed herein.

ARTICLE 2 - SERVICES OF CONTRACTOR

- 2.1 **Scope of Services.** In compliance with all terms and conditions of this Agreement, the Contractor shall provide those services specified in the Contract Documents, which services may be referred to herein as the "Services" or "Work" hereunder. As a material inducement to the City entering into this Agreement, Contractor represents and warrants that Contractor is a provider of first class work and services and Contractor is experienced in performing the work and services contemplated herein and, in light of such status and experience, Contractor covenants that it shall follow the highest professional standards in performing the work and services required hereunder and that all materials will be of good quality, fit for the purpose intended. Further, Contractor represents that it is knowledgeable and experienced in constructing improvements that are compliant with all applicable accessibility requirements and warrants that all work performed under this agreement will comply with all applicable accessibility requirements.
- 2.2 **Compliance with Law.** All services rendered hereunder shall be provided in accordance with all ordinances, resolutions, statutes, rules, and regulations of the City and any Federal, State or local governmental having jurisdiction in effect at the time service is rendered, including but not limited to, all applicable accessibility requirements.
- 2.3 Licenses, Permits, Fees and Assessments. Contractor shall obtain at its sole cost and expense such licenses, permits and approvals as may be required by law for the performance of the services required by this Agreement, including registration with the Department of Industrial Relations of the State of California as required by Labor Code Section 1725.5 before commencing performance under this Agreement. Contractor shall have the sole obligation to pay for any fees, assessments and taxes, plus applicable penalties and interest, which may be imposed by law and arise from or are necessary for the Contractor's performance of the services required by this Agreement, and shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless City against any such fees,

assessments, taxes penalties or interest levied, assessed or imposed against City hereunder. Contractor shall be responsible for all subcontractors' compliance with this Section 2.3.

- 2.4 **Familiarity with Work.** By executing this Contract, Contractor warrants that Contractor (a) has thoroughly investigated and considered the scope of services to be performed, including the requirement that the facilities being constructed must comply with all applicable accessibility requirements, (b) has carefully considered how the services should be performed, and (c) fully understands the facilities, difficulties and restrictions attending performance of the services under this Agreement. If the services involve work upon any site, Contractor warrants that Contractor has or will investigate the site and is or will be fully acquainted with the conditions there existing, prior to commencement of services hereunder. Should Contractor discover any latent or unknown conditions, which will materially affect the performance of the services hereunder, Contractor shall immediately inform the City of such fact and shall not proceed except at Contractor's risk until written instructions are received from the City.
- 2.5 **Standard of Performance.** Contractor, its subcontractors and their employees, in the performance of Contractor's work under this Agreement shall be responsible for exercising the degree of skill and care required by customarily accepted good professional practices and procedures used in the Contractor's field. Any costs for failure to meet the foregoing standard or to correct otherwise defective work that requires re-performance of the work, shall be borne in total by the Contractor and not by the City. The failure of a project to achieve the performance goals and objectives stated in this Agreement is not a basis for requesting re-performance unless the work conducted by Contractor and/or its subcontractors is deemed by the City to have failed the foregoing standard of performance.

In the event Contractor fails to perform in accordance with the above standard:

- 2.51. Contractor will re-perform, at its own expense, any task which was not performed to the reasonable satisfaction of City. Any work re-performed pursuant to this paragraph shall be completed within the time limitations originally set forth for the specific task involved. Contractor shall work any overtime required to meet the deadline for the task at no additional cost to the City;
- 2.5.2. The City shall provide a new schedule for the re-performance of any task pursuant to this paragraph in the event that re-performance of a task within the original time limitations is not feasible; and
- 2.5.3. The City shall have the option to direct Contractor not to re-perform any task which was not performed to the reasonable satisfaction of the City Manager pursuant to application of subsections 1 and 2 above. In the event the City directs Contractor not to re-perform a task, the City shall negotiate a reasonable settlement for satisfactory work performed. No previous payment shall be considered a waiver of the City's right to reimbursement.

Nothing contained in this section is intended to limit any of the rights or remedies which the City may have under law.

- 2.6 **Care of Work.** Contractor shall adopt reasonable methods during the life of the Agreement to furnish continuous protection to the work, and the equipment, materials, papers, documents, plans, studies and/or other components thereof to prevent losses or damages, and shall be responsible for all such damages, to persons or property, until acceptance of the work by City, except such losses or damages as may be caused by City's own negligence.
- 2.7 **Further Responsibilities of Parties.** Both parties agree to use reasonable care and diligence to perform their respective obligations under this Agreement. Both parties agree to act in good faith to execute all instruments, prepare all documents and take all actions as may be reasonably necessary to carry out the purposes of this Agreement. Unless hereafter specified, neither party shall be responsible for the service of the other. Contractor shall require all subcontractors to comply with the provisions of this Agreement.
- 2.8 **Trenches or Excavations.** Pursuant to California Public Contract Code Section 7104, in the event the work included in this Agreement requires excavations more than four (4) feet in depth, the following shall apply:
 - a. Contractor shall promptly, and before the following conditions are disturbed, notify City, in writing, of any: (1) material that Contractor believes may be material that is hazardous waste, as defined in Section 25117 of the Health and Safety Code, that is required to be removed to a Class I, Class II, or Class III disposal site in accordance with provisions of existing law; (2) Subsurface or latent physical conditions at the site different from those indicated; or (3) Unknown physical conditions at the site of any unusual nature, different materially from those ordinarily encountered and generally recognized as inherent in work of the character provided for in the contract.
 - b. City shall promptly investigate the conditions, and if it finds that the conditions do materially so differ, or do involve hazardous waste, and cause a decrease or increase in Contractor's cost of, or the time required for, performance of any part of the work shall issue a change order per Section 3.4 of this Agreement.
 - c. That, in the event that a dispute arises between City and Contractor whether the conditions materially differ, or involve hazardous waste, or cause a decrease or increase in Contractor's cost of, or time required for, performance of any part of the work, Contractor shall not be excused from any scheduled completion date provided for by the contract, but shall proceed with all work to be performed under the contract. Contractor shall retain any and all rights provided either by contract or by law, which pertain to the resolution of disputes and protests between the contracting parties.
- 2.9 **Utility Relocation.** City is responsible for removal, relocation, or protection of existing main or trunk line utilities to the extent such utilities were not identified in the invitation for bids or specifications. City shall reimburse contractor for any costs incurred in locating, repairing damage not caused by contractor and removing or relocating such unidentified utility facilities, including equipment idled during such work. Contractor shall not be assessed liquidated damages for delay arising from the removal or relocation of such unidentified utility facilities.

ARTICLE 3 – CONTRACT PRICE AND PAYMENT

3.1 **Contract Price.** City shall pay Contractor the Contract Price of Eight Hundred Seven Thousand One Hundred Sixty-Five Dollars (\$807,165) which includes all California sales or use tax and County and City taxes, in consideration for the Contractor's full, complete and timely performance of all of the Work required by the Contract Documents. The Contract Price includes any Alternative/Additive Bid Items which were awarded with the Contract.

Contractors agree to allocate the use tax derived from contracts or subcontracts of \$5 million or more directly to the job site location by obtaining a sub-permit of the Contractor's seller's permit for the jobsite and allocating the local tax to the jobsite address on the appropriate schedule of the applicable sales tax returns. Contractor shall provide City with proof of such filing prior to City's issuance of the Notice to Proceed.

- 3.2 **Substitution of Securities.** In accordance with Section 22300 of the California Public Contract Code, Contractor may substitute securities for any monies withheld by the City to ensure performance of the Contract. Such substitution shall be made at the request and expense of Contractor. Securities equivalent to the amount withheld may be deposited with the City or with a state or federally chartered bank as escrow agent. Securities eligible for substitution shall include those listed in Section 16430 of the Government Code, bank or saving and loan certificates of deposit, interest bearing demand deposit accounts, standby letters of credit, or any other security mutually agreed to by Contractor and City.
- 3.3 **Changes to the Contract Price.** Contractor shall not be compensated for any extra materials used or time expended over and above the Contract Price, unless prior written approval for the same has been granted by the City.
- 3.4 **Additional Services.** City shall have the right at any time during the performance of the services, without invalidating this Agreement, to order extra work beyond that specified in the Scope of Services or make changes by altering, adding to or deducting from said work. No such extra work may be undertaken unless a written change order is first given by the Contract Officer to the Contractor, incorporating therein any adjustment in (i) the Contract Sum as set forth in Section 3.1, and/or (ii) the time to perform this Agreement, which said adjustments are subject to the written approval of the Contractor. Any increase in compensation of twenty-five percent (25%) or less of the Contract Sum, or in the time to perform of one hundred eighty (180) days or less may be approved by the Contract Officer. Any increases, taken either separately or cumulatively, that result in the Contract Sum exceeding \$50,000 must be approved by the City Council. It is expressly understood by Contractor that the provisions of this Section shall not apply to services specifically set forth in the Scope of Services or reasonably contemplated therein. Contractor hereby acknowledges that it accepts the risk that the services to be provided pursuant to the Scope of Services may be costlier or time consuming than Contractor anticipates and that Contractor shall not be entitled to additional compensation therefore.

3.5 Payment Procedures.

- 3.5.1 Progress Payments. All progress payments shall be made in accordance with Public Contract Code § 20104.50, as follows:
- a. The City shall make any progress payment within 30 days after receipt of an undisputed and properly submitted payment request. If the City fails to make any progress payment within 30 days after receipt of an undisputed and properly submitted payment request from a contractor on a construction contract the City shall pay interest to the Contractor equivalent to the legal rate set forth in subdivision (a) of § 685.010 of the Code of Civil Procedure.
- b. Upon receipt of a payment request, the City shall act in accordance with both of the following:
- (1) Each payment request shall be reviewed by the City as soon as practicable after receipt for the purpose of determining that the payment request is a proper payment request.
- (2) Any payment request determined not to be a proper payment request suitable for payment shall be returned to the Contractor as soon as practicable, but not later than seven (7) days, after receipt. A request returned pursuant to this section shall be accompanied by a document setting forth in writing the reasons why the payment request is not proper.
- c. The number of days available to the City to make a payment without incurring interest pursuant to §20104.50 of the Public Contract Code shall be reduced by the number of days by which the City exceeds the seven-day return requirement set forth in paragraph (2) of subdivision (b) above.
- d. A "progress payment" includes all payments due contractors, except that portion of the final payment designated by the contract as retention earnings.
- e. A payment request shall be considered properly executed if funds are available for payment of the payment request, and payment is not delayed due to an audit inquiry by the financial officer of the local agency.
- 3.5.2 Retention. Within sixty (60) calendar days after City accepts final completion of the Work, City shall pay Contractor the amounts City deducted and retained from Contractor's progress payments, except such sums which are required by applicable law or authorized by the Contract to be further retained. In the event of a dispute between City and Contractor concerning the amount of final payment due, the City may withhold from final payment, including Liquidated Damages provided forth in the Contract Documents, together with an amount not to exceed 150% of the disputed amounts.

ARTICLE 4 – TIME FOR PERFORMANCE

- 4.1 **Date of Commencement/Notice to Proceed.** The date of commencement of the Work shall be established in a written Notice to Proceed issued by the City. The City will not issue a Notice to Proceed to the Contractor until this Agreement, bonds and insurance documents have been executed by all parties and approved by the City.
- 4.2 **Contract Time.** Contractor shall perform the Work in a diligent manner and shall complete all of the Work of the Contract, excluding any Plant Establishment, if applicable, within Ninety (90) calendar days after the date specified to Contractor in the Notice to Proceed issued by then City.

ARTICLE 5 – LIQUIDATED DAMAGES AND INCENTIVE BONUS

5.1 Amounts of Liquidated Damages. Failure of Contractor to complete the Work within the time allowed will result in damages being sustained by City. Such damages are, and will continue to be, impracticable and extremely difficult to determine. For each consecutive working day in excess of the time specified for the completion of Work, as adjusted in accordance with the Standard Specifications, Contractor shall pay to City, or have withheld from monies due Contractor, the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000). Execution of this Agreement shall constitute agreement by City and Contractor that said sum is the minimum value of the costs and actual damage caused by the failure of Contractor to complete the Work within the allotted time. Such sum is liquidated damages and shall not be construed as a penalty, and may be deducted from payments due Contractor if such delay occurs.

ARTICLE 6 – CLAIMS AND DISPUTES

- 6.1 **Claims Procedures.** Contractor shall comply with the claims procedure set forth in Public Contract Code Section 9204, a summary of which is attached to this agreement as **Exhibit "C."**
- 6.2 **Government Code Claims Procedures.** Contractor further acknowledges that notwithstanding Contractor's compliance with the claims procedures set forth herein, Contractor must also comply with the claims procedures set forth in Government Code sections 900 et seq. prior to filing a lawsuit against the City for any such claim. Failure to submit a Government Code claim or comply with the claims provision contained herein shall bar Contractor from bringing and maintaining a valid lawsuit against the City.
- 6.3 Cooperation and Notification. In the event any claim or action is brought against City relating to Contractor's performance or services rendered under this Agreement, Contractor shall render any reasonable assistance and cooperation which City might require. The City shall provide notification to Contractor within ten (10) business days upon receipt of any third party claim relating to this Agreement.

ARTICLE 7 – LOCAL BUSINESS LICENSE, TAXES AND FEES

- 7.1 **Business Tax Certificate and Governmental Approvals.** As a condition of the Contract, Contractor and all subcontractors shall, during the term of this Agreement, secure and annually renew business tax certificates pursuant to Chapter 35.070, et seq. of the Santa Fe Springs Municipal Code to operate in the City, and shall also secure and maintain at all times during performance of the Work, any other licenses, fees, permits or similar Governmental Approvals required by Applicable law.
- 7.2 **Offsets.** Contractor acknowledges and agrees that with respect to any business tax or penalties thereon, utility charges, invoiced fee or other debt which is owed, or which becomes owed, by Contractor to City, City reserves the right to withhold and offset said amounts from any payments, refunds or reimbursements owed by City to Contractor under the Contract. Notice of such withholding and offset shall promptly be given to Contractor by City in writing. In the event of a dispute as to the amount owed or whether such amount is owed to City, City will hold such disputed amount until either the appropriate appeal process has been completed or until the dispute has been resolved.

ARTICLE 8 – BONDS

8.1 **Performance and Payment Bonds.** Prior to City's execution of this Agreement, Contractor shall furnish to the City two (2) duly executed surety bonds using the forms included within the Bidding Requirements, one (1) as security for the faithful performance of the Contract and one (1) as security for the payment of all persons performing labor and furnishing materials in connection with the Contract. Both bonds shall be in the amount of one hundred percent (100%) of the Contract Price and shall be subscribed by an Admitted Surety Insurer which is authorized to transact surety insurance business in the State of California with a policy holder's rating of A-or higher and a Financial Class of VII or larger. Should any bond or surety become insufficient, Contractor shall furnish City a new bond within ten (10) days after receiving notice from City. No payments will be due or paid under the Contract until any and all bond deficiencies have been remedied. Contractor, by execution of this Agreement acknowledges that the bonds are not Contract Documents, but are separate obligations.

ARTICLE 9 – WORKERS' COMPENSATION INSURANCE

- 9.1 **Workers' Compensation Insurance Certificate.** By executing this Agreement, Contractor certifies that Contractor is aware of and will comply with Section 3700 of the Labor Code of the State of California requiring every employer to be insured against liability for workers' compensation or to undertake self-insurance before commencing any of the Work. Contractor shall comply with Labor Code Section 1861 by signing and filing the workers' compensation certification attached hereto as Exhibit "A" and incorporated herein by reference.
- 9.2 **Evidence of Coverage.** Prior to the City's execution of this agreement, Contractor shall file with the City either 1) a certificate of insurance or self-insurance evidencing that such insurance is in effect, or that Contractor is self-insured for such coverage; or 2) a certified statement that Contractor has no employees, and acknowledging that if Contractor does employ any person,

the necessary certificate of insurance will immediately be filed with City. Any Certificate filed with the City shall provide that City shall be given ten (10) days prior written notice before modification or cancellation thereof.

- 9.3 **Carrier Rating.** Contractor's workers' compensation insurance carrier shall be authorized to transact insurance business in the State of California with a policy holder's rating of A- or higher and a Financial Class of VII or larger.
- 9.4 **Subcontractor Worker's Compensation Insurance.** Contractor shall require each of its Subcontractors to obtain and maintain for the duration of this Agreement, complete workers' compensation insurance, meeting or exceeding the coverage's and amounts that California law requires.

ARTICLE 10 - CONTRACTOR'S LIABILITY INSURANCE

- 10.1 Minimum Scope. Prior to City's execution of this Agreement and Contractor's commencement of Work, Contractor shall secure, submit proof of and shall thereafter maintain without interruption, until completion of and acceptance by the City of the Work, such commercial general and automobile liability insurance as shall protect Contractor, its Subcontractors and the Additional Insured's from any and all claims for damages for personal injury, including accidental death, as well as any and all claims for property damage which may arise from or which may concern operations under the Contract, whether such operations be by or on behalf of Contractor, any subcontractor or anyone directly or indirectly employed by, connected with or acting for or on behalf of any of them.
- 10.2 <u>Carrier Ratings</u>. All liability insurance shall be issued by an insurance company or companies authorized to transact liability insurance business in the State of California with a policy holder's rating of A- or higher and a Financial Class of VII or larger.
- 10.3 **Minimum Limits**. Contractor shall maintain minimum limits of insurance as follows:
- 10.3.1 <u>Commercial General Liability</u>: Contractor's commercial general liability insurance policy shall cover both bodily injury (including death) and property damage (including, but not limited to, premises operations liability, products-completed operations liability, independent contractor's liability, personal injury liability, and contractual liability) in an amount not less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence, an aggregate limit for products/completed operations in the amount not less than \$2,000,000.
- 10.3.2 <u>Automobile Liability Insurance</u>: Contractor's automobile liability policy shall cover both bodily injury and property damage in an amount not less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence and an aggregate limit of not less than \$1,000,000. All of Contractor's automobile and/or commercial general liability insurance policies shall cover all vehicles used in connection with Contractor's performance of this Agreement, which vehicles shall include, but are not limited to, Contractor owned vehicles, Contractor leased vehicles, Contractor's employee vehicles, non-Contractor-owned vehicles and hired vehicles.

- 10.3.3 <u>Builder's Risk Insurance</u>. Unless otherwise set forth in the special provisions, during the term of this contract, Contractor shall maintain in force, at its own expense, Builder's Risk insurance on all risks of direct physical loss basis, excluding damage caused by an act of God, pursuant to California Public Contract Code § 7105, for an amount equal to the full completed value of the covered structure or replacement value of alterations or additions. The policy shall include as loss payee, the City of Santa Fe Springs, the Contractor, and its sub-contractors as their interest may appear. The City shall not be responsible for the theft of any materials, equipment in the possession and control of Contractor.
- 10.3.4 <u>Umbrella or excess liability insurance</u>. Contractor shall obtain and maintain an umbrella or excess liability insurance policy that will provide bodily injury, personal injury and property damage liability coverage at least as broad as the primary coverages set forth above, including commercial general liability, automobile liability, and employer's liability. Such policy or policies shall provide that the policy will respond in the event that any primary insurance that would otherwise have applied proves to be uncollectable in whole or in part for any reason; have the same effective dates as the primary policies; pay on behalf of the insureds and not reimbursement; the policies shall "follow form" to the underlying primary policies; and the insureds, including the additional insureds shall be the same as the primary policies.
- 10.4 **Notice of Cancellation and Renewals**. The policies shall not be canceled unless thirty (30) days prior written notification of intended cancellation has been given to City by certified or registered mail (this obligation may be satisfied in the alternative by requiring such notice to be provided by Contractor's insurance broker and set forth on its Certificate of Insurance provided to City). Contractor agrees that upon receipt of any notice of cancellation or alteration of the policies, Contractor shall procure within five (5) days, other policies of insurance similar in all respects to the policy or policies to be cancelled or altered. Contractor shall furnish to the City copies of any endorsements that are subsequently issued amending coverage or limits within fourteen (14) days of the amendment.

10.5 All Coverage's. The insurance policy or policies shall also comply with the following provisions:

- a. Policies shall include premises/operations, products completed operations, independent contractors, owners and contractors' protection, explosion, collapse, underground hazard, broad form contractual, personal injury with employment exclusion deleted, and broad form property damage.
- b. The policy shall be endorsed to waive any right of subrogation against the City and its subcontractors, employees, officers, agents and directors for work performed under this Agreement.
- c. If policies are written on a claims made basis, the certificate should so specify and the policy must continue in force for **ten (10) years** after completion of the Project. The retroactive date of the coverage must also be listed.
- d. The policy shall specify that the insurance provided by Contractor will be considered primary and not contributory to any other insurance available to the City of Santa Fe Springs. Contractor shall provide Form No. CG 20010413 to City.

- e. All policies of insurance shall name the City as an Additional Insured and shall contain the following language: "Solely with respect to work done by and on behalf of the name insured for the City of Santa Fe Springs, it is agreed that the City of Santa Fe Springs, and its officers, officials, employees and agents are added as additional insureds under this policy."
- f. Coverage provided by Contractor shall be primary and any insurance or self-insurance procured or maintained by the City shall not be required to contribute with it. The limits of insurance required herein may be satisfied by a combination of primary and umbrella or excess insurance. Any umbrella or excess insurance shall contain or be endorsed to contain a provision that such coverage shall also apply on a primary and non-contributory basis for the benefit of the City before the City's own insurance or self-insurance shall be called upon to protect it as a named insured.
- 10.6 <u>Certificates of Insurance, Additional Insured Endorsements and Deductibles.</u> Prior to execution of the Agreement, and thereafter upon City's request, Contractor shall furnish City with original certificates of insurance and additional insured endorsements setting forth evidence of all insurance coverage required by this Article. Each certificate and endorsement is to be signed by a person authorized by that insurer to bind coverage on its behalf.
- 10.7 Contractor's Failure to Provide Required Insurance. Failure to maintain required insurance at all times shall constitute a default and material breach. In such event, Contractor shall immediately notify City and cease all performance under this Contract until further directed by the City. In the absence of satisfactory insurance coverage, City may, at its discretion and sole option:

 (a) procure insurance with collection rights for premiums, attorneys' fees and costs against Contractor by way of set-off or recoupment from sums due Contractor; (b) immediately terminate or suspend Contractor's performance of the Contract; (c) pay Contractor's premiums for renewal of Contractor's coverage; or (d) self-insure the risk, with all damages and costs incurred, by judgment, settlement or otherwise, including attorneys' fees and costs, being collectible from Contractor, by way of set-off or recoupment from any sums due Contractor. Upon demand, Contractor shall repay City for all sums that City paid to obtain, renew, reinstate or replace the insurance, or City may offset the cost against any monies that the City may owe Contractor.
- 10.8 <u>Verification of Coverage.</u> City shall have the right to obtain complete and certified copies of Contractor's and Subcontractors' insurance policies (including, but not limited to, the declarations page, form list and riders), endorsements or certificates required under the Contractor Documents, upon request (including, but not limited to, the declarations page, form list and riders).
- 10.9 Reassessment of Insurance Requirements. At any time during the duration of this Contract, the City may require that Contractor obtain, pay for, and maintain more or less insurance depending on the City's assessment of any one or more of the following factors: (1) the City's risk of liability or exposure arising out of, or in any way connected with, Contractor's services under this Contract; (2) the nature or number of accidents, claims, or lawsuits arising out of, or in any way connected with, Contractor's services under this Contract; or (3) the availability, or affordability, or both, of increased liability insurance coverage.

- 10.10 <u>Contractor's Insurance for Other Losses.</u> The Contractor and its Subcontractors of every tier shall assume full responsibility for all loss or damage from any cause whatsoever to any tools, Contractor's (or Subcontractors') employee owned tools, machinery, equipment, or motor vehicles owned or rented by the Contractor, or the Contractor's agents, suppliers or Subcontractors as well as to any temporary structures, scaffolding and protective fences.
- 10.11 **No Limitation.** Contractor's maintenance of insurance as required by the Contract Documents shall not be construed to limit the liability of the Contractor or its Subcontractors of any tier to the coverage provided by such insurance, or otherwise limit the City's recourse to any remedy available at law or in equity.
- 10.12 <u>Subcontractors' Insurance</u>. The Contractor shall include in all subcontracts a requirement that the Subcontractors of every tier shall obtain and maintain, at a minimum, all insurance required by Articles 9 and 19 of this Agreement except that the limits of liability and deductibles shall be in amounts determined by the Contractor, based on the degree of hazardous exposure according to the Work performed by each Subcontractor and the size of each subcontract.

Contractor shall ensure that any professional engineer retained on its behalf to provide supplemental plans and engineering calculations required in conjunction with the Work, maintains professional liability insurance during the entire term of this Agreement. Such insurance shall be in the minimum amount of \$1,000,000 to protect City from claims resulting from the engineer(s) activities. This minimum amount of coverage shall not constitute any limitation or cap on Contractor's indemnification obligations set forth herein.

The City reserves the right to request certificates of insurance from the Contractor for each Subcontractor. The Contractor acknowledges that regardless of insurance obtained by its Subcontractors, the Contractor will be responsible to the City for any and all acts of its Subcontractors.

ARTICLE 11 - INDEMNITY/DUTY TO DEFEND

Indemnity. Except as to the sole negligence, active negligence or willful misconduct of the City, Contractor assumes liability for and agrees, at Contractor's sole cost and expense, to promptly and fully indemnify and hold the City, its City Council, and all of its respective officials, officers, directors, employees, managers, commission members, representatives, agents, council members, ("Indemnitees"), harmless from and against any and all loss, damage, claims, allegations, actions, suits, arbitrations, administrative proceedings, regulatory proceedings, or other legal proceedings, causes of action, demands, costs, judgments, liens, stop notices, penalties, damages, losses, anticipated losses of revenue, expenses (including, but not limited to, any fees of accountants, attorneys, experts or other professionals, or investigation expenses), costs, including attorneys' fees, or losses of any kind or nature whatsoever, whether actual, threatened or alleged, arising out of, resulting from or is in any way (either directly or indirectly) related to, or is in any manner connected with, the performance of Work, the Project, activities, operations or duties of Contractor, or anyone employed by or working under Contractor, and from all claims by anyone employed by or working under Contractor for services rendered to Contractor in the performance of this Agreement ("Indemnity Claims"), notwithstanding that the City may have benefited from their services. This indemnification provision shall apply to any acts or omissions, willful

misconduct or negligent conduct, whether active or passive, on the part of Contractor or of anyone employed by or working under Contractor.

The parties expressly agree that any payment, attorneys' fees, costs or expense that the City incurs or makes to or on behalf of an injured employee under the City's self-administered workers' compensation is included as a loss, expense or cost for the purposes of this Section, and that this Section shall survive the expiration or early termination of the Agreement.

- 11.2 **Duty to Defend.** Contractor agrees, at its sole cost and expense, to promptly defend the Indemnitees from all Indemnity Claims. The duty of the Contractor to indemnify and hold harmless the Indemnitees includes the separate and independent duty to defend the Indemnitees, which duty arises immediately upon receipt by Contractor of the tender of any Indemnity Claim from an Indemnitee. The Contractor's obligation to defend the Indemnitees shall be at Contractor's sole expense, and not be excused because of Contractor's inability to evaluate liability or because the Contractor evaluates liability and determines that the Contractor is not liable. This duty to defend shall apply whether or not an Indemnity Claim has merit or is meritless, or which involves claims or allegations that any or all of the Indemnitees were actively, passively or concurrently negligent, or which otherwise assert that the Indemnitees are responsible, in whole or in part, for any Indemnity Claim. Contractor agrees to provide this defense immediately upon written notice from the City, and with well qualified, adequately insured and experienced legal counsel acceptable to the City.
- 11.3 Subcontractor Requirements. In addition to the requirements set forth hereinabove, Contractor shall ensure, by written subcontract agreement, that each of Contractor's Subcontractors of every tier shall protect, defend, indemnify and hold harmless the Indemnitees with respect to Indemnity Claims arising out of, in connection with, or in any way related to each such Subcontractors' Work on the Project in the same manner in which Contractor is required to protect, defend, indemnify and hold the Indemnitees harmless. In the event Contractor fails to obtain such defense and indemnity obligations from others as required herein, Contractor agrees to be fully responsible to the Indemnitees according to the terms of this Article.
- 11.4 **No Limitation or Waiver of Rights.** Contractor's obligations under this Article are in addition to any other rights or remedies which the Indemnitees may have under the law or under the Contract Documents. Contractor's indemnification and defense obligations set forth in this Article are separate and independent from the insurance provisions set forth in the Agreement and do not limit, in any way, the applicability, scope, or obligations set forth in such insurance provisions. The purchase of insurance by the Contractor with respect to the obligations required herein shall in no event be construed as fulfillment or discharge of such obligations. City approval of the Insurance contracts required by this Agreement does not in any way relieve the Contractor from liability under this section. In any and all claims against the Indemnitees by any employee of the Contractor, any Subcontractor, any supplier of the Contractor or Subcontractors, anyone directly or indirectly employed by any of them, or anyone for whose acts any of them may be liable, the obligations under this Article shall not be limited in any way by any limitation on the amount or type of damages, compensation or benefits payable by or for the Contractor or any Subcontractor or any supplier of either of them, under workers' or workmen's compensation acts, disability benefit acts or other employee benefit acts. Failure of the City to monitor compliance

with these requirements imposes no additional obligations on the City and will in no way act as a waiver of any rights hereunder.

- 11.5 **Withholding to Secure Obligations.** In the event an Indemnity Claim arises prior to final payment to Contractor, the City may, in its sole discretion, reserve, retain or apply any monies due Contractor for the purpose of resolving such Indemnity Claims; provided, however, the City may release such funds if the Contractor provides the City with reasonable assurances of protection of the Indemnitees' interests. The City shall, in its sole discretion, determine whether such assurances are reasonable.
- 11.6 **Limitations.** Notwithstanding the above provisions of section 11.1 and 11.2, Contractor shall not be liable for the defense or indemnification of the City for claims, actions, complaints or suits arising out of the sole active negligence or willful misconduct of the City.
- 11.7 **Survival of Indemnity Obligations.** Contractor's obligations under this Article are binding on Contractor's and its Subcontractors' successors, heirs and assigns and shall survive the completion of the Work or termination of the Contractor's performance of the Work.

ARTICLE 12 – PREVAILING WAGES

- 12.1 **Public Work Project.** This Project is a public work as defined in California Labor Code Section 1720. By executing this Agreement, Contractor certifies that neither it, nor any of its subcontractors are ineligible under Labor Code Section 1777.1 or Section 1777.7 from bidding on, entering into a contract for, or performing the Work. Contractor and all Subcontractors of any tier are required to pay all workers employed in the execution of the Work not less than the general prevailing wage rates of per diem wages and overtime and holiday wages determined by the Director of the Department of Industrial Relations ("DIR") under Section 1720 et seq. of the California Labor Code. The Director's determination of prevailing rates are on file with the City and are available on-line at www.dir.ca.gov/dlsr/DPreWageDetermination.htm and are referred to and made a part hereof; the wage rates therein ascertained, determined and specified are referred to and made a part hereof as though fully set forth herein.
- 12.2 **California Labor Code.** Contractor is aware of and stipulates that Contractor will also comply with the following sections of the California Labor Code:
 - a. Section, 1771, Contractor and any subcontractors shall pay not less than the general prevailing rate per diem wages.
 - b. Section 1775, Contractor and any subcontractor will forfeit to City as a penalty up to \$200 for each calendar day, or portion of a day, for each worker paid less than the applicable prevailing wage rate, in addition to paying each worker the difference between the applicable wage rate and the amount actually paid.
 - c. Contractor and its subcontractors must maintain certified payroll records in compliance with Labor Code sections 1776 and 1812, and all implementing regulations promulgated by the DIR. For each payroll record, Contractor and its subcontractors must certify under penalty of perjury that the information in the

record is true and correct, and that it has complied with the requirements of Labor Code sections 1771, 1811, and 1815. Contractor must electronically submit certified payroll records to the Labor Commissioner as required under California law and regulations.

- d. Section 1777.5 prescribes the terms and conditions for employing registered apprentices.
- e. Section 1810, eight hours of labor constitutes a legal day's work.
- f. Section 1813, Contractor will forfeit to the City as a penalty the sum of \$25 for each day during which a worker employed by Contractor or any subcontractor is required or permitted to work more than eight hours during any one calendar day, or more than 40 hours per calendar week, unless such workers are paid overtime wages under Labor Code section 1815.
- g. Sections 1725.5 and 1771.1 requires all general contractors and subcontractors to be registered with DIR.
- h. Contractor must also post all job site notices required by laws or regulations pursuant to Labor Code section 1771.4.

ARTICLE 13 – MISCELLANEOUS

- 13.1 **Non-Discrimination.** Except as provided in Section 12940 of the California Government Code, during Contractor's performance of the Agreement, Contractor shall not discriminate on the grounds of race, religious creed, color, national origin, ancestry, age, physical disability, mental disability, medical condition including the medical condition of Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS) or any condition related thereto, marital status, gender, gender identity, genetic information, gender expression, sex or sexual orientation, military and veteran status, in the selection and retention of employees and subcontractors and the procurement of materials and equipment. Contractor shall also comply with the requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act in the performance of the Agreement.
- 13.2 **Notice.** Whenever any provision of the Contract Documents requires the giving of written notice, including notices, bills, invoices or other documents required or permitted under this Agreement, service shall be sufficient if sent by one party to the other by overnight courier, or by registered, certified or United States first class mail, postage prepaid and addressed as follows:

13.3 **Conflict of Interest.** The Contractor warrants that it has not paid or given and will not pay or give any third party any money or other consideration for obtaining this Agreement. Contractor and its officers, employees, associates and subcontractors, if any, will comply with all conflict of interest statutes of the State of California applicable to Contractor's services under this agreement,

including, but not limited to, the Political Reform Act (Government Code Sections 81000, et seq.) and Government Code Section 1090. During the term of this Agreement, Contractor and its officers, employees, associates and subcontractor shall not, without the prior written approval of the City Representative, perform work for another person or entity for whom Contractor is not currently performing work that would require Contractor or one of its officers, employees, associates or subcontractors to abstain from a decision under this Agreement pursuant to a conflict of interest statute.

- 13.4 **Waiver.** No delay or omission in the exercise of any right or remedy by a nondefaulting party on any default shall impair such right or remedy or be construed as a waiver. A party's consent to or approval of any act by the other party requiring the party's consent or approval shall not be deemed to waive or render unnecessary the other party's consent to or approval of any subsequent act. Any waiver by either party of any default must be in writing and shall not be a waiver of any other default concerning the same or any other provision of this Agreement.
- 13.5 **Rights and Remedies.** Rights and Remedies are cumulative except with respect to rights and remedies expressly declared to be exclusive in this Agreement, the rights and remedies of the parties are cumulative and the exercise by either party of one or more of such rights or remedies shall not preclude the exercise by it, at the same or different times, of any other rights or remedies for the same default or any other default by the other party.
- 13.6 **Legal Action.** In addition to any other rights or remedies, either party may take legal action, in law or in equity, to cure, correct or remedy any default, to recover damages for any default, to compel specific performance of this Agreement, to obtain declaratory or injunctive relief, or to obtain any other remedy consistent with the purposes of this Agreement.
- 13.7 **Disputes.** In the event either party fails to perform its obligations hereunder, the nondefaulting party shall provide the defaulting party written notice of such default. The defaulting party shall have ten (10) days to cure the default; provided that, if the default is not reasonably susceptible to being cured within said ten (10) day period, the defaulting party shall have a reasonable time to cure the default, not to exceed a maximum of thirty (30) days, so long as the defaulting party commences to cure such default within ten (10) days of service of such notice and diligently prosecutes the cure to completion; provided further that if the default is an immediate danger to the health, safety and general welfare, the defaulting party shall take such immediate action as may be necessary. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the nondefaulting party may, in its sole and absolute discretion, grant a longer cure period. Should the defaulting party fail to cure the default within the time period provided in this Section, the nondefaulting party shall have the right, in addition to any other rights the nondefaulting party may have at law or in equity, to terminate this Agreement. Compliance with the provisions of this Section 13.7 shall be a condition precedent to bringing any legal action, and such compliance shall not be a waiver of any party's right to take legal action in the event that the dispute is not cured.
- 13.8 **Termination for Default of Contractor.** If termination is due to the failure of the Contractor to fulfill its obligations under this Agreement, Contractor shall vacate any City owned property which Contractor is permitted to occupy hereunder and City may, after compliance with the provisions of Section 13.7, take over the work and prosecute the same to completion by contract

or otherwise, and the Contractor shall be liable to the extent that the total cost for completion of the services required hereunder exceeds the compensation herein stipulated (provided that the City shall use reasonable efforts to mitigate such damages), and City may withhold any payments to the Contractor for the purpose of setoff or partial payment of the amounts owed the City as previously stated.

13.9 **Force Majeure.** The time period(s) specified in the Scope of Services for performance of the services rendered pursuant to this Agreement shall be extended because of any delays due to unforeseeable causes beyond the control and without the fault or negligence of the Contractor, including, but not restricted to, acts of God or of the public enemy, unusually severe weather, fires, earthquakes, floods, epidemics, quarantine restrictions, riots, strikes, freight embargoes, wars, litigation, and/or acts of any governmental agency, including the City, if the Contractor shall within ten (10) days of the commencement of such delay notify the City in writing of the causes for the delay. The City shall ascertain the facts and the extent of delay, and extend the time for performing the services for the period of the enforced delay when and if in the judgment of the City such delay is justified. The City's determination shall be final and conclusive upon the parties to this Agreement.

13.10 City's Right to Access and Audit Contractor's Project Documents.

- a. If the Contractor submits a claim to the City for additional compensation, the City shall have the right, as a condition to considering the claim, and as a basis for evaluation of the claim, and until the claim has been settled, to audit the Contractor's books to the extent they are relevant. This right shall include the right to examine books, records, documents, and other evidence and accounting procedures and practices, sufficient to discover and verify all direct and indirect costs of whatever nature claimed to have been incurred or anticipated to be incurred and for which the claim has been submitted. The right to audit shall include the right to inspect the Contractor's plant, or such parts thereof, as may be or have been engaged in the performance of the Work. The Contractor further agrees that the right to audit encompasses all subcontracts and is binding upon Subcontractors. The rights to examine and inspect herein provided for shall be exercisable through such representatives as the City deems desirable during the Contractor's normal business hours at the office of the Contractor. The Contractor shall make available to the City for auditing, all relevant accounting records and documents, and other financial data, and upon request, shall submit true copies of requested records to the City.
- b. The City and/or its authorized auditors or representatives, (including the California State Auditor if so requested by the City pursuant to Government Code § 8546.7) shall have access to and the right to examine, audit, excerpt, transcribe, and reproduce any of the Contractor's records for a period of at least three (3) years after termination of the Agreement and/or Final Payment. Such records include without limitation, journals, ledgers, records of accounts payable and receivable, profit and loss statements, bank statements, invoices, receipts, subcontracts, agreements, notes, correspondence, memoranda, and any documents generated and received in Contractor's performance of this Contract. Upon written notice by the City, Contractor shall promptly make all such records available to City and/or its authorized auditors or representatives and cooperate with the City and its authorized auditors or representatives in examining, auditing, excerpting, transcribing and reproducing the records.

- 13.11 **Unfair Business Practices Claims.** In entering into a public works contract or a subcontract to supply goods, services or materials pursuant to a public works contract, the contractor or subcontractor offers and agrees to assign to the awarding body all rights, title, and interest in and to all causes of action it may have under Section 4 of the Clayton Act (15 U.S.C. Sec. 15) or under the Cartwright Act (Chapter 2, (commencing with Section 16700) of Part 2 of Division 7 of the Business and Professions Code), arising from purchases of goods, services or materials pursuant to the public works contract or the subcontract. This assignment shall be made and become effective at the time the awarding body renders final payment to the contractor without further acknowledgment by the parties. (Sec. 7103.5, California Public Contract Code).
- 13.12 **Venue.** Any action at law or in equity brought by either of the parties hereto for the purpose of enforcing a right or rights provided for by this Agreement shall be tried in the Superior Court in Los Angeles County, State of California.
- 13.13 **Prohibition Against Assignment.** The experience, knowledge, capability and reputation of Contractor, its principals and employees were a substantial inducement for the City to enter into this Agreement. Neither this Agreement nor any interest herein may be transferred, assigned, conveyed, hypothecated or encumbered voluntarily or by operation of law, whether for the benefit of creditors or otherwise, without the prior written approval of City. Transfers restricted hereunder shall include the transfer to any person or group of persons acting in concert of more than twenty-five percent (25%) of the present ownership and/or control of Contractor, taking all transfers into account on a cumulative basis. In the event of any such unapproved transfer, including any bankruptcy proceeding, this Agreement shall be void. No approved transfer shall release the Contractor or any surety of Contractor of any liability hereunder without the express consent of City.
- 13.14 **Independent Contractor.** Neither the City nor any of its employees shall have any control over the manner, mode or means by which Contractor, its subcontractors, agents or employees, performs the services required herein, except as otherwise set forth herein. The City shall have no voice in the selection, discharge, supervision or control of Contractor's employees, subcontractors, servants, representatives or agents, or in fixing their number, compensation or hours of service. Contractor shall perform all services required herein as an independent contractor of the City and shall remain at all times as to the City a wholly independent contractor with only such obligations as are consistent with that role. Contractor shall not at any time or in any manner represent that it or any of its subcontractors, agents or employees are agents or employees of the City. The City shall not in any way or for any purpose become or be deemed to be a partner of Contractor in its business or otherwise or a joint venture or a member of any joint enterprise with Contractor.
- 13.15 **No Estoppel or Waiver by City.** No action or failure to act by the City shall constitute a waiver of any right or duty afforded City under this Agreement, nor shall any such action or failure to act constitute an approval of or acquiescence in any breach thereunder, except as may be specifically provided in this Agreement or as may be otherwise agreed in writing. The waiver by the City of any breach or violation of any term, covenant or condition of this Agreement or of any provision, ordinance, or law shall not be deemed to be a waiver of any other term, covenant, condition, ordinance, or law or of any subsequent breach or violation of the same or of any other term, covenant, condition, ordinance, or law. The subsequent payment of any monies or fee by

the City which may become due hereunder shall not be deemed to be a waiver of any preceding breach or violation by Contractor or any term, covenant, condition of this Agreement or of any applicable law or ordinance.

- 13.16 **Signature Authority.** The individuals executing this Agreement and the instruments referenced herein on behalf of Contractor each represent and warrant that they have the legal power, right and actual authority to bind Contractor to the terms and conditions hereof and thereof.
- 13.17 **Severability.** Each provision, term, condition, covenant and/or restriction, in whole and in part, in this Agreement shall be considered severable. In the event any provision, term, condition, covenant and/or restriction, in whole and/or in part, in this Agreement is declared invalid, unconstitutional, or void for any reason, such provision or part thereof shall be severed from this Agreement and shall not affect any other provision, term, condition, covenant and/or restriction of this Agreement and the remainder of the Agreement shall continue in full force and effect.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council:

- Introduce by title only and waive further reading of Ordinance No. 1144: An Ordinance of the City of Santa Fe Springs Amending Chapter 72 of Title VII (Traffic Code) of the Santa Fe Springs Municipal Code relating to electric Vehicle charging stations; and
- 2) Approve hours of use for two EV charging stations at City Hall as follows: 1) Employee use from 7:00 am to 6:00 pm (Monday Friday); and 2) General Public use from 6:00 pm to 7:00 am, non-working hours and all day on weekends; and
- Authorize an annual appropriation of \$7,500 from the SCAQMD Motor Vehicle Subvention Fund to cover the annual cost for subsidizing charging service and energy bills related to the Employee Electric Vehicle Charging Incentive Program; and
- 4) Take such additional, related, action that may be desirable.

FISCAL IMPACT

The total cost for the purchase and installation of the two EV charging stations is \$34,000. This cost was charged to the General Fund.

Cities receive annual funding from the South Coast Air Quality Management District (SCAQMD) as part of the AB 2766 Motor Vehicle Subvention Program. These funds are restricted and can only be used for programs and purchases that reduce vehicle emissions. Santa Fe Springs receives an annual amount of approximately \$23,500. The maintenance and operation of the charging stations and any related programs are an eligible expense for this program.

During the pilot program for the two EV charging stations, approximately 12 employees have utilized the charging stations at an approximate monthly cost of \$250 dollars, including energy bills and additional fees from the charging station operator. If the City Council approves an Employee Electric Vehicle Charging Incentive Program that would provide free charging to encourage employees to purchase electric vehicles as their personal vehicle, an estimated annual allocation of \$7,500 from the AB 2766 Fund is anticipated to provide adequate funding for up to 24 employees. The AB 2766 Motor Vehicle Subvention Program was established by the State in 1991 and provides a funding source from State vehicle registration fees to cities and counties to develop clean transportation programs and reduce vehicle emissions. Many cities fund programs that subsidize employee car and van pools and public transit fare reimbursements to encourage employees to move away from individual commutes and help reduce the number of fossil fueled motor vehicles on the roads during peak commute times. Staff has consulted with the SCAQMD and verified that a subsidy of EV charging is an eligible AB 2766 expense, similar to carpool incentive programs, because such a program would also reduce fossil fueled vehicles by incentivizing employees to purchase electric vehicles for commuting.

BACKGROUND

The City Hall Parking Lot Renovation project completed several years ago included underground infrastructure to accommodate the installation of EV charging stations at several parking spaces along the north side of City Hall. Staff recently purchased and installed two EV charging stations at this location as a pilot project to familiarize staff with the selection, installation, set up and operation of EV charging stations. These are the first EV charging stations installed at a city facility. The stations were installed by Public Works Maintenance staff and have been restricted to employee use during the pilot period to ensure the stations are operating properly and efficiently and to train staff on the operation and maintenance of the stations, including setting up and managing user accounts.

Additionally, and in a separate effort to make EV charging stations available to residents and visitors of the City of Santa Fe Springs, staff applied for and received a grant to purchase and install several EV charging station in the Civic Center Plaza. It is anticipated that a total of 12 charging stations will be made available to the general public in the

coming year. Staff is coordinating with the granting agency and will soon seek City Council approval at various steps of the grant award and project delivery process.

Public Works staff evaluated various charging station manufacturers to ensure selection of the best quality station that is also built by a proven manufacturer/operator that will be in business long term to support ongoing operation. Based on information gathered and the experience of neighboring cities, staff opted for EV stations manufactured by Chargepoint, Inc.

DISCUSSION

Two Chargepoint EV charging stations were purchased as a pilot program to evaluate this brand. The City purchased and installed one (1) 80A single port charger and (1) 80A Dual port charger (a total of 3 charging ports) at a cost of \$34,000, including staff time.

Since the city does not currently have any fully electric vehicles in its fleet, the pilot testing for the two stations consisted of charging restricted to City employees for their personal electric vehicles. This allowed staff to train on the configuration, management and operation of the stations and gather data on the operational and energy costs associated with operating the stations. Users have been highly satisfied with the operation of the stations. In order to make the stations available to the public and offset the energy, maintenance and operational costs, a fee of \$0.25 per kilowatt-hour (kWh) is recommended and will be presented at a later date for City Council consideration and adoption in the form of a resolution. The \$0.25 per kWh rate equates to approximately \$2 to \$5 per charging session. The \$0.25 per kWh rate is consistent with rates charged by several other neighboring government agencies such as, Downey and La Habra and can be adjusted annually in accordance with the Consumer Price Index (CPI) or council action in order to keep pace with fluctuating energy costs imposed by Southern California Edison.

Staff recommends that the City Council adopt the attached proposed EV Charging Use Ordinance in order to provide guidance to staff and users relating to the proper use of city owned EV charging stations.

Staff is recommending opening the existing charging stations for public use after work hour starting at 6:00pm through 7:00am, and all day on weekends. The Chargepoint management software allows for use of the stations by members of the public outside of working hours. Once the city receives and installs the 12 charging stations awarded by the grant, members of the public would have access to the new stations at any time and the existing stations may be again limited to city staff use only. In order to enable parking enforcement, parking restriction signage will be installed limiting the use of the stations in terms of the hours restricted to city employees and setting a maximum parking /charging time at 4 hours to maximize the availability of the charging stations. The penalty for exceeding the 4 hours will be enforced under existing codes.

SUMMARY/NEXT STEPS

Upon approval of the recommended actions, the recommended ordinance will be scheduled for a second reading and adoption. Once the ordinance becomes effective, staff will install the appropriate signage and begin enforcement.

ORDINANCE NO. 1144

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF SANTA FE SPRINGS AMENDING CHAPTER 72 OF TITLE VII (TRAFFIC CODE) OF THE SANTA FE SPRINGS MUNICIPAL CODE RELATING TO ELECTRIC VEHICLE CHARGING STATIONS

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SANTA FE SPRINGS DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

<u>SECTION 1</u>. Chapter 72 (Stopping, Standing and Parking) of Title VII (Traffic Code) of the Santa Fe Springs Municipal Code is hereby amended as provided in Exhibit "A" attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference.

<u>SECTION 2</u>. Any provision of the Code of Santa Fe Springs inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance, to the extent of such inconsistencies and no further, is hereby repealed or modified to that extent necessary to effect the provisions of this Ordinance.

<u>SECTION 3</u>. If any section, subsection, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase in this Ordinance, or any part thereof, is held invalid or unconstitutional, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining sections or portions of this Ordinance or of Chapter 72, or any part thereof. The City Council hereby declares that it would have adopted each section, subsection, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase in this Ordinance irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, subdivisions, paragraphs, sentences, clauses or phrases may be declared invalid or unconstitutional.

<u>SECTION 4</u>. The City Clerk shall certify to the passage and adoption of this ordinance and shall cause the same to be published in the same manner required by law. This ordinance shall become effective thirty (30) days from and after its passage.

EXHIBIT A

Sections 72.60 through 72.64 are hereby added to Chapter 72 of Title VII (Traffic Code) of the Santa Fe Springs Municipal Code as follows:

ELECTRIC VEHICLE CHARGING STATIONS

72.60 PURPOSE.

The electric vehicle parking standards established in this subchapter are intended to promote sustainable and alternative transportation practices; manage the availability of off-street parking, in particular in areas that will maximize the use of electric vehicles; and thereby improve traffic and parking circulation.

72.61 DEFINITIONS.

As used in this subchapter, the following words and phrases shall have the following meanings:

"Electric vehicle" shall mean a vehicle that operates, either partially or exclusively, on electrical energy from the electrical grid, or an off-grid source, that is stored on board for motive purposes.

"Electric vehicle charging station" shall mean equipment that has as its primary purpose the transfer of electric energy storage device on an electric vehicle.

"kWh" shall mean kilowatt-hour.

"Overstay charge" shall mean the fee imposed on an electrical vehicle that exceeded the maximum legal parking time posted at parking spaces designated as an electric vehicle charging station.

72.62 PARKING OF VEHICLES IN STALLS FOR ELECTRIC CHARGING PURPOSES.

- (A) Pursuant to California Vehicle Code section 22511, the city hereby designates certain stalls and spaces in city-owned or operated off-street parking lots and facilities to be for the exclusive purpose of parking and charging a vehicle that is connected for electric charging purposes.
- (B) The City Traffic Engineer is hereby authorized to post signs in accordance with California Vehicle Code Section 2511(d)(1) at certain stalls and spaces in city-owned or operated off-street parking lots and facilities that require vehicles parked in such stalls and spaces to be connected for electric charging purposes.
- (C) In accordance with California Vehicle Code Section 22511(c)(1), the city may cause the removal and towing or issue fines for electric charging violations in

accordance with the Uniform Parking Bail Schedule for a vehicle parked in a space or stall that is posted for electric charging purposes that is not connected for electric charging purposes.

(D) This section does not interfere with other or existing laws allowing the city to regulate parking in city-owned or operated off-street parking lots and facilities within the city, including the authority to restrict overnight parking and reserve and designate certain electric vehicle stalls for employee-only use; provided such designations comply with signage requirements under California Vehicle Code section 22519.

72.63 ELECTRIC VEHICLE PARKING RESTRICTION.

- (A) Where a sign designating a parking space for the exclusive use of charging electric vehicles is posted, no person shall park in that space any non-electric vehicle, electric vehicle that is not connected to the electrical vehicle charging station, electric vehicle that is not charging, or an electric vehicle that has exceeded the maximum legal parking time posted.
- (B) Where a sign designating a parking space for the exclusive use of charging electric vehicles belonging to a current employee of the city, no person who is not a current city employee shall park in that designated space, including restrictions as to time of day or day of the week when the charging is exclusively available to employees of the city or city fleet vehicles.
- (C) For any violation of any provision of this section, the City Manager or designee is hereby empowered to issue due notices to appear or citations, in the usual form and manner, as provided in the California Vehicle Code.

72.64 ELECTRIC VEHICLE CHARGING STATION PARKING FEES.

- (A) Parking rates for parking a vehicle in a designated electric vehicle charging station shall be established and adjusted from time to time to manage the use and occupancy of off-street electric vehicle charging stations in all city-owned or operated parking facilities and areas.
- (B) Parking fees and permit fees, if any, designated permit areas, exempted periods, and overstay charges for spaces designated for use of electric vehicle charging stations may also be established and changed, from time to time, by City Council resolution.
- (C) A current schedule of the electric vehicle charging station parking rates and overstay charges shall be posted on the city's master fee schedule (and as thereafter amended), and available for review at the city clerk's office.
- (D) For any violation of any provision of this section, the City Manager or designee is empowered to issue due notices to appear or citations, in the usual form and manner, as provided in the California Vehicle Code.

- Award Task Order No. 3 to JMDiaz, Inc. of City of Industry, California for the Design of City Hall Entrance Lobby, Council Chambers and Conference Room Remodel Project; and
- 4) Authorize the Director of Public Works to execute Task Order No. 3 for on-call professional engineering services with JMDiaz, Inc.; and
- 5) Take such additional related action that may be desirable.

FISCAL IMPACT

It is recommended that The City Council add the City Hall Entrance Lobby, Council Chambers, and Conference Room Remodel Project to the Capital Improvement Plan.

It is also recommended that the City Council appropriate \$69,550.00 from the Utility Users Tax (UUT) Capital Improvement Fund to pay for the conceptual design phase for the project.

If a conceptual design option is approved, City Council approval to move forward with the design and construction of the project will be requested at a later date, including recommendations for an appropriation to fund the project.

BACKGROUND

In April 2024, staff coordinated a meeting with JMDiaz Inc. to discuss the scope of work for the proposed project. JMDiaz Inc. engaged a subconsultant, 19-6 Architects, with architectural experience in municipal buildings, specifically public meeting rooms and gathering rooms. Staff met with 19-6 Architects to walk the prospective remodel project. The City Hall Lobby project will include the removal and replacement of tile flooring, the removal of the popcorn ceiling, and the removal and replacement of furniture and paint, in addition to the redesigning of the apex skylight. The Council Chambers remodel consists of redesigning the interior of the Chambers, including modernization to the dais, removal of popcorn ceiling, removal and installation of new furniture, paint, carpet, and other finishes, and new public seating. The Council Conference Room remodel consists of the removal and installation of new furniture, paint, carpet, and acoustic noise reduction treatments. The proposed design of the Council Chamber, Conference Room, and Lobby will comply with current ADA standards.

The design fee proposal was received on June 14, 2024, for \$69,550; which will incorporate four schematic design options for the project.

ANALYSIS

The proposed scope and fee includes the development of four schematic design options with a Rough Order Magnitude cost estimate for each option. The options will be presented at a later date for City Council consideration. If the City Council selects one of the options, recommendations for the design and construction of the project would be included in a future agenda for City Council consideration.

ENVIRONMENTAL

Not applicable.

DISCUSSION

The renovation of the City Hall Entrance Lobby, Council Chambers, and Conference Room will modernize these areas of City Hall to complement adjacent areas of City Hall that were recently renovated. Additionally, improvements will include accessibility improvements to comply with current Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) requirements

and technology and energy efficiency upgrades. These areas of the building have not been remodeled since the original construction of the building in the 1960s.

SUMMARY/NEXT STEPS

Upon the approval of the City Council of the recommended actions, staff will coordinate with JMDiaz, Inc., and their subconsultant 19-6 Architects, on the conceptual design of the City Hall Lobby, Council Chambers, and Conference Room project per the proposal. Staff anticipates the completion of the schematic designs of the Lobby, Council Chambers, and Conference Room in the fall of 2024, at which time conceptual designs will be presented to the City Council for consideration.

FISCAL IMPACT

The Stage Road Street Improvement Project is an approved Capital Improvement Plan project. Funding for this project was planned utilizing a \$2,000,000 allocation defined in the Cooperative and Funding Agreement for the Rosecrans/Marquardt Grade Separation Project. This agreement between the City and the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority (LACMTA) allocates \$2,000,000 to pay for the City's administrative costs in support of the project and for betterments of the City's choosing. Payment is by reimbursement. However, the agreement specifies that the availability of these funds is contingent on the funds being available as "excess funds" that are "are not required for the Project Cost." Staff is currently coordinating with LACMTA staff on updating the Estimate-to-Close for the grade separation project which will determine how much "excess funds" are available.

The total amount for the recommended on-call professional design services for the project

is \$112,800. To expedite the design and ensure that the project is ready for construction by LACMTA's contractors if funding becomes available, staff issued Task Order No. 5 (Attachment D) for \$24,999.00 to JMDiaz Inc. to initiate the design. Staff recommends authorization to execute Task Order No. 4 (Attachment B) for the remaining design fee balance of \$87,801.00. The cost of the design will be fronted by the City utilizing Utility User Tax (UUT) funds, but will be an eligible reimbursable cost should LACMTA funds become available. An additional appropriation by the City may be required at a later date to complete the construction of the project, depending on the final amount of "excess funds" available from the grade separation project budget.

BACKGROUND

On April 15, 2024, Public Works Engineering staff solicited a Request for Proposal (RFP) from the approved on-call list of qualified engineering firms, and selected JMDiaz Inc., to provide professional engineering services for the design of the Commercial Street Improvements of Stage Road and Iseli Road. The consultant will be responsible for preparing the project's plans, specifications, engineering estimates, and hydrological study. The project encompasses the street segments on Stage Road between the Rosecrans/Marquardt Grade Separation to 700 ft. northeast of Valley View Avenue and Iseli Road from Rosecrans Avenue to Stage Road as shown in Attachment C. The project consists of the removal of existing asphalt concrete pavement and the placement of new asphalt concrete pavement. Additionally, the project includes the removal and replacement of curb & gutter, sidewalk, curb ramps, and driveways, as needed.

The consultant will also perform a hydrological study, to identify the current drainage pattern and propose drainage improvements along Stage Road.

ANALYSIS

The pavement on Stage Road and Iseli Road needs rehabilitation to prolong its service life and continue serving the community for many more years.

BACKGROUND

The Valley View Avenue and Alondra Boulevard Intersection Improvement project covers areas within the shared boundaries of the City of La Mirada. The main goal of the project is to improve traffic flow through the intersection. This will involve widening the road, building right-turn lanes, creating dual left-turn lanes, and upgrading the traffic signal equipment.

On April 15, 2024, Public Works Engineering staff sent a Request for Proposal (RFP) to firms on the approved on-call list of qualified engineering firms. JMDiaz, Inc. was selected to provide professional engineering services for the design of the subject project. The consultant will prepare the project plans, specifications, and engineering estimates. The project encompasses the intersection shown in Attachment C. The project consists of the removal and replacement of existing curb and gutter, sidewalk, driveways, center median islands, hardscape, curb ramps and asphalt as needed, and traffic signal improvements.

ANALYSIS

The intersection of Valley View Avenue and Alondra Boulevard is a crucial point of traffic in the community, experiencing high levels of use. The planned improvements aim to optimize traffic flow by reducing congestion, minimizing wait times in turning lanes, increasing the intersection's capacity to accommodate more vehicles, and extending its lifespan to better serve the community for years to come.

ENVIRONMENTAL

Not applicable.

DISCUSSION

The Valley View Avenue and Alondra Boulevard Intersection Improvement project aims to enhance roadway safety, upgrade existing infrastructure, and reduce maintenance costs for the City.

SUMMARY/NEXT STEPS

Upon the approval of the City Council on the recommended actions, City staff will coordinate with JMDiaz Inc., on the delivery of the design of the Valley View Avenue and Alondra Boulevard Intersection Improvement project per the proposal dated June 8, 2024. Staff anticipates the construction of this project starting in the fall of 2024.

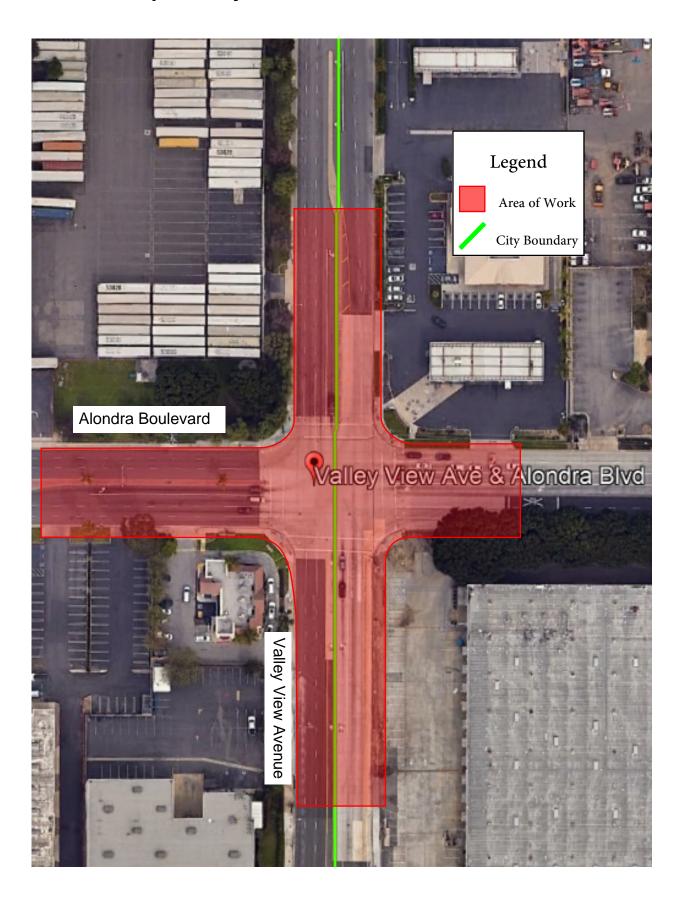

FISCAL IMPACT

The Commercial Street Improvement Project includes Dinard Avenue (PW230503) with a budget of \$450,000.00, Maryton Avenue (PW230502) with a budget of \$530,000.00, Marquardt Avenue (PW230501) with a budget of \$355,000.00, Park Street (PW220502) with a budget of \$320,000.00, and Pike Street (PW230505) with a budget of \$525,000. These projects are approved Capital Improvement Plan projects and will be advertised as a single construction contract to maximize economies of scale. The projects are funded with Redevelopment Project Tax Allocation Bond funds. Although current appropriated project funds are adequate to cover engineering and design tasks, an additional appropriation will be likely at a later date to complete the construction of the projects.

At this time, staff is recommending City Council authorization to Execute Task Order No. 5 in the amount of \$197,270.00 to complete the design phase.

BACKGROUND

On June 11, 2024, Public Works Engineering staff issued a Request for Quote (RFQ) to the approved list of as-needed qualified engineering firms for professional engineering services. The services are for the design of Commercial Street Improvements on Dinard Avenue, Maryton Avenue, Marquardt Avenue, Park Street, and Pike Street. The project will require the preparation of plans, specifications, and engineering estimates by the selected consultant. The project encompasses specific street segments, each with its own requirements for improvement. These include the removal of existing asphalt concrete pavement and the placement of new asphalt pavement. The structural street sections vary, ranging from 4" A.C. Pavement to 9" Aggregate Base, with each street being designed accordingly. Additionally, the project will involve the removal and replacement of curb & gutter, sidewalk, curb ramps, and driveways, as necessary. This work will be carried out on Dinard Avenue from Maryton Avenue to Rosecrans Avenue, Maryton Avenue from Dinard Avenue to Rosecrans Avenue, Marquardt Avenue from Imperial Highway to 625 ft. south of Imperial Highway, Park Street from Shoemaker Avenue to west cul-de-sac, and Pike Street from Norwalk Avenue to west cul-de-sac.

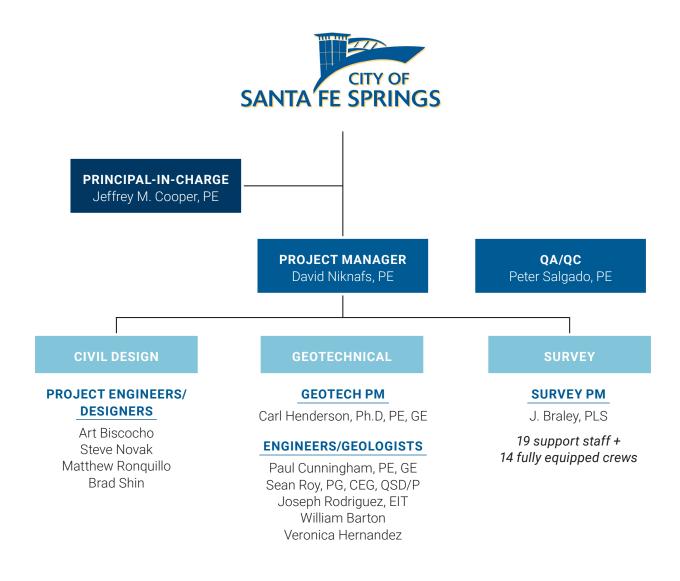

Topographic Survey: NV5 will conduct a field survey of existing topographic features that includes pavement area, driveways, sidewalks, curb and gutter, trees, existing striping, light poles, power poles, pull boxes, manholes, fire hydrants, and any other surface visible utilities. The extents of the survey will be within the limits of the project as shown on the Exhibits attached to the RFQ. Limits of survey will be from back of sidewalk.

PAVEMENT INVESTIGATION

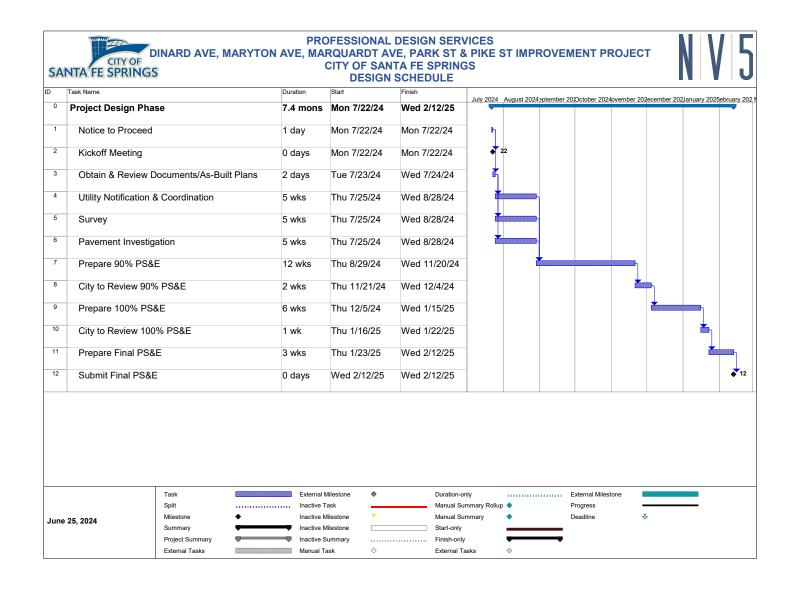

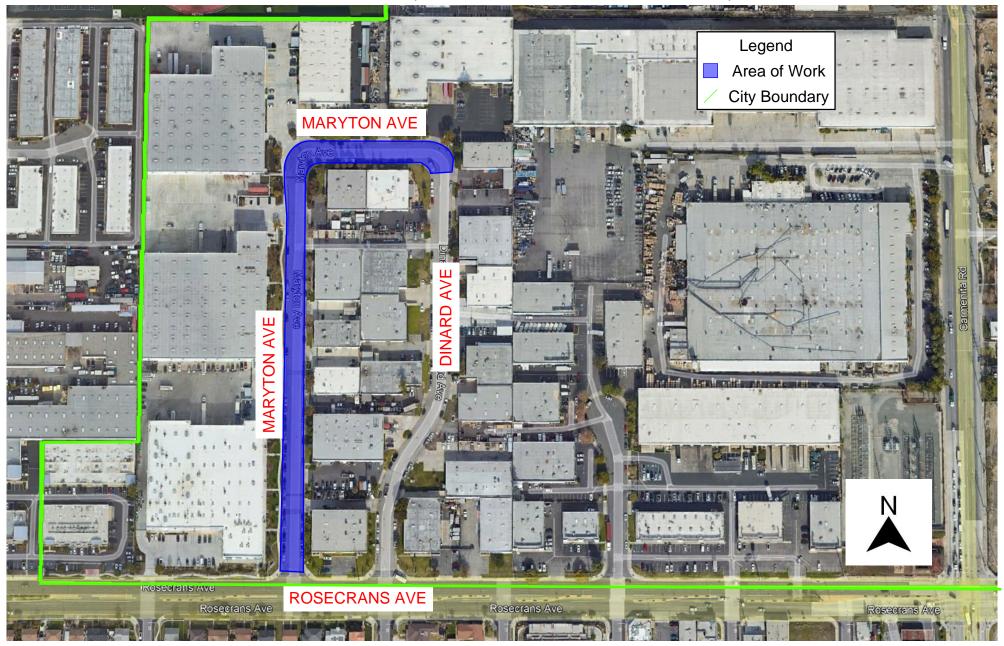

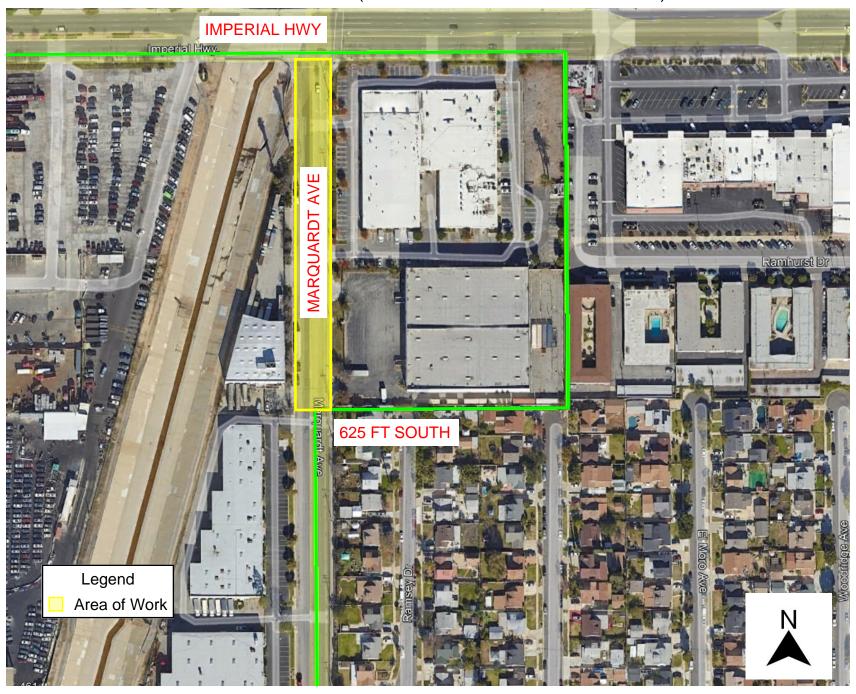
DINARD AVE (MARYTON AVE TO ROSECRANS AVE)



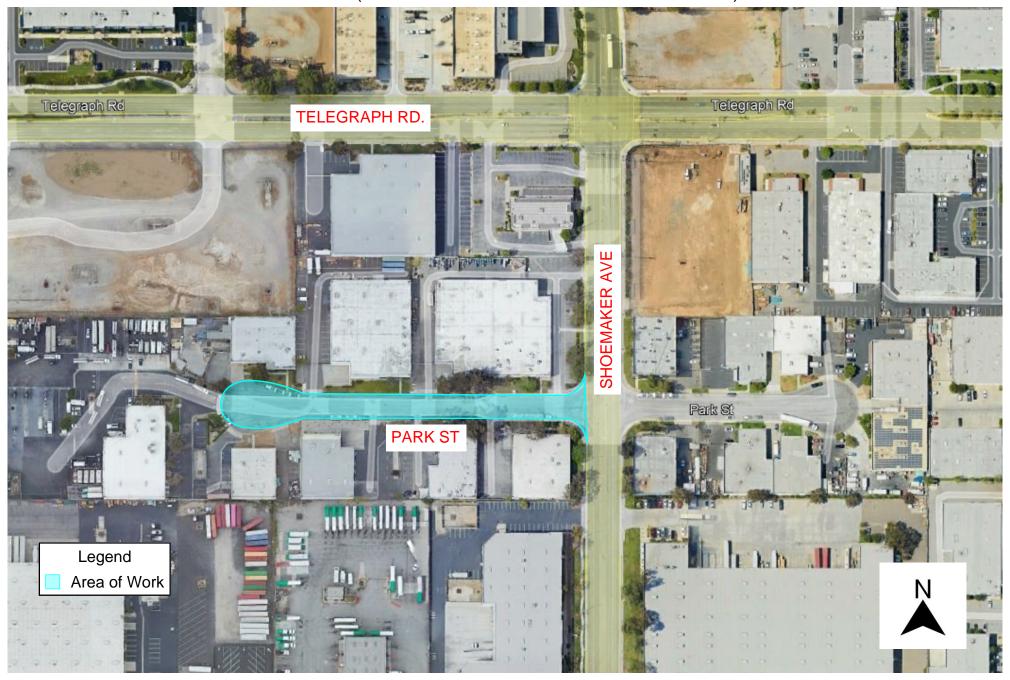
MARYTON AVE (DINARD AVE TO ROSECRANS AVE)



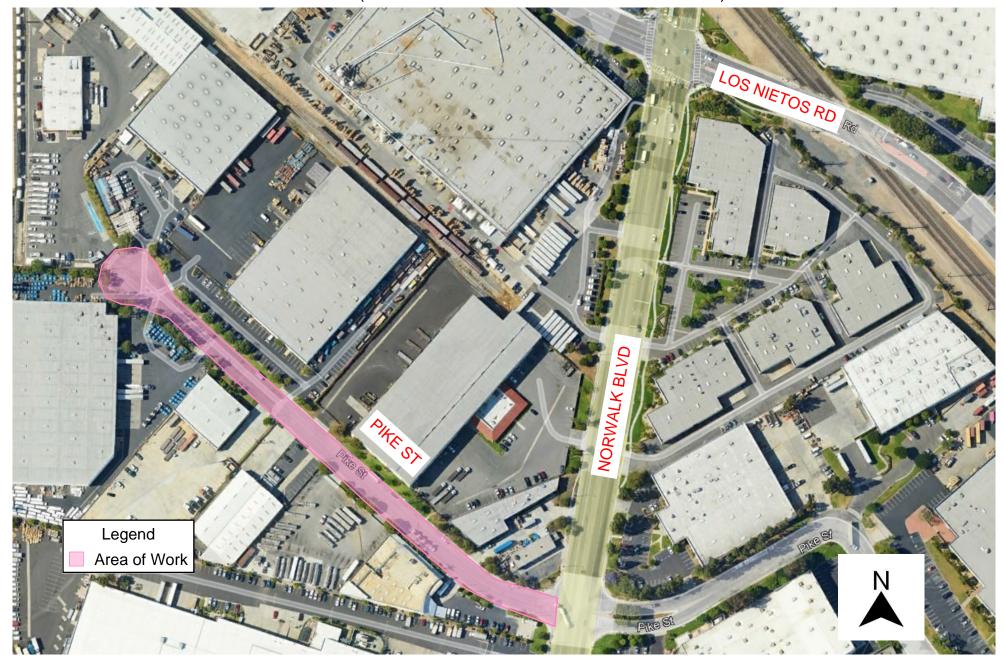
MARQUARDT AVE (IMPERIAL HWY TO 625FT SOUTH)

RECOMMENDATIONS:

It is recommended that the City Council:

- 1) Approve Amendment Number One to the agreement with the City of Irwindale to provide additional signal maintenance services; and
- 2) Authorize the City Manager to execute the amendment on behalf of the City; and
- 3) Take such additional, related, action that may be desirable.

FISCAL IMPACT

Per the terms of the existing agreement, the addition of three newly constructed traffic signals at Arrow Highway and Valley Oak Lane, Live Oak Avenue and Spanish Oak Drive, and Los Angeles Street and Olive Pit Driveway to the monthly routine maintenance program would generate at least \$2,700 per year in additional revenue. Extraordinary repairs will continue to be billed at time and material with prescribed markup, per the terms of the original agreement.

BACKGROUND

In 2014, the City of Santa Fe Springs began providing traffic signal maintenance services to the City of Irwindale. In July 2023, the agreement was updated (Attachment A) and included twenty-four (24) signalized intersections, and two (2) flashing beacons. Recently, Irwindale installed three new intersections and has requested that the Intersections be

added to the routine maintenance agreement. Amendment Number One (Attachment B) adds these new intersections to the agreement. All other terms and conditions of the agreement remain unchanged.

The scope of work and base monthly charges remain the same as Santa Fe Springs will continue to provide routine maintenance to the traffic signals and flashing beacons and extraordinary maintenance as requested by Irwindale.

WITH SANTA FE SPRINGS FOR TRAFFIC SIGNAL MAINTENANCE

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into this <u>26th</u> day of <u>July</u>, <u>2023</u> by and between the City of Irwindale, a Charter City ("Irwindale") and the City of Santa Fe Springs, a municipal corporation ("Contractor"). Contractor and Irwindale are sometimes collectively referred to as ("Parties").

WITNESS

- WHEREAS, on October 23, 2014, Parties entered into Agreement for traffic signal, illuminated street name sign and highway intersection lighting maintenance (the "2014 Agreement"); and
- WHEREAS, Parties desire for this Agreement to supersede and replace the 2014 Agreement; and
- WHEREAS, Irwindale has twenty-four (24) signalized intersections at various locations shared with other agencies, and from time to time, may signalize other intersections; and
- WHEREAS, Irwindale has two (2) yellow flashing beacon locations 100% owned by Irwindale; and
- WHEREAS, Irwindale seeks 24-hour maintenance of Irwindale's traffic signals; and
- **WHEREAS**, Contractor has specialized knowledge, training, and experience in the routine preventative and extraordinary maintenance services of traffic signals; and
- **WHEREAS**, Contractor desires to perform the maintenance services for Irwindale under this Agreement; and
- WHEREAS, Irwindale desires Contractor provide such services, subject to the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement; and
- WHEREAS, the purpose of this Agreement is to provide routine preventative and extraordinary maintenance services for existing traffic signals, and those new traffic signals that from time to time may be installed by Irwindale during the life of this Agreement.

Now, therefore, in consideration of the mutual covenants and conditions set forth herein, the Parties agree as follows:

1. CONTRACT TERM

This Agreement is effective as of date first listed above and upon execution by both Parties and may be terminated at any time in accordance with Section 5 of this Agreement.

2. MANAGEMENT

Irwindale's Director of Engineering / Building Official shall represent Irwindale in all matters pertaining to the administration of this Agreement, review and approval of all products submitted by Contractor, but not including the authority to expand the tasks to be performed or change the compensation due to Contractor. Irwindale's City Manager shall be authorized to act on Irwindale's behalf and to execute all necessary documents which enlarge the tasks to be performed or change Contractor's compensation, subject to Section 4 hereof. Contractor's Director of Engineering / Building Official, or his/her designee, shall represent Contractor in all matters pertaining to the administration of this Agreement for Contractor, but not including the authority to expand the tasks to be performed. Contractor's City Manager, or his/her designee, shall be authorized to act on Contractor's behalf and to execute all necessary documents which enlarge the tasks to be performed or change Contractor's compensation.

3. **SERVICES**

Contractor shall perform the tasks described and set forth in Exhibit B, attached hereto and incorporated herein as though set forth in full. Contractor shall complete the tasks according to the Scope of Work which is also set forth in Exhibit B.

4. PAYMENT

- (a) Irwindale agrees to pay Contractor a flat monthly rate of \$75.00 per signal (24 signals) for routine maintenance and \$40.00 per flasher (2 flashers) per month based upon actual signals inspected and maintained, which represents the parties' reasonable estimate of the actual costs of inspection and maintenance for the signal. Those monthly rates shall be used for billing through June 30, 2024. Thereafter, to ensure an equitable annual cost, the rates may be revised and adjusted based on the most recent Consumer Price Index (CPI) for the Los Angeles area for each fiscal year upon 60 days written notice and written approval by Irwindale. In no event shall the rates be revised or adjusted to an amount that exceeds a 6% increase from the previous fiscal year.
- (b) Contractor shall not be compensated for any services, including extraordinary maintenance, ("additional services") rendered in connection with its performance of this Agreement which are in addition to routine maintenance, unless the additional services are authorized in advance and in writing by Irwindale's Director of Engineering / Building Official or her/his designee. Contractor shall be compensated for any additional services in the amounts and in the manner as agreed to by Irwindale's Director of Engineering / Building Official or her/his designee and Contractor at the time

Irwindale's written authorization has been given to Contractor for the performance of those services. Irwindale's City Manager may approve amendments to this Agreement for additional work up to the amount authorized pursuant to the most recent Irwindale Council-approved administrative policies relating to Irwindale's City Manager's authority to enter into new agreements. Any additional services in excess of that amount shall be approved by Irwindale's City Council.

- (c) Contractor will submit invoices monthly for actual routine maintenance, extraordinary maintenance and additional services satisfactorily performed. Invoices shall be submitted on or about the tenth business day of each month, or as soon thereafter as practical, for services provided in the previous month. Payment shall be made within thirty days (30 days) after receipt of each invoice as to all non-disputed fees. If Irwindale disputes any of Contractor's fees, then it shall give written notice to Contractor within thirty days (30 days) after receipt of an invoice of any disputed fees set forth on the invoice.
- (d) The first bill in each fiscal year for routine maintenance shall show the itemization of salaries and wages, material equipment, and appropriate overheads upon which the flat rates referred to in Section 4a, are based. Materials shall include miscellaneous items of service and expense. All bills for extraordinary maintenance and additional services shall show the itemization specified above.
- (e) Payment for extraordinary maintenance and additional services shall include actual salaries, wages, parts and equipment costs and may include an additional 17% added to salaries and wages for overhead and to equipment for depreciation and that 17% shall be shown as separate line items in the invoices for extraordinary maintenance. The cost of parts or supplies is based on actual costs plus a 15% markup. In addition, Contractor's services will be billed on an actual invoice plus a 10% markup.

5. <u>TERMINATION OF AGREEMENT WITHOUT CAUSE</u>

- (a) Irwindale or Contractor may at any time, for any reason, with or without cause, terminate this Agreement, or any portion hereof, by serving upon the other party at least ninety days' (90 days') prior written notice. Upon receipt of said notice, Contractor shall immediately cease all work under the Agreement, unless notice provides otherwise. If Irwindale terminates a portion of the Agreement, then such termination shall not make void or invalidate the remainder of this Agreement.
- (b) In the event this Agreement is terminated pursuant to this Section, Irwindale shall pay to Contractor the actual value of the work satisfactorily performed up to the time of termination. Upon termination of the Agreement pursuant to this Section, Contractor will submit an invoice to Irwindale pursuant to Section 4.

6. DEFAULT OF CONTRACTOR

- (a) Contractor's failure to comply with the provisions of this Agreement shall constitute a default. In the event Contractor is in default for cause under the terms of this Agreement, Irwindale shall have no obligation or duty to continue compensating Contractor for any work performed after the date of default and can terminate this Agreement immediately by written notice to Contractor following notice of default and an opportunity to cure, as set forth in subsection (b) of this Section. If such failure by Contractor to make progress in the performance of work hereunder arises out of causes beyond Contractor's control, and without fault or negligence of Contractor, then it shall not be considered a default.
- (b) If Irwindale's City Manager or his/her delegate determines Contractor is in default in the performance of any of the terms of this Agreement, then he/she shall cause to be served upon Contractor a written notice of the default. Contractor shall have ten days (10 days) after service upon it of said notice in which to cure the default by rendering a satisfactory performance. In the event that Contractor fails to cure its default within such period of time, Irwindale shall have the right, notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, to terminate this Agreement without further notice and without prejudice to any other remedy to which it may be entitled at law, in equity or under this Agreement.

7. OWNERSHIP OF DOCUMENTS

- (a) Contractor shall maintain complete and accurate records with respect to sales, costs, expenses, receipts, and other such information required by Irwindale that relates to the performance of services under this Agreement. Contractor shall maintain adequate records of services provided in sufficient detail to permit an evaluation of services. All such records shall be maintained and shall be clearly identified and readily accessible. Contractor shall provide free access to the representatives of Irwindale or its designees at reasonable times to such books and records; shall permit Irwindale to make transcripts therefrom as necessary; and shall allow inspection of all work, data, documents, proceedings, and activities related to this Agreement. Such records, together with supporting documents, shall be maintained for a period of three (3) years after receipt of final payment.
- (b) Upon completion of, or in the event of termination of this Agreement, all original documents, designs, drawings, maps, models, computer files, surveys, notes, and other documents prepared in the course of providing the services to be performed pursuant to this Agreement shall become the sole property of Irwindale and may be used, reused, or otherwise disposed of by Irwindale without the permission of Contractor. With respect to computer files, Contractor shall make available to Irwindale, at Contractor's office and upon reasonable written request by Irwindale, the necessary computer software and hardware for purposes of accessing, compiling, transferring, and printing computer files.

8. INDEMNIFICATION

- (a) Neither Irwindale nor any officer or employee of Irwindale shall be responsible for any damage or liability occurring by reason of any acts or omissions on the part of Contractor under or in connection with any work, authority, or jurisdiction delegated to or determined to be the responsibility of Contractor under this Agreement. It is also understood and agreed, pursuant to Government Code, Section 895.4, Irwindale shall fully indemnify, defend, and hold harmless Contractor from any liability imposed for injury (as defined by Government Code, Section 810.8) occurring by reason of any acts or omissions on the part of Irwindale under or in connection with any work, authority, or jurisdiction delegated to or determined to be the responsibility of Irwindale under this Agreement.
- (b) Neither Contractor nor any officer or employee of Contractor shall be responsible for any damage or liability occurring by reason of any acts or omissions on the part of Irwindale under or in connection with any work, authority, or jurisdiction delegated to or determined to be the responsibility of Irwindale under this Agreement. It is also understood and agreed, pursuant to Government Code, Section 895.4, Contractor shall fully indemnify, defend, and hold harmless Irwindale from any liability imposed for injury (as defined by Government Code, Section 810.8) occurring by reason of any acts or omissions on the part of Contractor under or in connection with any work, authority, or jurisdiction delegated to or determined to be the responsibility of Contractor under this Agreement.

9. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR

- (a) Contractor is and shall at all times remain as to Irwindale a wholly independent Contractor. The personnel performing the services under this Agreement on behalf of Contractor shall at all times be under Contractor's exclusive direction and control. Neither Irwindale nor any of its officers, employees, or agents shall have control over the conduct of Contractor or any of Contractor's officers, employees or agents, except as set forth in this Agreement. Contractor shall not at any time or in any manner represent it or any of its officers, employees, or agents are in any manner officers, employees, or agents of Irwindale. Contractor shall not incur or have the power to incur any debt, obligation, or liability whatever against Irwindale, or bind Irwindale in any manner.
- (b) No employee benefits shall be available to Contractor in connection with the performance of this Agreement. Except for the fees paid to Consultant as provided in the Agreement, Irwindale shall not pay salaries, wages, or other compensation to Contractor for performing services hereunder for Irwindale. Irwindale shall not be liable for compensation or indemnification to Contractor for injury or sickness arising out of performing services hereunder.

10. **LEGAL RESPONSIBILITIES**

Contractor shall keep itself informed of State and Federal laws and regulations which in any manner affect those employed by it or in any way affect the performance of its service pursuant to this Agreement. Contractor shall at all times observe and comply with all such laws and regulations. Irwindale, and its officers and employees, shall not be liable at law or in equity occasioned by failure of Contractor to comply with the Section.

11. NO BENEFIT TO ARISE TO LOCAL EMPLOYEES

No member, officer, or employee of Irwindale or Contractor, or their designees or agents, and no public official who exercises authority over responsibilities with respect to the services performed under this Agreement during his/her tenure or for one year thereafter, shall have any interest, direct or indirect, in any agreement or sub-agreement, or the proceeds thereof, for work to be performed in connection with this Agreement.

12. RELEASE OF INFORMATION/CONFLICTS OF INTEREST

- (a) All information gained by Contractor in performance of this Agreement shall be considered confidential and shall not be released by Contractor without Irwindale's prior written authorization. Contractor, its officers, employees, agents, or subcontractors, shall not without written authorization from the Irwindale's City Manager or unless requested by the Irwindale's City Attorney, voluntarily provide declarations, letters of support, testimony at depositions, response to interrogatories, or other information concerning the work performed under this Agreement. Response to a public records request, subpoena, or court order shall not be considered "voluntary" provided Contractor gives Irwindale notice of such request, court order or subpoena.
- (b) Contractor shall promptly notify Irwindale should Contractor, its officers, agents, or subcontractors be served with any summons, complaint, subpoena, notice of deposition, request for documents, interrogatories, request for admissions, or other discovery request, court order, or subpoena from any person or party regarding this Agreement and the work performed thereunder. Irwindale retains the right, but has no obligation, to represent Contractor (with Contractor consent) and/or be present at any deposition, hearing, or similar proceeding. Contractor agrees to cooperate fully with Irwindale and to provide the opportunity to review any response to discovery requests provided by Contractor. However, Irwindale's right to review any such response does not imply or mean the right by Irwindale to control, direct, or rewrite said response.

13. NOTICES

Any notices which either party may desire to give to the other party under this Agreement must be in writing and may be given either by 1) personal service; 2) delivery by a reputable document delivery service, such as, but not limited to, Federal Express, which provides a receipt showing date and time of delivery; or 3) mailing in the United States Mail, certified mail, postage prepaid, return receipt requested, addressed to the address of the party as set forth below or at any other address as the party may later designate by notice.

14. ASSIGNMENT

Contractor shall, under no circumstances, assign this Agreement, in whole or in part, to another party without the express written consent of the City Council of Irwindale. On occasion, Contractor is allowed to use subcontractors for specialty items, such as installation of loop detectors, crane work, boring for underground conduits, etc.; provided, that Contractor has notified Irwindale's Director of Engineering / Building Official of such work.

15. GOVERNING LAW

Irwindale and Contractor understand and agree that the laws of the State of California shall govern the rights, obligations, duties, and liabilities of the parties to this Agreement and also govern the interpretation of this Agreement. Any litigation concerning this Agreement shall take place in the State or Federal district court with jurisdiction over Irwindale.

16. ENTIRE AGREEMENT

This Agreement contains the entire understanding between Parties relating to the obligations of Parties described in this Agreement. All prior or previous agreements, including, but not limited to, the 2014 Agreement, understandings, representations, and statements, oral or written, are replaced and superseded by this Agreement and shall be of no further force or effect. Parties are entering into this Agreement based solely upon the representations set forth herein and upon each party's own independent investigation of any and all facts such party deems material. Subsequent modifications to this

CITY OF IRWINDALE AGREEMENT – EXHIBIT "B"

SCOPE OF WORK

The work to be done, in general, consists of furnishing all labor, materials, tools, equipment and incidentals (unless otherwise specified), to maintain Irwindale's twenty-four (24) signalized intersections, and two (2) flashing beacons 100% Irwindale owned as shown on Exhibit "A", in a safe, satisfactory and workmanlike manner.

Contractor shall employ, at a minimum, generally accepted standards and practices utilized by persons engaged in similar services, as are required by Contractor, in meeting its obligations under this Agreement. All services required under this Agreement will be performed by Contractor, and all personnel shall possess the qualifications, permits and licenses required by the State and local law to perform such services.

A. Permits and Licenses

Contractor shall procure all permits and licenses, and give all notices necessary and incidental to the due and lawful prosecution of the Agreement.

B. Patents

Contractor shall assume all responsibilities arising from the use of patented materials, equipment, devices, or processes used on or incorporated in the work.

C. Equipment Required

Contractor shall be equipped with spare parts sufficient to return a defective signal to operation following ordinary trouble calls. In those cases where a complex controller or component has to be repaired, Contractor shall install a substitute controller or component of its own, while it is repairing the defective controller or component.

D. Records

Contractor shall maintain a record of all service calls and work performed upon the signal equipment, listing dates, arrival time to location, hour of day, description of service work performed, and the certified technician's name who completed the work. A copy of such record shall be maintained at all times within the controller cabinet of each signal location.

A log sheet giving a brief description of all routine and extraordinary maintenance activities shall be attached to each monthly invoice. Each invoice, including attachments, shall have a minimum of the following but not limited to:

- 1. Location of intersection
- Technician Name

- 3. Detailed breakdown of work performed
- 4. Date of invoice and date of work performed
- 5. Technician arrival time
- 6. Requestor's name and call back number
- 7. Description of damaged work and work performed
- 8. Invoice number
- Purchase Order Number

E. Shutdowns

Contractor shall request the assistance from Irwindale's Public Works Department at (626) 430-2259 or (626) 430-2210 and notify Irwindale's Director of Engineering / Building Official or her/his authorized representative or designee at (626) 430-2259 or (626) 430-2210, of any signal turn-offs or turn-ons, if traffic is very heavy and Contractor feels it cannot safely bring up the signal.

F. Compliance

Contractor shall comply with all applicable codes, ordinances, laws, rules, regulations.

G. <u>Labor Strike</u>

It shall be the responsibility of Contractor to provide continuous maintenance services, without any interruption, of all traffic signals in Irwindale. In case of a labor strike, Contractor shall provide other means, at his own cost, to provide comparable continuous service as if there were no strike. Failing to do so will cause Irwindale to take whatever action is deemed necessary to provide such service, and the cost will be borne by Contractor.

H. Failure to Perform

If Contractor neglects to perform any of the work properly, or fails to perform any provision of this contract, then Irwindale, within three (3) days after written notice to Contractor, may, without prejudice to any other remedy it may have, make good on such deficiencies, and may deduct the cost thereof from the payment then or thereafter due Contractor; provided, however, that Irwindale's Director of Engineering / Building Official shall approve such action, and certify the amount thereof to be charged to Contractor.

I. Measurement and Payment

Payment shall be made on a monthly basis for all work satisfactorily completed the prior month. A single invoice that itemizes as follows is required:

- Routine Maintenance work; and
- Extraordinary Maintenance work

J. Routine Maintenance

The price for Routine Maintenance shall include the following services, and any other service not specified in this subsection shall fall under the category of "Extraordinary Maintenance."

(1) Coordination Timing

For non-interconnected pre-timed systems of pre-timed controllers, Contractor shall check coordination timing not less than once each month.

(2) Monthly Inspections

Contractor shall perform monthly inspections of each signalized intersection as follows:

(a) Walk the intersection and visually inspect all signal heads for proper operation, alignment, broken lenses, and missing or damaged parts.

During the walk around, depress all pedestrian push buttons, and observe for proper timing operation and display. As soon as possible, replace broken parts, or change parts and align signal heads, adjust all vehicle or pedestrian signals as necessary. Such repairs would be payable under Section K (Extraordinary Maintenance of this Agreement).

- (b) Closely examine the functioning of the traffic controller in relation to the approaching traffic, and compare the timing chart to the intervals that are timed by the traffic controller. Correct the time of intervals, if necessary, as per the timing card and note any changes on the P.M. sheet.
- (c) Observe traffic as it approaches the intersection, in order to determine if the detector loops, detector loop cables, and amplifiers are operating properly. Adjust or re-tune detect amplifiers, if necessary.
- (d) Inspect all load switches, ground-level photo-cells, dials, controller cabinet switches, relays, clocks, cabinet locks, cabinet mechanisms, cooling fans, etc., and make routine adjustments or minor repairs, if necessary.
- (e) Clean the controller cabinet; vacuum if necessary; remove any foreign material. Look for water or excessive dampness inside the cabinet. Determine the cause, and remedy the condition. Check the filter, and replace it if necessary.

- (f) Maintain a clear and accurate record of the field inspection in the controller cabinet. This record will include the monthly inspection summary showing the date and time checked, and who checked it. If a controller needs to be replaced due to malfunctioning and needs repair, then Contractor shall notify Irwindale's Public Works Department within 24 hours of controller replacement. Any replacement controller shall be adjusted to reflect the timing and settings according to the timing chart.
- (g) Replace the air filter elements in all cabinets so equipped, every twelve (12) months during the term of this Agreement.
- (h) A nighttime survey (Night Tour) shall be conducted quarterly to inspect and identify any inoperable intersection lighting, street lighting, soffit lighting, and illuminated street name signing. A report of all findings and actions from such survey shall be sent to Irwindale's Director of Engineering / Building Official for review.
- (i) Notify Irwindale's Public Works Department when the visibility of traffic signal indications or intersection lighting is impaired by trees, shrubbery, or other obstacles.

K. <u>Extraordinary Maintenance</u>

Extraordinary Maintenance shall consist of the following:

- Repair of failure or malfunction of the signal system if caused by vehicle collision, vandalism, civil disorder, windstorm, natural disasters, street construction, replacement or excavation; or
- Minor upgrading or installation as directed by Irwindale.
- Repair of broken lenses, missing or damaged parts, burned-out indications, etc. that are found during the monthly Routine Maintenance and Night Tour inspections.

(1) Repair

Contractor shall repair any and all defective parts of the signal system that cause the signal failure or malfunction, as the occasion arises, such as the signal controller, pedestrian timers, timing dial, master controllers, coordinating units, (State of California) synchronizer and interconnect, flashers, all kinds of burnouts, detector loops, push buttons, sensing units, communication hardware, and wiring systems, etc., unless the failure or malfunction falls in the category of "Routine Maintenance" as defined in this Agreement.

(2) <u>Loop Detector Replacement</u>

Once it is determined by Irwindale a loop detector has so deteriorated that applying more epoxy is insufficient, the loop detector shall be replaced upon receiving approval from Irwindale's Director of Engineering / Building Official. Contractor shall provide a schedule for installation of any loop detectors with an estimated completion date.

(3) <u>Lamp Replacement</u>

Contractor shall replace all lamps and Light Emitting Diodes (LED's) in all signals on an 80% depletion curve, in accordance with the time schedule contained in the specifications. All traffic signal lamps must conform to the standards of the N.E.M.A., U.L., E.I.A., A.S.T.M., A.N.S.I., and any local ordinance that may apply.

If incandescent lamps are present and are in need of replacement based upon the above criteria, Contractor shall replace the lamp to an approved manufacturer LED.

Contractor agrees and acknowledges Irwindale's traffic signals contain LED's, which include red, amber and green balls and arrows.

(4) <u>LED Replacement</u>

Contractor agrees to use only standard traffic signal LED's equivalent in performance, reliability and durability to those manufactured to California Department Transportation's (Caltrans) standards. Contractor agrees to supply all labor and equipment to perform the re-lamping function, with the cost of the LED's and associated installation labor to be invoiced to Irwindale. Contractor shall clean, polish and inspect all lenses and reflectors at the time the traffic signals are re-lamped. At this time, all broken or deteriorated parts will be replaced or changed, as necessary, signal heads aligned, mast arm mounted, street name signs adjusted, and optically programmed signal heads adjusted.

(5) Pedestrian Signals and Street Name Signs

Contractor shall replace pedestrian signal modules and internally illuminated street name sign lamps, as they become dim or inoperative. Contractor shall also replace ballasts and transformers for these units as required.

(6) <u>Lighting at Intersections</u>

Intersection lighting at signalized intersections are to be replaced as they become inoperative, or when directed by Irwindale. High pressure sodium lamps are to be used for replacement.

(7) Emergency Service

Contractor shall maintain a 24-hour per day emergency service for the replacement of burned-out lamps or LED's, turned heads and controller malfunctions, or any damage creating a public hazard. The intersections where said traffic signals are located shall be monitored during monthly inspection and quarterly night tours by Contractor or his representatives. Contractor shall repair parts, replace parts and lamps or LED's, and otherwise keep the traffic signals in good working condition. Contractor shall maintain a local telephone number where representatives of Contractor can be reached 24 hours per day. This telephone number is to be made available to all persons designated bγ Irwindale.

Contractor shall make immediate service calls on an emergency basis, responding within two (2) hours in the event of malfunctions of the controller or signal system, or turned head.

(8) Notification

Contractor shall contact Irwindale's Director of Engineering / Building Official regarding any Extraordinary Maintenance work (except that necessary to maintain operation) that exceeds \$1000 in cost and seek approval from Irwindale's Director of Engineering / Building Official before the work is scheduled or commenced.

(9) Emergencies

When directed by Irwindale, Contractor shall respond immediately to emergency calls such as a total blackout, and dispatch the qualified personnel and equipment to reach the site within two (2) hours of Irwindale's direction under normal circumstances.

For an emergency repair of a signal that requires the turning off of power to the signal, the following procedure of traffic control shall apply.

(a) Contractor shall dispatch qualified personnel and equipment to reach the site within two (2) hours of Irwindale's direction.

Contractor's vehicle shall carry stop signs, traffic cones and other equipment that shall be used when directing traffic during an emergency and/or when deemed necessary by the signal technician, Irwindale's Director of Engineering / Building Official, or her/his designated representative.

(10) Materials

Materials used in Extraordinary Maintenance shall be paid at Contractor's actual cost from the supplier, plus a 15% markup. All materials and parts shall be new or have the approval of Irwindale's Director of Engineering / Building Official, if otherwise not new. Irwindale has the right to inspect Contractor's records to verify any material costs used for work relating to Extraordinary Maintenance.

(11) Direct Labor

As part of its monthly invoice, Contractor shall present a record of hours spent on Extraordinary Maintenance of traffic signals and appurtenances per intersection. Irwindale shall pay Contractor's direct cost for such hours of Extraordinary Maintenance as stated below:

Regular time rates will be charged to Irwindale for labor between 6:00 am to 5:00 pm, Monday through Friday. Overtime rates will be charged to Irwindale for labor between 5:00 pm and 6:00 am on weekdays, and 24 hours on Saturdays, Sundays and holidays. Under this Agreement, holidays mean New Year's Day, Martin Luther King Jr.'s Birthday, Lincoln's Birthday, President's Day, Cesar Chavez's Birthday, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Veteran's Day, Thanksgiving Day, Day after Thanksgiving Day, the day before Christmas from 12 noon to 5:00 pm, if Christmas falls on a day other than Saturday, Sunday or Monday, Christmas Day, the day after Christmas, in those years in which Christmas falls on a Thursday and every day appointed by the President or Governor for a public fast, thanksgiving, or holiday.

(12) Equipment

Irwindale shall pay Contractor's direct cost for equipment used in Extraordinary Maintenance. All salvaged or damaged materials that cannot be repaired or reused shall be delivered by Contractor to a location designated by Irwindale's Engineer. All damaged materials that can be repaired for re-use in Contractor's signal shop, shall be removed to the shop for such repairs, and shall be reinstalled when repaired

(13) Painting

Contractor shall provide a cost to Irwindale to repaint all, signal heads, back plates and visors, unless directed otherwise by Irwindale, at least once during the term of this Agreement. Repainting shall be conducted by a method mutually agreed to by both parties.

(14) Maintenance and Inspections

Contractor shall provide intersection lighting and/or street lighting maintenance and inspections in the City of Irwindale.

(15) Conflict Monitor Testing

Contractor shall provide conflict monitor testing. If Contractor determines a conflict monitor unit is defective or malfunctioning, then Contractor shall conduct repairs in accordance with Sections K.(1) and K.(8) above.

L. Protection and Traffic Control

(1) Protection

Contractor shall be responsible for, and shall provide and maintain all required barricades, railings, lights and warning signs, and shall take all necessary precautions to avoid injury or damage to any person or property, and shall, at its own cost and expense, defend, protect and indemnify Irwindale against any claim or liability arising from, or based on the lack of proper safeguards or negligence, whether by himself or his agents, employees or subcontractors.

Contractor shall protect all work, materials and equipment from damage from any cause whatsoever, and provide adequate and proper storage facilities during the progress of the work. It shall provide for the safety and good condition of all work, and replace all damaged or defective work, materials and equipment.

Contractor shall exercise diligence to avoid damage to sprinkler piping, valves, trees, planting, turf, etc., in addition to buildings, structures, pavement, fences and footings. Any required tree branch trimming or removal shall be brought to the attention of Irwindale promptly, and shall be performed by Irwindale personnel.

M. Traffic Control

Traffic control shall conform to the California Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices (California MUTCD), latest edition, and must be approved by Irwindale's Director of Engineering / Building Official or his/her designee.

Contractor shall conduct his operation as to cause the least possible obstruction and inconvenience to vehicular and pedestrian traffic.

Contractor shall furnish, erect and maintain such fences, barriers, lights, warning devices and signs in compliance with the California MUTCD, latest edition, or as may be deemed necessary by Irwindale's Director of Engineering / Building Official, to give adequate warning to the public at all times the road or street is obstructed, and of any abnormal conditions to be encountered as a result thereof.

(1) Payment for Traffic Control

Payment for barricading, protection and vehicular and pedestrian traffic control shall be included in the cost estimate for extraordinary maintenance to adequately perform the work involved to the satisfaction of Irwindale's Director of Engineering / Building Official.

N. <u>Guarantee</u>

Contractor hereby guarantees the entire work performed by it under this Agreement will meet fully all requirements thereof as to quality of workmanship and materials furnished by it.

Contractor hereby agrees to make, as its own expense, any repairs or replacements made necessary by defects in materials or workmanship supplied by it that become known within one (1) year of the repair or replacement and upon notice to Contractor regarding said defects.

O. Record Requests

At the request of Irwindale's Director of Engineering / Building Official or her/his designee, Contractor shall provide timing chart information, cost account information or any other documentation related to services provided by Contractor. All third party requests for records shall be routed through the City of Irwindale's Director of Engineering / Building Official and all requested records will be routed to the Director of Engineering / Building Official for release to the third party. Contractor shall be entitled to compensation for such requests on a time and materials basis in accordance with Section 4.(e) of the Agreement.

AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE TO THE AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CITY OF IRWINDALE AND SANTA FE SPRINGS FOR TRAFFIC SIGNAL MAINTENANCE

THIS AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ("Amendment") to the City of Irwindale Agreement with Santa Fe Springs for Traffic Signal Maintenance ("Agreement") is made and entered into this 16th day of July, 2024, by and between the CITY OF IRWINDALE, a Charter City ("Irwindale"), and the CITY OF SANTA FE SPRINGS, a general law city and municipal corporation ("Contractor").

SECTION 1. Pursuant to Section 16 of the Agreement dated July 26, 2023 Section 4(a) (Payment) is amended to read as follows:

- (a) Irwindale agrees to pay Contractor a flat monthly rate of \$75.00 per signal (27 signals) and \$40.00 per flasher (2 flashers or flasher equivalent devices), as listed in Exhibit A, for routine maintenance based upon actual signals inspected and maintained. Those monthly rates shall be used for billing. Thereafter, to ensure an equitable annual cost, the rates may be revised and adjusted for each fiscal year upon 60 days written notice and written approval by Irwindale."
- <u>SECTION 2.</u> Exhibit A (Location for Maintenance of Traffic Control Devices) is replaced by Exhibit A attached to this Amendment to include three new signalized intersections.
- **SECTION 3.** The first paragraph of Exhibit B attached to the Agreement is deleted and replaced with the following:

The work to be done, in general, consists of furnishing all labor, materials, tools, equipment and incidentals (unless otherwise specified), to maintain the 100% Irwindale owned traffic control devices as shown on Exhibit "A", in a safe, satisfactory and workmanlike manner.

- **SECTION 4.** This Amendment may be executed in any number or counterparts, each of which will be an original, but all of which together constitutes one instrument executed on the same date.
- **SECTION 5.** Except as modified by this Amendment, all other terms and conditions of the Agreement remain the same.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council:

- 1) Approve Amendment Number Two to the agreement with the City of Paramount to provide additional signal maintenance services; and
- 2) Authorize the City Manager to execute the amendment on behalf of the City; and
- 3) Take such additional, related, action that may be desirable.

FISCAL IMPACT

Per the terms of the existing agreement, the addition of one newly constructed traffic signal at Alondra Boulevard and Passage Avenue to the monthly routine maintenance program would generate at least \$840 per year in additional revenue. Extraordinary repairs will continue to be billed at time and material with prescribed markup, per the terms of the original agreement.

BACKGROUND

In September 1995, the City of Santa Fe Springs began providing traffic signal maintenance services to the City of Paramount including flashing beacons, radar feedback signs, in-pavement LED lighted crosswalk and Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacon (RRFB). The agreement was amended in 2020 (Amendment No. 1, Attachment A) to add intersections.

In December 2023, a letter (Attachment C) was received from the City of Paramount requesting the addition to the contract of a newly constructed traffic signal at Alondra Boulevard and Passage Avenue.

ANALYSIS

The scope of work and base monthly charges remain the same as Santa Fe Springs will continue to provide routine maintenance to the traffic signals, flashing beacons, in-pavement lighting, and radar feedback signs. Extraordinary maintenance will continue to be provided as requested by the City of Paramount.

SUMMARY/NEXT STEPS

Upon the approval of the City Council of the recommended actions, City staff will coordinate with the City of Paramount on the addition, to the signal maintenance services, of the newly installed traffic signal. The recommended action will amend the existing agreement (Attachment A) and will increase revenue by at least \$840 per year.

AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT made and entered into this 21st day of Sept., 1995, by and between the CITY OF SANTA FE SPRINGS, a municipal corporation, sometimes hereinafter referred to as "SANTA FE SPRINGS," and PARAMOUNT, a municipal corporation, hereinafter sometimes referred to as "PARAMOUNT."

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, SANTA FE SPRINGS desires to provide for the maintenance of traffic signal, street name sign and highway safety lighting installations at locations which are wholly under jurisdiction of PARAMOUNT, and to arrange herein for the particular maintenance functions to be performed and to specify the cost of such maintenance;

NOW THEREFORE, it is mutually agreed as follows:

- 1. SANTA FE SPRINGS will perform, at a level of service equal to that which SANTA FE SPRINGS performs for SANTA FE SPRINGS-owned traffic signals, routine traffic signal maintenance, hereinafter referred to as "routine maintenance," and extraordinary traffic signal maintenance, illuminated street name sign and highway safety lighting maintenance, hereinafter referred to as "extraordinary maintenance," at locations shown in Appendix "A."
- 2. Routine maintenance includes patrolling for traffic signal malfunctions, illuminated street name sign and highway safety lighting outages; inspection, testing, and timing of traffic signal controllers, and field repairs made during routine inspection.
- 3. SANTA FE SPRINGS shall establish a flat monthly rate per intersection for routine maintenance of \$54 during the first year of the agreement. The monthly rate per intersection will increase to \$57 effective October 1, 1996 and to \$60 effective October 1, 1997. This monthly rate shall be the average monthly cost of routine maintenance for all traffic signals that SANTA FE SPRINGS maintains and operates, regardless of location. These monthly rates shall be used for billing. Thereafter the rates may be revised and adjusted for each fiscal year to ensure an equitable annual cost.
- 4. Extraordinary maintenance includes addition or replacement of major traffic signal, illuminated street name sign and highway safety lighting equipment due to obsolescence, wear or inadequacy; repair due to damage from any cause, including vandalism, except those field repairs made to equipment internal to the controller cabinet during routine maintenance inspection calls; replacement of inductive loop detectors; repainting of signal heads; and relamping and replacement of ballasts for illuminated street name signs and highway safety lighting. Excepted are those highway safety lighting installations owned and maintained by the Southern California Edison Company.

- 5. Extraordinary maintenance which exceeds \$500 in cost (except that necessary to maintain operation) shall be subject to the prior approval of PARAMOUNT authorized designate, when performed by SANTA FE SPRINGS. Denial of such approval shall void the provisions of Paragraph 10.
- 6. PARAMOUNT will provide for the furnishing of electrical energy at locations shown in Appendix "A."
- 7. Bills for routine maintenance and extraordinary maintenance, shall be rendered monthly. The first bill for routine maintenance in the fiscal year shall show the itemization of salaries and wages, material, equipment, and appropriate overheads upon which the flat rates referred to in Paragraph 3 are based. Materials shall include miscellaneous items of service and expense. All bills for extraordinary maintenance shall show the itemization specified above.
- 8. On bills for extraordinary maintenance, 5% will be added to salaries and wages for overhead and to equipment costs for depreciation of equipment. These percentages, if added, shall be shown as separate items in the rates for extraordinary maintenance. These percentages will increase to 10% on October 1, 1996 and to 15% on October 1, 1997.
- Traffic signal, illuminated street name sign or highway safety lighting installations may be added to or deleted from Appendix "A," under the terms of this Agreement by so stipulating in subsequent agreements or by written approval of both the City Engineer of the City of Santa Fe Springs and Paramount's authorized designate.
- 10. SANTA FE SPRINGS shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless PARAMOUNT, its officers, agents, and employees from and against any loss, costs, expense, claim or liability of any kind, including claims for property damage, personal injury, or death, arising from negligent or wrongful acts or omissions of SANTA FE SPRINGS, its officers, agents or employees in the performance of this Agreement. PARAMOUNT shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless SANTA FE SPRINGS, its officers, agents and employees from and against any loss, costs, expense, claim or liability of any kind, including claims for property damage, personal injury, or death, arising from negligent or wrongful acts or omissions of PARAMOUNT, its officers, agents or employees in the performance of this Agreement or arising from any dangerous condition of public property owned by PARAMOUNT other than dangerous conditions created by, arising from, or continuing due to, negligent or wrongful acts or omissions of SANTA FE SPRINGS, its officers, agents or employees in the performance of this Agreement.
- 11. Each party agrees to fully cooperate with the other and assist the other party hereto in all matters relating to losses covered by the terms of this agreement, and more specifically but not being limited thereby, each party will:
 - (a) Give prompt notification of all occurrences covered or likely to be covered by the terms hereof, together with the particulars thereof to the other party hereto.

- (b) If claim is made, or suit is brought against a party on occurrences covered or likely to be covered by the terms hereof, such party shall immediately forward every claim, demand, notice, summons or other process received by it to the other party hereto.
- (c) Provide the other party to this Agreement upon request prompt access to any and all records in its possession or control which pertain to any claim or suit relating to losses covered by the terms of this Agreement.
- 12. Failure by either party to perform its promises under Paragraph 11(b) of this Agreement with reasonably promptness shall release the other party from its duties to indemnify, defend and hold harmless under Paragraph 10 of this Agreement.
- 13. Any party may at its own cost participate in the defense of any suit, or in the prosecution of any appeal affecting matters herein involved where the duty of defense or prosecution is imposed on the other party, and where the other party has consented thereto.
- 14. On termination by PARAMOUNT of service contract with SANTA FE SPRINGS, or upon termination by SANTA FE SPRINGS for any cause, SANTA FE SPRINGS shall continue to indemnify, defend and hold harmless PARAMOUNT for all claims and losses for which liability is imposed on SANTA FE SPRINGS by the terms of this agreement, and where arising out of SANTA FE SPRINGS' negligent or wrongful act or omission, prior to the effective date of said termination.
- 15. This agreement shall be effective upon execution by both parties and may be terminated upon thirty days written notice by either party.
- 16. SANTA FE SPRINGS shall maintain records of its services under this Agreement in the same manner as SANTA FE SPRINGS maintains records of its similar activities with respect to traffic signals, illuminated street name signs, and highway safety lighting owned by SANTA FE SPRINGS.
- 17. SANTA FE SPRINGS will act hereunder as an independent contractor. This Agreement shall not and is not intended to constitute SANTA FE SPRINGS as an agent, servant, or employee of PARAMOUNT and shall not and is not intended to create the relationship of partnership, joint venture or association between PARAMOUNT and SANTA FE SPRINGS.
- 18. SANTA FE SPRINGS shall provide workers compensation insurance as required by the California Labor Code. SANTA FE SPRINGS further agrees to include a paragraph substantially identical to this paragraph in any subcontract entered into hereunder.
- 19. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the parties. PARAMOUNT and SANTA FE SPRINGS hereby acknowledge that they have neither made nor accepted any other promise or obligation with respect to the subject matter of this Agreement.

20. If any provision of this Agreement is found by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, void or unenforceable, the remaining provisions shall nevertheless continue in full force and effect without being impaired or invalidated in any way.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the parties have caused this Agreement to be executed by the respective officers, duly authorized, for the City effective the date of the last signature hereto.

Approval of Traffic Signal Maintenance Agreements

with the City of Paramount and the City of Bellflower

DISCUSSION

The City Council previously approved "contracting out" traffic signal and lighting maintenance to other cities. The Cities of Paramount and Bellflower have requested the City of Santa Fe Springs to provide this service to their cities and their signed contracts were received on September 25, 1995. This item needs to be added to the September 28, 1995 Agenda as signal maintenance will commence on October 1, 1995.

The City of Paramount has thirty-six traffic signals plus safety lighting and illuminated street name signs to be maintained under this contract, and the City of Bellflower has forty-two traffic signals and three flashing signals, plus safety lighting and illuminated street name signs. The agreements cover the period of October 1, 1995 to October 1, 1998. Routine maintenance will be performed for a cost of \$54 per month per intersection for the first year increasing to \$60 per month per intersection in the third year. Extraordinary maintenance will be at Santa Fe Springs cost plus 5% for the first year increasing to our cost plus 15% in year three. These agreements may be terminated upon thirty days written notice by either party.

RECOMMENDATION

That the City Council approve the Agreements for Traffic Signal Maintenance with the City of Paramount and the City of Bellflower, and authorize the Mayor to execute said agreements.



CITY OF SANTA FE SPRINGS TRAFFIC SIGNAL, STREET NAME SIGN, AND HIGHWAY LIGHTING MAINTENANCE AGREEMENT AMENDMENT NO.1 WITH THE CITY OF PARAMOUNT

THIS AMENDMENT NO.1 is made and entered as of October 29, 2020, between the City of Paramount, a municipal corporation, hereinafter referred to as "Paramount" and the City of Santa Fe Springs, a municipal corporation, hereinafter referred to as "Contractor."

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, Paramount and Contractor entered into Agreement dated September 21, 1995 (the "Agreement") for traffic signal, street name sign, and highway lighting maintenance; and

WHEREAS, Paramount subsequently installed four new Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacons (RRFB) ("Devices") on Paramount Boulevard between Jackson Street and Alondra Boulevard; and

WHEREAS, Paramount has determined the public interest, convenience, and necessity require Paramount to modify the Scope of Services to be rendered by Contractor to include the newly installed Devices; and

WHEREAS, Paramount and Contractor desire to amend the Agreement to modify the Agreement and the locations for Maintenance of Traffic Control Devices listed in Exhibit A to add the newly installed Devices (RRFP) on Paramount Boulevard between Jackson Street and Alondra Boulevard).

NOW, THEREFORE, it is agreed to by Paramount and Contractor to amend the Agreement as follows:

1. Exhibit A to the Agreement is hereby amended in its entirety by substituting, therefore, the attached Exhibit A.

"The work to be done, in general, consists of furnishing all labor, materials, tools, equipment and incidentals (unless otherwise specified), to maintain Paramount's fifty-three (53) signalized intersections, six (6) flashing beacons, ten (10) radar feedback signs, and three (3) in-pavement LED lighted crosswalk (100% Paramount-owned) and four (4) Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacon (RRFB) as shown on Exhibit A in a safe, satisfactory, and workmanlike manner."

"Contractor shall perform monthly inspections of each Traffic Control Device location, as listed in Exhibit A, including signalized intersections, as follows:"

2. The first sentence of Section 3 of the Agreement is hereby amended to read as follows:

"Paramount agrees to pay Contractor a flat monthly rate of \$70.00 per signal (53 signals) for routine maintenance and \$35.00 per each flashing beacon, radar feedback sign, in-pavement flashing crosswalk and Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacon per month based upon actual inspected and maintained."

3. Except as expressly amended by this Amendment No.1, all terms and conditions of the Agreement shall remain in full force and effect.

NOW, THEREFORE, it is agreed to by Paramount and Contractor to amend the Agreement as follows:

1. The first sentence of Section 3 of the Agreement is amended to read as follows:

Paramount agrees to pay Contractor a flat monthly rate of \$75.00 per signal (54 signals) and \$40.00 per flasher (23 flashers or flasher equivalent devices), as listed in Exhibit A, for routine maintenance based upon actual signals inspected and maintained. Those monthly rates shall be used for billing. Thereafter, to ensure an equitable annual cost, the rates may be revised and adjusted for each fiscal year upon 60 days written notice and written approval by Paramount."

2. Exhibit A to the Agreement is replaced by Exhibit A attached to this Amendment.

3. The first sentence of Section 1 of the Agreement is amended to read as follows:

"The work to be done, in general, consists of furnishing all labor, materials, tools, equipment and incidentals (unless otherwise specified), to maintain Paramount's fifty-four (54) signalized intersections, six (10) flashing beacons, ten (10) radar feedback signs, and three (3) in-pavement LED lighted crosswalk (100% Paramount-owned) and four (4) Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacon (RRFB) as shown on Exhibit A in a safe, satisfactory, and workmanlike manner."

4. Except as expressly amended by this Amendment, all terms and conditions of the Agreement shall remain in full force and effect.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council:

- 1) Approve Amendment No. 2 (Attachment A) to the landscape maintenance services agreement with Merchants Landscape Services, Inc. exercising the final one-year extension and increasing the annual contract amount to \$997,905.24; and
- 2) Authorize the Mayor to execute Amendment No. 2; and
- 3) Take such additional, related, action that may be desirable.

FISCAL IMPACT

In response to a letter received from Merchants dated January 18, 2024 (Attachment C), Amendment No. 2 results in a 5% increase to the Landscape Maintenance Services Agreement which is currently at a total annual compensation of \$926,785.92. The requested increase will raise the amount paid for landscape maintenance services to \$973,125.24 for Fiscal Year 2024/2025.

In addition, city staff has identified various locations that the City wishes to add to the landscape maintenance agreement incurring an extra monthly expense of \$2,065.00. This addition brings the monthly total price to \$83,158.77 or \$997,905.24 for the fiscal year. The 5% increase and additional locations are accounted for the in the adopted budget for Fiscal Year 2024/2025.

BACKGROUND

At the July 9, 2020 Council meeting, Merchants Landscape Service, Inc. was awarded a contract to provide Landscape Maintenance Services citywide. The contract is for an initial three-year term with two one-year renewal options, for a total of up to five years. At the May 2, 2023 meeting, the Council approved Amendment No. 1, a one-year extension and a 3% increase. City staff continuously monitors the services provided by Merchants and finds their performance satisfactory.

In a letter dated January 18, 2024 (Attachment C), Merchants Landscape Services requested the extension of the contract for the 5th and final year and requested a 5% increase due to the rising cost of materials, supplies, and labor. Furthermore, City staff has identified several locations that are currently maintained by staff and/or other contractors. Merchants provided a quote (Attachment D) for consolidating these additional areas at a monthly cost of \$2,065. The additional areas include: 1) New medians constructed after execution of Amendment No. 1; 2) Locations within the public street right-of-way that were not part of the original scope of work; 3) Successor Agencyowned parcels; and 4) Fire Stations.

SUMMARY/NEXT STEPS

Upon approval of the City Council City staff will coordinate with Merchants Landscape on implementation of Amendment No. 2, adding the additional locations to the maintenance service agreement, and the requested increase of 5% for one (1) year, with all current terms, conditions and specifications remaining the same. Staff will also commence the Request for Proposals process during this last year of the current agreement with Merchants. With the approval of Amendment No. 2, the contract would expire on July 31, 2025.

CITY OF SANTA FE SPRINGS LANDSCAPE MAINTENANCE SERVICES AGREEMENT WITH MERCHANTS LANDSCAPE SERVICES, INC.

This Landscape Maintenance Services Agreement ("Agreement") is made and effective as of the 1st of August, 2020 ("Effective Date"), by and between the City of Santa Fe Springs, a California municipal corporation, ("City") and Merchants Landscape Services, Inc., a California corporation ("Contractor"). In consideration of the mutual covenants and conditions set forth herein, the parties agree as follows:

1. TERM

This Agreement shall commence on August 1, 2020, and shall remain and continue in effect for a period of three years, unless sooner terminated pursuant to the provisions of this Agreement. The City shall have the option to extend the term for two additional one-year periods upon City Council approval.

2. SERVICES

Contractor shall perform the services described and set forth in the City's Request for Proposals attached hereto as Exhibit A and Contractor's Proposal attached hereto as Exhibit B ("Services"), both incorporated herein as though set forth in full.

3. PERFORMANCE

Contractor shall at all times faithfully, competently and to the best of Contractor's ability, experience, and talent, perform all tasks described herein. Contractor shall employ, at a minimum, generally accepted standards and practices utilized by persons engaged in providing similar services as are required of Contractor under this Agreement.

4. CITY MANAGEMENT

The City Manager or designee shall represent the City in all matters pertaining to the administration of this Agreement.

5. PAYMENT

- A. The City agrees to pay Contractor for Services satisfactorily performed the monthly amount of \$74,982.68 (\$899,792.16 per year) for the Agreement term, in accordance with the fees set forth in Exhibit B.
- B. Contractor shall not be compensated for any services rendered in connection with its performance of this Agreement which are in addition to those set forth herein, unless such additional services are authorized in advance and in writing by the City Manager or designee. Contractor shall be compensated for any additional

services in the amounts and in the manner as agreed to in writing by the City and Contractor at the time the City's written authorization is given to Contractor for the performance of said services.

C. Contractor will submit invoices monthly for actual Services performed. Payment shall be made within thirty (30) days of receipt of each invoice as to all nondisputed fees. If the City disputes any of Contractor's Services or fees, it shall give written notice to Contractor within thirty (30) days of receipt of an invoice of any disputed fees set forth on the invoice. Any final payment under this Agreement shall be made within forty-five (45) days of receipt of an invoice therefor.

6. SUSPENSION OR TERMINATION OF AGREEMENT WITHOUT CAUSE

- A. The City may at any time, for any reason, without cause, suspend or terminate this Agreement, or any portion hereof, by serving upon Contractor at least ninety (90) days' prior written notice. Upon receipt of said notice, Contractor shall immediately cease all Services under this Agreement, unless the notice provides otherwise. If the City suspends or terminates a portion of this Agreement, such suspension or termination shall not make void or invalidate the remainder of this Agreement.
- B. In the event this Agreement is terminated pursuant to this section, the City shall pay to Contractor the actual value of the Services performed up to the time of termination, unless the City disputes any of the Services performed or fees. Upon termination of the Agreement pursuant to this section, Contractor will submit an invoice to the City pursuant to Section 5.

7. DEFAULT OF CONTRACTOR

If the City determines that Contractor is in default in the performance of any of the terms or conditions of this Agreement, the City shall serve Contractor a written notice of the default. Contractor shall have seven (7) days after service of said notice to cure the default. In the event that Contractor fails to cure the default within such period of time or fails to present the City with a written plan for the diligent cure of default if such default cannot be cured within seven days, the City shall have the right, notwithstanding any other provision of this Agreement, to terminate this Agreement without further notice and without prejudice to any other remedy to which it may be entitled at law, in equity or under this Agreement. The City shall also have the right to offset against the amount of any fees due to Contractor any costs incurred by the City as a result of Contractor's default.

8. OWNERSHIP OF DOCUMENTS

A. Contractor shall maintain complete and accurate records with respect to tasks, costs, expenses, receipts, and other such information required by the City that relate to the performance of Services under this Agreement. Contractor shall maintain adequate records of Services provided in sufficient detail to permit an evaluation of Services. All such records shall be maintained in accordance with

generally accepted accounting principles and shall be clearly identified and readily accessible. Contractor shall provide free access to the representatives of the City or its designees at reasonable times to such books and records; shall give the City the right to examine and audit said books and records; shall permit the City to make transcripts or copies therefrom as necessary; and shall allow inspection of all Services, data, documents, proceedings, and activities related to this Agreement. Such records, together with supporting documents, shall be maintained for a period of three (3) years after receipt of final payment.

B. Upon completion of, or in the event of termination or suspension of this Agreement, all original documents, designs, drawings, maps, models, computer files, surveys, notes, and other documents prepared in the course of providing the Services shall become the sole property of the City and may be used, reused, or otherwise disposed of by the City without the permission of Contractor. With respect to computer files, Contractor shall make available to the City, at the Contractor's office and upon reasonable written request by the City, the necessary computer software and hardware for purposes of accessing, compiling, transferring, copying and/or printing computer files. Contractor hereby grants to the City all right, title, and interest, including any copyright, in and to the documents, designs, drawings, maps, models, computer files, surveys, notes, and other documents prepared by Contractor in the course of providing the Services under this Agreement.

9. INDEMNIFICATION AND DEFENSE

A. Indemnity.

To the fullest extent permitted by law, Contractor shall indemnify and hold harmless the City and any and all of its officials, officers, employees, agents, and/or volunteers ("Indemnified Parties") from and against any and all losses, liabilities, damages, costs and expenses, including attorney's fees and costs, caused in whole or in part by the acts, errors, or omissions of Contractor, its officers, agents, employees, or subcontractors (or any agency or individual that Contractor shall bear the legal liability thereof) in the performance of Services under this Agreement.

B. Duty to Defend.

In the event the City, its officials, officers, employees, agents, and/or volunteers are made a party to any claim, action, lawsuit, or other adversarial proceeding ("Action") arising from the performance of the Services under this Agreement, whether or not Contractor is named in such Action, and upon demand by the City, Contractor shall defend the City at Contractor's sole cost, or at the City's option, to reimburse the City for its costs of defense, including reasonable attorney's fees and costs incurred in the defense.

C. Payment by the City for Services is not a condition precedent to enforcement of this section. Contractor's duty to defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the City shall not extend to the City's sole or active negligence. In the event of any dispute between Contractor and the City as to whether liability arises from the sole or active negligence of the City or its officials, officers, employees, agents, and/or volunteers, Contractor will be obligated to pay for the City's defense until such time as a final judgment has been entered adjudicating the City as solely or actively negligent. Contractor will not be entitled in the absence of such a determination to any reimbursement of defense costs including, but not limited to, attorney's fees, expert fees and costs of litigation.

10. INSURANCE

Contractor shall maintain prior to the beginning of and for the duration of this Agreement insurance coverage as specified in Exhibit C attached hereto and made a part of this Agreement.

11. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR

- A. Contractor is and shall at all times remain as to the City a wholly independent Contractor and/or independent contractor. The personnel performing the services under this Agreement on behalf of Contractor shall at all times be under Contractor's exclusive direction and control. Neither the City nor any of its officers, employees, or agents shall have control over the conduct of Contractor or any of Contractor's officers, employees, or agents, except as set forth in this Agreement. Contractor shall not at any time or in any manner represent that Contractor or any of Contractor's officers, employees, or agents are in any manner officers, employees, or agents of the City. Contractor shall not incur or have the power to incur any debt, obligation, or liability whatever against the City, or bind the City in any manner.
- B. No employee benefits shall be available to Contractor in connection with the performance of this Agreement. Except for the fees paid to Contractor as provided in the Agreement, the City shall not pay salaries, wages, or other compensation to Contractor for performing services hereunder for the City. The City shall not be liable for compensation or indemnification to Contractor for injury or sickness arising out of performing services hereunder. Contractor shall secure, at its sole expense, and be responsible for any and all payment of Income Tax. Social Compensation, Unemployment State Disability Insurance Security. Compensation, and other payroll deductions for Contractor and its officers, agents, and employees, and all business licenses, if any are required, in connection with the services to be performed hereunder. Contractor shall indemnify and hold the City harmless from any and all taxes, assessments, penalties, and interest asserted against the City by reason of the independent contractor relationship created by this Agreement. Contractor further agrees to indemnify and hold the City harmless from any failure of Contractor to comply with the applicable worker's compensation laws. The City shall have the right to offset

against the amount of any fees due to Contractor under this Agreement as a result of Contractor's failure to promptly pay to the City any reimbursement or indemnification arising under this paragraph.

- C. In the event that Contractor or any employee, agent, or subcontractor of Contractor providing Services under this Agreement claims or is determined by a court of competent jurisdiction or the California Public Employees Retirement System (PERS) to be eligible for enrollment in PERS as an employee of the City, Contractor shall indemnify, defend, and hold harmless the City for the payment of any employee and/or employer contributions for PERS benefits on behalf of Contractor or its employees, agents, or subcontractors, as well as for the payment of any penalties and interest on such contributions, which would otherwise be the responsibility of the City.
- D. Notwithstanding any other agency, state or federal policy, rule, regulation, law or ordinance to the contrary, Contractor and any of its employees, agents, and subcontractors providing service under this Agreement shall not qualify for or become entitled to, and hereby agree to waive any claims to, any compensation, benefit, or any incident of employment by the City, including but not limited to eligibility to enroll in PERS as an employee of the City and entitlement to any contribution to be paid by City for employer contribution and/or employee contributions for PERS benefits.

12. LEGAL RESPONSIBILITIES

Contractor shall keep itself informed of State and Federal laws and regulations which in any manner affect those employed by it or in any way affect the performance of Services pursuant to this Agreement. Contractor shall at all times observe and comply with all such laws and regulations. The City and its officials, officers, employees, and agents, shall not be liable at law or in equity occasioned by failure of Contractor to comply with this Section.

13. UNDUE INFLUENCE

Contractor declares and warrants that no undue influence or pressure was used against or in concert with any officer or employee of the City in connection with the award, terms or implementation of this Agreement, including any method of coercion, confidential financial arrangement, or financial inducement. No officer or employee of the City has or will receive compensation, directly or indirectly, from Contractor, or from any officer, employee or agent of Contractor, in connection with this Agreement or any Services to be conducted as a result of this Agreement. Violation of this section shall be a material breach of this Agreement entitling the City to any and all remedies at law or in equity.

14. NO BENEFIT TO ARISE TO LOCAL EMPLOYEES

No member, officer, or employee of the City, or their designees or agents, and no public official who exercises authority over or responsibilities with respect to the Services during

his/her tenure or for one year thereafter, shall have any interest, direct or indirect, in any Agreement or sub-agreement, or the proceeds thereof, for Services to be performed under this Agreement.

15. RELEASE OF INFORMATION/CONFLICTS OF INTEREST

- A. All information gained by Contractor in performance of this Agreement shall be considered confidential and shall not be released by Contractor without the City's prior written authorization, unless the information is clearly public. Contractor, its officers, employees, agents, or subcontractors, shall not without written authorization from the City Manager or designee, or unless requested by the City's attorney, voluntarily provide declarations, letters of support, testimony at depositions, response to interrogatories, or other information concerning the Services performed under this Agreement or relating to the City. Response to a subpoena or court order shall not be considered "voluntary" provided Contractor gives the City notice of such court order or subpoena.
- B. Contractor shall promptly notify the City should Contractor, its officers, employees, agents, and/or subcontractors be served with any summons, complaint, notice of deposition, request for documents, interrogatories, request for admissions, or other discovery request ("Discovery"), court order, or subpoena from any person or party regarding this Agreement and the Services performed hereunder or the City, unless the City is a party to any lawsuit, arbitration, or administrative proceeding connected to such Discovery, or unless Contractor is prohibited by law from informing the City of such Discovery. The City retains the right, but has no obligation, to represent Contractor and/or be present at any deposition, hearing, or similar proceeding as allowed by law. Unless the City is a party to the lawsuit, arbitration, or administrative proceeding and is adverse to Contractor in such proceeding, Contractor agrees to cooperate fully with the City and to provide the opportunity to review any response to discovery requests provided by Contractor. However, the City's right to review any such response does not imply or mean the right by the City to control, direct, or rewrite said response, or that the City has an obligation to review any such response or verifies any response it has reviewed.

16. NOTICES

Any notices which either party may desire to give to the other party under this Agreement must be in writing and may be given either by (i) personal service, (ii) delivery by a reputable document delivery service, such as but not limited to, Federal Express, which provides a receipt showing date and time of delivery, or (iii) mail by the United States Postal Service, certified mail, postage prepaid, return receipt requested, addressed to the address of the party as set forth below or at any other address as that party may later designate by notice:

17. ASSIGNMENT

Contractor shall not assign the performance of this Agreement, nor any part thereof, nor any monies due hereunder, without prior written consent of the City. Before retaining or contracting with any subcontractor for any services under this Agreement, Contractor shall provide the City with the identity of the proposed subcontractor, a copy of the proposed written contract between Contractor and such subcontractor which shall include and indemnity provision similar to the one provided herein and identifying the City as an indemnified party, or an incorporation of the indemnity provision provided herein, and proof that such proposed subcontractor carries insurance at least equal to that required by this Agreement or obtain a written waiver from the City for such insurance.

18. LICENSES

At all times during the term of this Agreement, Contractor shall have in full force and effect all licenses required of it by law for the performance of the Services described in this Agreement.

19. GOVERNING LAW

The City and Contractor understand and agree that the laws of the State of California shall govern the rights, obligations, duties, and liabilities of the parties to this Agreement and also govern the interpretation of this Agreement. Any litigation concerning this Agreement shall take place in the municipal, superior, or federal district court with jurisdiction over the City.

20. ENTIRE AGREEMENT

This Agreement contains the entire understanding between the parties relating to the obligations of the parties described in this Agreement. All prior or contemporaneous agreements, understandings, representations, and statements, oral or written and pertaining to the subject of this Agreement or with respect to the terms and conditions of this Agreement shall be of no further force or effect. Each party is entering into this Agreement based solely upon the representations set forth herein and upon each party's own independent investigation of any and all facts such party deems material.

21. AMENDMENTS

Any amendments to this Agreement must be in writing and executed by the parties hereto, or their respective successors and assigns, in order to be valid.

22. ATTORNEYS' FEES

In the event that litigation is brought by any party in connection with this Agreement, the prevailing party shall be entitled to recover from the opposing party all costs and expenses, including reasonable attorneys' fees, incurred by the prevailing party in the exercise of any of its rights or remedies hereunder or the enforcement of any of the terms, conditions, or provisions hereof.

23. CONSTRUCTION

The parties hereto have participated jointly in the negotiation and drafting of this Agreement. In the event an ambiguity or question of intent or interpretation arises with respect to this Agreement, this Agreement shall be construed as if drafted jointly by the parties and in accordance with its fair meaning. There shall be no presumption or burden of proof favoring or disfavoring any party by virtue of the authorship of any of the provisions of this Agreement.

24. WAIVER

The delay or failure of any party at any time to require performance or compliance by the other of any of its obligations or agreements shall in no way be deemed a waiver of those rights to require such performance or compliance. No waiver of any provision of this Agreement shall be effective unless in writing and signed by a duly authorized representative of the party against whom enforcement of a waiver is sought. The waiver of any right or remedy in respect to any occurrence or event shall not be deemed a waiver of any right or remedy in respect to any other occurrence or event, nor shall any waiver constitute a continuing waiver.

25. SEVERABILITY

If any provision of this Agreement is determined by a court of competent jurisdiction to be unenforceable in any circumstance, such determination shall not affect the validity or enforceability of the remaining terms and provisions hereof or of the offending provision in any other circumstance. Notwithstanding the foregoing, if the value of this Agreement, based upon the substantial benefit of the bargain for any party, is materially impaired, which determination made by the presiding court or arbitrator of competent jurisdiction shall be binding, then both parties agree to substitute such provision(s) through good faith negotiations.

26. COUNTERPARTS

This Agreement may be executed in one or more counterparts, each of which shall be deemed an original. All counterparts shall be construed together and shall constitute one agreement.

27. AUTHORITY TO EXECUTE THIS AGREEMENT

The persons executing this Agreement on behalf of the parties warrants and represents that they have the authority to execute this Agreement on behalf of said parties and has the authority to bind the parties to the provisions of this Agreement.

- Adopt Resolution No. 9918 to prohibit the parking of vehicles on the street nightly between the hours of 9 PM and 6 AM on the east side of Forest Street from its intersection with Clark Street to 215' south of the intersection; and
- 2) Take such additional, related, action that may be desirable.

FISCAL IMPACT

A fee in the amount of \$290.86 will be collected from the applicant for the installation cost of parking restriction signage.

BACKGROUND

A letter was received from Tank Master, Inc. (Attachment A) requesting a parking restriction in front of their property located at 10608 Forest Street. They are experiencing problems with large trucks and other vehicles continuously parking in front of their property for multiple days, making it challenging to conduct their business.

ANALYSIS

The subject portion of Forest Street is a local industrial street located one block west of Bloomfield Avenue between Clark Street and Florence Avenue. The street is 48' wide and carries one lane of traffic in each direction. The street is posted with 30 miles-per-hour speed limit signs. "No Stopping Anytime" restrictions currently exist on other portions of

Forest Street, including the portion directly across from the subject address. RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Traffic Commission:

- 1) Recommend to the City Council that parking of vehicles be prohibited nightly between the hours of 9PM and 6AM on the east side of Forest Street from its intersection with Clark Street to 215' south of the intersection; and
- 2) Take such additional, related, action that may be desirable.

FISCAL IMPACT

A fee in the amount of \$290.86 will be collected for the installation cost of parking restriction signage.

BACKGROUND

A letter was received from Tank Master, Inc. requesting a parking restriction in front of their property located at 10608 Forest Street. They are experiencing problems with large trucks and other vehicles continuously parking in front of their property for multiple days, making it difficult to conduct their business and for their employees to find parking.

ANALYSIS

The subject portion of Forest Street is a local industrial street located one block west of Bloomfield Avenue between Clark Street and Florence Avenue. The street is 48' wide and carries one lane of traffic in each direction. The street is posted with 30 miles-per-hour speed limit signs. "No Stopping Anytime" restrictions currently exist on other portions of

Forest Street, including the portion directly across from the subject address. The subject property is requesting the implementation of a restriction that would prohibit vehicles from parking continuously for multiple days. The nightly parking restriction from 9PM to 6AM would accomplish the desired outcome.

Police Services have been at the location in the past to help clear long-term parked vehicles, and are in support of the proposed nightly restriction.

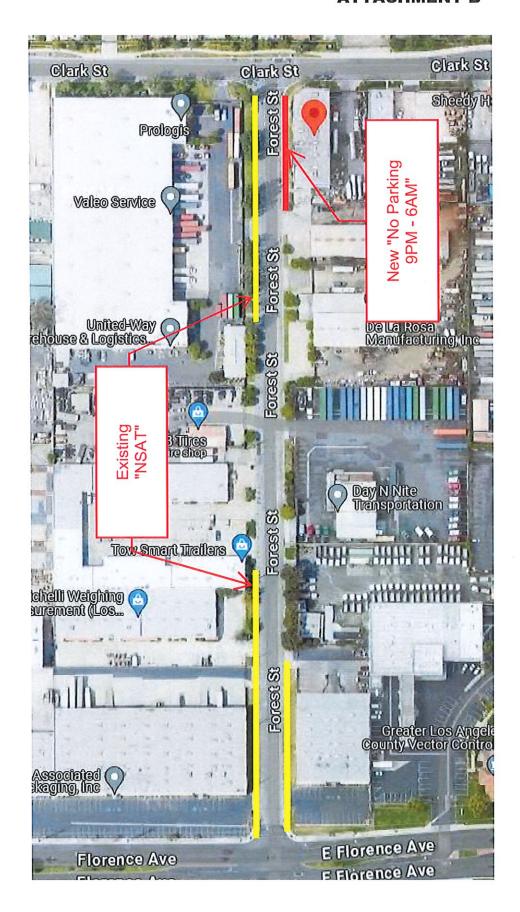

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council:

- 1) Approve Amendment No. 3 to Funding Agreement No. MR315.41 with the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority (LACMTA) for the Valley View Avenue and Alondra Avenue Intersection Improvements; and
- Authorize the City Manager to execute Amendment No. 3; and
- 3) Take such additional, related, action that may be desirable.

FISCAL IMPACT

The Valley View Avenue and Alondra Avenue Intersection Improvements project is a project funded through LACMTA's Interstate 605 Corridor "Hot Spot" Interchanges Program, included in the Measure R Expenditure Plan. Funding Agreement No. MR315.41 (Attachment B) with LACMTA was executed in February 2018 and allocated \$2,667,000 in Measure R funds for the project. Execution of Amendment No. 3 will allocate an additional \$920,000 in Measure R funds for the construction of the project and increases the total project funding to \$3,587,000. The project is entirely funded through LACMTA funding and no local match is anticipated at this time.

BACKGROUND

In 2008, the voters of Los Angeles County approved Measure R. Measure R is a half-cent sales tax for Los Angeles County that took effect January 2009, to help finance new transportation projects and programs, and accelerate those already in progress.

In February 2018, the City and Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority (LACMTA) entered into Agreement No. MR315.41 to construct intersection improvements at Valley View Avenue and Alondra Avenue. The City requested an increase in funds for the project in the amount of \$920,000 due to rising construction costs. The Metro Board approved the budget increase on June 23, 2022. Amendment No. 3 to the agreement provides the additional funding.

ANALYSIS

Approval of Amendment No. 3 extends lapsing date for FY 2015-16 funds to June 23, 2025. The extension allows the City to request additional Measure R funds to bridge the projected shortfall and complete the intersection improvements.

This Amendment No. 3 to the Funding Agreement (this "Amendment"), is dated as of July 1, 2023 by and between the City of Santa Fe Springs ("Grantee") and the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority ("LACMTA").

RECITALS:

- A. WHEREAS, Grantee and LACMTA entered into that certain Funding Agreement No. 920000000MR315.41, dated November 1, 2017, which was amended on May 11, 2020 and November 19, 2021, (as amended, the "Existing FA"), which Existing FA provides for the Valley View Ave Intersection at Alondra Blvd Improvements (the "Project"); and
- B. WHEREAS, the LACMTA Board on January 26, 2023, delegated administrative authority to staff to extend funding lapsing dated to meet PAED, PS&E, ROW and Construction time frames; and
- C. WHEREAS, the Grantee and LACMTA desire to extend the lapsing date of the FY 2015-16 funds to June 30, 2025; and
- D. WHEREAS, the LACMTA Board on January 26, 2023 programmed an additional \$920,000 for Right of Way and Construction of the Project. The total project budget is \$3,587,000.
- E. WHEREAS, the Funds are currently programmed for the Project as follows \$2,667,000 in Measure R Funds in FY 2015-16 and \$920,000 in Measure R Funds in FY 2022-23. The total designated amount for the Project is \$3,587,000; and
 - F. Grantee and LACMTA desire to amend the Existing FA as provided herein.

AGREEMENT:

NOW, THEREFORE, for good and valuable consideration, the receipt and adequacy of which are hereby acknowledged, the parties hereby agree as follows:

- 1. Part I, Paragraph 2.2 of the Existing FA is hereby amended by deleting it in its entirety and replacing it with the following: "To the extent the Measure R funds are available, LACMTA shall make to GRANTEE a grant of the Measure R funds in the amount of \$3,587,000 (the "Funds") for the Project. LACMTA Board of Directors actions on November 18, 2015, October 26, 2017 and January 26, 2023 set forth the Measure R Funds for the Project. The Funds are currently programmed in Fiscal Years: \$2,667,000 in FY 2015-16 and \$920,000 in FY 2022-23."
- 2. Part II, Section 9 of the Existing FA is hereby amended by deleting it in its entirety and replacing it with the following:

"9. TIMELY USE OF FUNDS/REPROGRAMMING OF FUNDS

- 9.1 GRANTEE must demonstrate timely use of the Funds by:
 - (i) executing this Agreement within ninety (90) days of receiving formal transmittal of the Agreement from LACMTA, or by December 31st of the first Fiscal Year in which the Funds are programmed, whichever date is later; and
 - (ii) meeting the Project milestones due dates as agreed upon by the LACMTA and GRANTEE in the FA; milestones include, but are not limited to the following:
 - a. for project development, GRANTEE must complete phase by the end of the second fiscal year following the year the Funds were first programmed; and
 - b. for right-of-way, GRANTEE must follow its right-of-way acquisition policies and must show a realistic schedule for completion of acquisition required for the project agreed upon by LACMTA and GRANTEE prior to Agreement execution; and
 - c. for construction or capital purchase projects, contracts shall be awarded within nine (9) months from the date of completion of design. Project design (preliminary engineering) must begin within six (6) months from the identified milestone start date; and
 - (iii) submitting the Quarterly Progress/Expenditure Report; and
 - (iv) Expending the Funds granted under this FA for allowable costs by the lapsing date. All Funds programmed for FY 2015-16 and FY 2022-23 are subject to lapse by June 30, 2025."
- 9.2 Quarterly Progress/Expenditure Reports will be used to evaluate compliance with the Project milestone due dates as identified in the FA. If the Project does not meet the

milestone due dates as agreed upon in the FA, LACMTA will issue a notice of non-compliance to the GRANTEE, and the GRANTEE will be required to develop a written recovery plan illustrating in detail the GRANTEE's actions to resolve the delay and to meet the Project completion date agreed upon in the FA (the "Recovery Plan"). If the Recovery Plan is deemed viable by LACMTA staff, and meets the Project completion date agreed upon in the FA, LACMTA may grant an administrative schedule update as long as the Funds are expended in compliance with (iv) above. If GRANTEE fails to submit a Recovery Plan within 30 days of the notice of non-compliance from LACMTA, or the Recovery Plan illustrates that the Project will not meet the lapse date in the FA, LACMTA may recommend potential deobligation of the Funds as part of its annual Call for Projects Recertification/Deobligation process. GRANTEE will ONLY be allowed to request a one-time lapsing date extension of 20-months from the final lapse date, which request is subject to LACMTA's Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) consideration as part of the annual Call for Projects Recertification/Deobligation process.

- 9.3 Recertification of Funds will be based on Project progress and is subject to meeting the Project milestones as agreed upon in the FA.
- 9.4 If GRANTEE does not complete one element of the Project, as described in the FTIP Project Sheet, due to all or a portion of the Funds lapsing, the entire Project may be subject to deobligation at LACMTA's sole discretion. In the event that all the Funds are deobligated, this Agreement shall automatically terminate.
- 9.5 If the GRANTEE fails to meet any of the conditions in paragraph 9.1 above, the Project shall be considered lapsed and will be submitted to the LACMTA Board for deobligation. Expenses that are not invoiced within 60 days after the lapsing date are not eligible for reimbursement."
- 3. Attachment A of the Existing FA is hereby replaced by Attachment A-3, attached.
- 4. Attachment B1-2 of the Existing FA is hereby replaced by Attachment B1-3, attached.
- 5. Attachment C of the Existing FA is hereby replaced by Attachment C-3, attached.
- 6. Except as expressly amended hereby, the Existing FA remains in full force and effect as originally executed. All rights and obligations of the parties under the Existing FA that are not expressly amended by this Amendment shall remain unchanged.

The project is located at the Alondra Boulevard/Valley View Avenue Intersection in the City of Santa Fe Springs (and a shared boundary in the City of La Mirada), immediately north of the 1-5 freeway.

PROJECT LIMITS:

This project limits include the intersection of Alondra Boulevard and Valley View Avenue.

NEXUS TO HIGHWAY OPERATION, DEFINITION/PROJECT PURPOSE:

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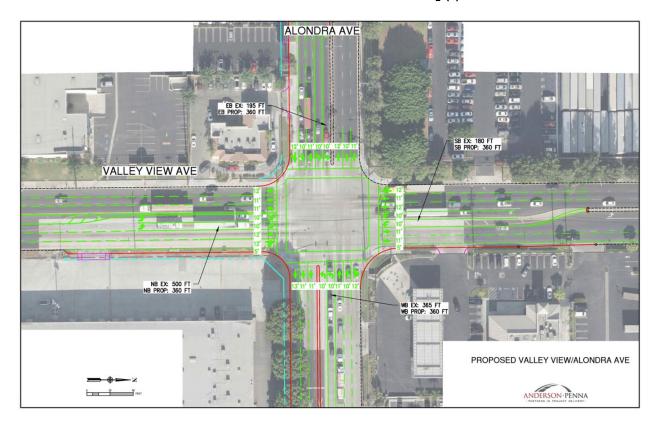

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MEASURE R FUNDING AGREEMENT HIGHWAY PROGRAM (General)

This Funding Agreement ("FA") is made and entered into effective as of November 1, 2017 ("Effective Date"), and is by and between the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority ("LACMTA") and City of Santa Fe Springs ("GRANTEE") for Valley View Ave intersection at Alondra Blvd Improvements, LACMTA Project ID# MR315.41 (the "Project"). This Project is eligible for funding under Line 35 Interstate 605 Corridor "Hot Spot" Interchanges of the Measure R Expenditure Plan.

WHEREAS, LACMTA adopted Ordinance #08-01, the Traffic Relief and Rail Expansion Ordinance, on July 24, 2008 (the "Ordinance"), which Ordinance was approved by the voters of Los Angeles County on November 4, 2008 as "Measure R" and became effective on January 2, 2009.

WHEREAS, the funding set forth herein is intended to fund Right-of-Way acquisition and Construction of the Project.

WHEREAS, the LACMTA Board, at its December 3, 2015 meeting, programmed \$2,967,000 in Measure R Funds to GRANTEE for Right-of-Way acquisition and Construction subject to the terms and conditions contained in this FA; and

WHEREAS, the LACMTA Board, at its October 26, 2017 meeting, deobilgated \$300,000 from Prior Years into MR315.40.

PART I SPECIFIC TERMS OF THE FA

1. Title of the Project (the "Project"): Valley View Ave intersection at Alondra Blvd – Right-of-Way acquisition and Construction. LACMTA Project ID# MR315.41.

2. Grant Funds:

- 2.1 Programmed Funds for this Project consist of the following: Measure R Funds.
- 2.2 To the extent the Measure R Funds are available; LACMTA shall make to GRANTEE a grant of the Measure R funds in the amount of \$2,667,000 (the "Fund") for the Project. LACMTA Board of Directors' action of November 18, 2015 granted the Measure R Funds for the Project. The Funds are programmed over one year for Fiscal Years (FY) FY 2015-16.
- 3. This grant shall be paid on a reimbursement basis. GRANTEE must provide the appropriate supporting documentation with the Monthly Progress Report and/or the Quarterly Expenditure Report. GRANTEE Funding Commitment, if applicable, must be spent in the appropriate proportion to the Funds with each quarter's expenditures. LACMTA will withhold five percent (5%) of eligible expenditures per invoice as retention pending an audit of expenditures and completion of scope of work.
- 4. Attachment A the "Project Funding" documents all sources of funds programmed for the Project as approved by LACMTA and is attached as <u>Attachment A</u>. The Project Funding includes the total programmed funds for the Project, including the Funds programmed by LACMTA and, if any, the GRANTEE Funding Commitment of other sources of funding. The Project Funding also includes the fiscal years in which all the funds for the Project are programmed. The Funds are subject to adjustment by subsequent LACMTA Board Action.
- 5. Attachment B-1 is the Expenditure Plan- Cost & Cash Flow Budget (the "Expenditure Plan"). It is the entire proposed cash flow, the Budget and financial plan for the Project, which includes the total sources of all funds programmed to the Project, including GRANTEE and other entity funding commitments, if any, for this Project as well as the fiscal year and quarters the Project funds are anticipated to be expended. GRANTEE shall update the Expenditure Plan annually, no later than December 31, and such update shall be submitted to LACMTA's Managing Executive Officer of Construction & Engineering in writing. If the LACMTA's Managing Executive Officer of Construction & Engineering concurs with such updated Expenditure Plan in writing, Attachment B-1 shall be replaced with the new Attachment B-1 setting forth the latest approved Expenditure Plan. Payments under this FA shall be consistent with Attachment B-1 as revised from time to time. In no event can the final milestone date be changed or amended by written concurrence by the LACMTA Managing Executive Officer of Construction & Engineering. Any change to the final milestone date must be made by a fully executed amendment to this FA.
- 6. **Attachment C** is the Scope of Work ("the Scope of Work"). The GRANTEE shall complete the Project as described in the Scope of Work. This Scope of Work shall include a

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detailed description of the Project and the work to be completed, including anticipated Project milestones and a schedule consistent with the lapsing policy in Part II, Section 9, and a description of the Project limits. No later than December 31 of each year, GRANTEE shall notify LACMTA if there are any changes to the final milestone date set forth in the schedule or any changes to the Scope of Work. If LACMTA agrees to such changes, the parties shall memorialize such changes in an amendment to this FA. Work shall be delivered in accordance with this schedule and scope unless otherwise agreed to by the parties in writing. If GRANTEE is consistently behind schedule in meeting milestones or in delivering the Project, LACMTA will have the option to suspend or terminate the FA for default as described in Part II, Sections 2, 9, 10 and 11 herein below. To the extent interim milestone dates are not met but GRANTEE believes it can make up the time so as to not impact the final milestone date, GRANTEE shall notify LACMTA of such changes in its Monthly Progress Reports and such interim milestone dates will automatically be amended to the latest interim milestone dates provided in the Monthly Progress Reports Attachment D-1. In no event can the final milestone date be amended by a Monthly Progress Report.

- 7. No changes to this FA, including but not limited to the Funds, and any other source of funds from LACMTA in the Project Funding, Expenditure Plan or the Scope of Work shall be allowed without an amendment to the original FA, approved and signed by both parties.
- 8. Attachment D is the Project Reporting & Expenditure Guidelines. GRANTEE shall complete the "Monthly Progress Report" and/or the "Quarterly Expenditure Report". The Monthly Progress and Quarterly Expenditure Reports are attached to this FA as Attachments D-1 and D-2 in accordance with Attachment D Project Reporting and Expenditure Guidelines.
- 9. No changes to the (i) Grant amount, (ii) Project Funding, (iii) the Scope of Work (except as provided herein), (iv) Final milestone date or (v) Special Grant Conditions, shall be allowed without a written amendment to this FA, approved and signed by the LACMTA Chief Executive Officer or his/her designee and GRANTEE. Modifications that do not materially affect the terms of this FA, such as redistributing Funds among existing budget line items or non-material schedule changes must be formally requested by GRANTEE and approved by LACMTA in writing. Non-material changes are those changes which do not affect the grant amount or its schedule, Project Funding, Financial Plan, or the Scope of Work, including the Work schedule.

12. LACMTA anticipates it may need to avail itself of lower cost bonds or other debt, the interest on which is tax exempt for federal tax purposes and/or Build America Bonds as defined in the American Reinvestment and Recovery Act of 2009 or similar types of bonds (collectively, the 'Bonds") to provide at least a portion of its funding commitments under this Agreement to GRANTEE. GRANTEE shall ensure that the expenditure of the Funds disbursed to GRANTEE does not jeopardize the tax-exemption of the interest, the Federal subsidy payment or the tax credit, as applicable, as specified in the Bond Requirements attached as Attachment E to this Agreement. GRANTEE agrees to provide LACMTA with progress reports, expenditure documentation, and any other documentation as reasonably requested by LACMTA and necessary for LACMTA to fulfill its responsibilities as the grantee or administrator or bond issuer of the Funds. With regard to LACMTA debt financing to provide any portion of the Funds, GRANTEE shall take all reasonable actions as may be requested of it by LACMTA's Project Manager for the Project, to assist LACMTA in demonstrating and maintaining over time, compliance with the relevant sections of the Federal Tax Code to maintain such bonds tax status.

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<u>PART II</u> <u>GENERAL TERMS</u> OF THE FA

1. TERM

The term of this FA shall commence on the Effective Date of this FA, and shall terminate upon the occurrence of all of the following, unless terminated earlier as provided herein: (i) the agreed upon Scope of Work has been completed; (ii) all LACMTA audit and reporting requirements have been satisfied; and (iii) the final disbursement of the Funds has been made to GRANTEE. All eligible Project expenses as defined in the Reporting and Expenditure Guidelines (Attachment D), incurred after the FA Effective Date shall be reimbursed in accordance with the terms and conditions of this FA unless otherwise agreed to by the parties in writing.

2. <u>SUSPENSION OR TERMINATION</u>

Should LACMTA determine there are insufficient Measure R Funds available for the Project, LACMTA may suspend or terminate this FA by giving written notice to GRANTEE at least thirty (30) days in advance of the effective date of such suspension or termination. If a Project is suspended or terminated pursuant to this section, LACMTA will not reimburse GRANTEE any costs incurred after that suspension or termination date, except those costs necessary (i) to return any facilities modified by the Project construction to a safe and operable state; and (ii) to suspend or terminate the construction contractor's control over the Project. LACMTA's share of these costs will be consistent with the established funding percentages outlined in this FA.

3. <u>INVOICE BY GRANTEE</u>

Unless otherwise stated in this FA, the Monthly Progress Report or the Quarterly Expenditure Report, with supporting documentation of expenses, Project progress and other documents as required, which has been pre-approved by LACMTA, all as described in Part II, Section 6.1 of this FA, shall satisfy LACMTA invoicing requirements. Grantee shall only submit for payment the LACMTA pre-approved Monthly Progress Report or Quarterly Expenditure Report Packets to the LACMTA Project Manager at the email address shown in Part I and to LACMTA Account Payable Department as shown below.

4. USE OF FUNDS

4.1 GRANTEE shall utilize the Funds to complete the Project as described in the Scope of Work and in accordance with the Reporting and Expenditure Guidelines and the specifications for use for the transportation purposes described in the Ordinance.

- 4.2 <u>Attachment C</u> shall constitute the agreed upon Scope of Work between LACMTA and GRANTEE for the Project. The Funds, as granted under this FA, can only be used towards the completion of the Scope of Work detailed in <u>Attachment C</u>.
- 4.3 GRANTEE shall not use the Funds to substitute for any other funds or projects not specified in this FA. Further, GRANTEE shall not use the Funds for any expenses or activities above and beyond the approved Scope of Work (<u>Attachment C</u>) without an amendment to the FA approved and signed by the LACMTA Chief Executive Officer or his Designee. To the extent LACMTA provides GRANTEE with bond or commercial paper proceeds, such Funds may not be used to reimburse for any costs that jeopardize the tax exempt nature of such financings as reasonably determined by LACMTA and its bond counsel.
- 4.4 GRANTEE must use the Funds in the most cost-effective manner. If GRANTEE intends to use a consultant or contractor to implement all or part of the Project, LACMTA requires that such activities be procured in accordance with GRANTEE's contracting procedures and consistent with State law as appropriate. GRANTEE will also use the Funds in the most cost-effective manner when the Funds are used to pay "in-house" staff time. GRANTEE staff or consultant with project oversight roles can not award work to companies in which they have a financial or personal interest. This effective use of funds provision will be verified by LACMTA through on-going Project monitoring and through any LACMTA interim and final audits.
- 4.5 If a facility, equipment (such as computer hardware or software), vehicle or property, purchased or leased using the Funds, ceases to be used for the proper use as originally stated in the Scope of Work, or the Project is discontinued, any Funds expended for that purpose must be returned to LACMTA as follows: GRANTEE shall be required to repay the Funds in proportion to the useful life remaining and in an equal proportion of the grant to GRANTEE Funding Commitment ratio.

5. REIMBURSEMENT OF FUNDS

Funds will be released on a reimbursement basis in accordance with invoices submitted in support of the Monthly Progress and Quarterly Expenditure Reports. LACMTA will make all disbursements electronically unless an exception is requested in writing. Reimbursements via Automated Clearing House (ACH) will be made at no cost to GRANTEE. GRANTEE must complete the ACH form and submit such form to LACMTA before grant payments can be made. ACH Request Forms can be found at

www.metro.net/projects_studies/call_projects/ref_docs.htm. GRANTEE must provide detailed supporting documentation with its Monthly Progress and Quarterly Expenditure Reports. GRANTEE Funding Commitment, if any, must be spent in direct proportion to the Funds with each quarter's payment.

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6. REPORTING AND AUDIT REQUIREMENTS/PAYMENT ADJUSTMENTS

GRANTEE shall submit the draft of Monthly Progress Report (Attachment D-1) within seven (7) days from the last day of each month, if required, and submit the draft of Quarterly Expenditure Report (Attachment D-2) within sixty (60) days after the close of each quarter on the last day of the months November, February, May and August to the LACMTA Project Manager for review and pre-approval of the applicable report. LACMTA shall review and respond in writing to the draft Monthly Progress and Quarterly Expenditure Reports within five (5) business days from receipt. Grantee shall submit the LACMTA preapproved Monthly Progress Report and Quarterly Expenditure Report no later than five (5) days after receipt of LACMTA's written approval. Should GRANTEE fail to submit either the draft or pre-approved reports within five (5) days of the due date and/or submit incomplete reports, LACMTA will not reimburse GRANTEE until the completed required reports are received, reviewed, and approved. The Monthly Progress and the Quarterly Expenditure Reports shall include all appropriate documentation (such as contractor invoices, timesheets, receipts, etc.). and any changes to interim milestone dates that do not impact the final milestone date. All supporting documents must include a clear justification and explanation of their relevance to the Project. If no activity has occurred during a particular quarter, GRANTEE will still be required to submit the Monthly Progress and Quarterly Expenditure Reports indicating no dollars were expended that quarter. If a request for reimbursement exceeds \$500,000 in a single month, then GRANTEE can submit such an invoice once per month with supporting documentation.

6.2 LACMTA, and/or its designee, shall have the right to conduct audits of the Project as deemed appropriate, such as financial and compliance audits, interim audits, preaward audits, performance audits and final audits. LACMTA will commence a final audit within six months of receipt of acceptable final invoice, provided the Project is ready for final audit (meaning all costs and charges have been paid by GRANTEE and invoiced to LACMTA, and such costs, charges and invoices are properly documented and summarized in the accounting records to enable an audit without further explanation or summarization including actual indirect rates for the period covered by the FA period under review). GRANTEE agrees to establish and maintain proper accounting procedures and cash management records and documents in accordance with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP). GRANTEE shall reimburse LACMTA for any expenditure not in compliance with the Scope of Work and/or not in compliance with other terms and conditions of this FA. The allowability of costs for GRANTEE's own expenditures submitted to LACMTA for this Project shall be in compliance with Office of Management and Budget (OMB) Circular A-87. The allowability of costs for GRANTEE's contractors, consultants and suppliers expenditures submitted to LACMTA through GRANTEE's Monthly Progress Reports and Quarterly Expenditures shall be in compliance with OMB Circular A-87 or Federal Acquisition Regulation (FAR) Subpart 31 and 2 CFR Subtitle A, Chapter II, Part 225 (whichever is applicable). Findings of the LACMTA audit are final. When LACMTA audit findings require GRANTEE to return monies to LACMTA, GRANTEE agrees to return the monies within thirty (30) days after the final audit is sent to GRANTEE.

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6.3 GRANTEE's records shall include, without limitation, accounting records, written policies and procedures, contract files, original estimates, correspondence, change order files (including documentation covering negotiated settlements), invoices, and any other supporting evidence deemed necessary by LACMTA to substantiate charges related to the Project (all collectively referred to as "records"). Such records shall be open to inspection and subject to audit and reproduction by LACMTA auditors or authorized representatives to the extent deemed necessary by LACMTA to adequately permit evaluation of expended costs. Such records subject to audit shall also include, without limitation, those records deemed necessary by LACMTA to evaluate and verify, direct and indirect costs, (including overhead allocations) as they may apply to costs associated with the Project. These records must be retained by GRANTEE for three years following final payment under this Agreement. Payment of retention amounts shall not occur until after the LACMTA's final audit is completed.

- 6.4 GRANTEE shall cause all contractors to comply with the requirements of Part II, Section 5, paragraphs 6.2 and 6.3 above. GRANTEE shall cause all contractors to cooperate fully in furnishing or in making available to LACMTA all records deemed necessary by LACMTA auditors or authorized representatives related to the Project.
- 6.5 LACMTA or any of its duly authorized representatives, upon reasonable written notice, shall be afforded access to all of the records of GRANTEE and its contractors related to the Project, and shall be allowed to interview any employee of GRANTEE and its contractors through final payment to the extent reasonably practicable.
- 6.6 LACMTA or any of its duly authorized representatives, upon reasonable written notice, shall have access to the offices of GRANTEE and its contractors, shall have access to all necessary records, including reproduction, at no charge to LACMTA, and shall be provided adequate and appropriate work space in order to conduct audits in compliance with the terms and conditions of this FA.
- 6.7 When business travel associated with the Project requires use of a vehicle, the mileage incurred shall be reimbursed at the mileage rates set by the Internal Revenue Service, as indicated in the United States General Services Administration Federal Travel Regulation, Privately Owned Vehicle Reimbursement Rates.
- 6.8 GRANTEE shall be responsible for ensuring all contractors/ subcontractors for the Project comply with the terms of the Ordinance. GRANTEE shall cooperate with LACMTA Audit Department such that LACMTA can meet its obligations under the Ordinance.
- 6.9 GRANTEE shall certify each invoice by reviewing all subcontractor costs and maintaining internal control to ensure that all expenditures are allocable, allowable and reasonable and in accordance with OMB A-87 or FAR subpart 31 and 2 CFR Subtitle A, Chapter II, part 225, (whichever is applicable) and the terms and conditions of this FA.

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6.10 GRANTEE shall also certify final costs of the Project to ensure all costs are in compliance with OMB A-87 or FAR subpart 31 and 2 CFR Subtitle A, Chapter II, part 225, (whichever is applicable) and the terms and conditions of this FA.

6.11 In addition to LACMTA's other remedies as provided in this FA, LACMTA may withhold the Funds if the LACMTA audit has determined that GRANTEE failed to comply with the Scope of Work (such as misusing Funds or failure to return Funds owed to LACMTA in accordance with LACMTA audit findings) and /or is severely out of compliance with other terms and conditions as defined by this FA, including the access to records provisions of Part II, Section 6.

7. **GRANT**

This is a one time only grant of the Measure R Funds subject to the terms and conditions agreed to herein. This grant does not imply nor obligate any future funding commitment on the part of LACMTA.

8. <u>SOURCES AND DISPOSITION OF FUNDS</u>

- 8.1 The obligation for LACMTA to grant the Funds for the Project is subject to sufficient Funds being made available for the Project by the LACMTA Board of Directors. If such Funds are not made available as anticipated from Measure R Program revenues, LACMTA will have the right to adjust the cash flow accordingly until such funds become available. LACMTA shall have no obligation to provide any other funds for the Project, unless otherwise agreed to in writing by LACMTA.
- 8.2 GRANTEE shall fully fund and contribute the Grantee Funding Commitment, if any is identified in the Project Funding (Attachment A), towards the cost of the Project. If the Funds identified in Attachment A are insufficient to complete the Project, GRANTEE may request additional Measure R funds from its sub-region earmark pending support of the sub-region's Governing Board. A particular sub-region's Measure R funds are limited to the amount specified in the Ordinance and is still subject to approval of the LACMTA Board. Nothing in this FA shall obligate, or be construed to obligate the LACMTA Board to approve such request for additional funds. If the Funds are still insufficient to complete the Project, GRANTEE agrees to secure and provide such additional non-LACMTA programmed funds necessary to complete the Project.
- 8.3 GRANTEE shall be responsible for any and all cost overruns for the Project pursuant to Section 8.2.
- 8.4 GRANTEE shall be eligible for the Funds up to the grant amount specified in Part I, Section 2 of this FA subject to the terms and conditions contained herein. Any Funds expended by GRANTEE prior to the Effective Date of this FA shall not be reimbursed nor shall they be credited toward the GRANTEE Funding Commitment requirement, without the prior written consent of LACMTA. GRANTEE Funding Commitment dollars expended prior to the year the Funds are awarded shall be spent at GRANTEE's own risk.

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8.5 If GRANTEE receives outside funding for the Project in addition to the Funds identified in the Project Funding and the Expenditure Plan at the time this grant was awarded, this FA shall be amended to reflect such additional funding. If, at the time of final invoice or voucher, funding for the Project (including the Funds, GRANTEE Funding Commitment, and any additional funding) exceeds the actual Project costs, then the cost savings shall be applied in the same proportion as the sources of funds from each party to this FA as specified in the Project Funding and both the Funds and GRANTEE Funding Commitment required for the Project shall be reduced accordingly. LACMTA shall have the right to use any cost savings associated with the Funds at its sole discretion, including, without limitation, programming the unused Funds to another project or to another grantee. If, at the time of final voucher, it is determined that GRANTEE has received Funds in excess of what GRANTEE should have received for the Project, GRANTEE shall return such overage to LACMTA within 30 days from final voucher.

9. TIMELY USE OF FUNDS / REPROGRAMMING OF FUNDS

- 9.1 GRANTEE must demonstrate timely use of the Funds by:
 - (i) Executing this FA within **ninety (90) days** of receiving formal transmittal of the FA from LACMTA, or by December 31 of the first Fiscal Year in which the Funds are programmed, whichever date is later; and
 - (ii) Expending Project Development or Right-of-Way costs (including by deposit into a condemnation action) by the end of the **second** (2nd)fiscal year following the year the Funds were first programmed; and
 - (iii) Executing Contracts for Construction or Capital purchase within twelve (12) months from the date of completion of design; and
 - (iv) Delivering Work in accordance with schedule; changes to the schedule will require an Amendment to Attachment C to reflect updated milestone dates. Meeting the Project milestone due dates as agreed upon by the LACMTA and GRANTEE in Attachment C (Scope of Work) of this FA; and
 - (v) Submitting the Monthly Progress and Quarterly Expenditure Reports as described in Part II, Section 6.1 of this FA; and
 - (vi) Expending the Funds granted under this FA for allowable costs within five years or 60 months from July 1 of the Fiscal Year in which the Funds are programmed, unless otherwise stated in this FA. All Funds programmed for FY 2015-16 are subject to lapse by June 30, 2020.
- 9.2 In the event that the timely use of the Funds is not demonstrated as described in Part II, Section 9.1 of this FA, the Project will be reevaluated by LACMTA as part of its annual Recertification/Deobligation process and the Funds may be reprogrammed to another project by the LACMTA Board of Directors in accordance with the Ordinance. In the event that all the Funds are reprogrammed, this FA shall automatically terminate.

10. DEFAULT

A Default under this FA is defined as any one or more of the following: (i) GRANTEE fails to comply with the terms and conditions contained herein; or (ii) GRANTEE fails to perform satisfactorily or makes a material change, as determined by LACMTA at its sole discretion, to the Expenditure Plan, the Scope of Work, or the Project Funding without LACMTA's prior written consent or approval as provided herein.

11. REMEDIES

- 11.1 In the event of a Default by GRANTEE, LACMTA shall provide written notice of such Default to GRANTEE with a 30-day period to cure the Default. In the event GRANTEE fails to cure the Default, or commit to cure the Default and commence the same within such 30-day period to the satisfaction of LACMTA, LACMTA shall have the following remedies: (i) LACMTA may terminate this FA; (ii) LACMTA may make no further disbursements of Funds to GRANTEE; and/or (iii) LACMTA may recover from GRANTEE any Funds disbursed to GRANTEE as allowed by law or in equity.
- 11.2 Effective upon receipt of written notice of termination from LACMTA, GRANTEE shall not undertake any new work or obligation with respect to this FA unless so directed by LACMTA in writing. Any Funds expended after termination shall be the sole responsibility of GRANTEE.
- 11.3 The remedies described herein are non-exclusive. LACMTA shall have the right to enforce any and all rights and remedies herein or which may be now or hereafter available at law or in equity.

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12. COMMUNICATIONS

12.1 GRANTEE shall ensure that all Communication Materials contain recognition of LACMTA's contribution to the Project as more particularly set forth in "Funding Agreement Communications Materials Guidelines" available on line or from the LACMTA Project Manager. Please check with the LACMTA Project Manager for the web address. The Funding Agreement Communications Materials Guidelines may be changed from time to time during the course of this Agreement. GRANTEE shall be responsible for complying with the latest Funding Agreement Communications Materials Guidelines during the term of this Agreement, unless otherwise specifically authorized in writing by the LACMTA Chief Communications Officer.

- 12.2 For purposes of this Agreement, "Communications Materials" include, but are not limited to, press events, public and external newsletters, printed materials, advertising, websites radio and public service announcements, electronic media, and construction site signage. A more detailed definition of "Communications Materials" is found in the Funding Agreement Communications Materials Guidelines.
- 12.3 The Metro logo is a trademarked item that shall be reproduced and displayed in accordance with specific graphic guidelines. These guidelines and logo files including scalable vector files will be available through the LACMTA Project Manager.
- GRANTEE shall ensure that any subcontractor, including, but not limited to, public relations, public affairs, and/or marketing firms hired to produce Project Communications Materials for public and external purposes will comply with the requirements contained in this Section.
- 12.5 The LACMTA Project Manager shall be responsible for monitoring GRANTEE compliance with the terms and conditions of this Section. GRANTEE'S failure to comply with the terms of this Section shall be deemed a default hereunder and LACMTA shall have all rights and remedies set forth herein.

13. OTHER TERMS AND CONDITIONS

- This FA, along with its Attachments, constitutes the entire understanding between the parties, with respect to the subject matter herein. The FA shall not be amended, nor any provisions or breach hereof waived, except in writing signed by the parties who agreed to the original FA or the same level of authority. Adoption of revisions or supplements to the Guidelines shall cause such revisions or supplements to become incorporated automatically into this Agreement as though fully set forth herein.
- GRANTEE is obligated to continue using the Project dedicated to the 13.2 public transportation purposes for which the Project was initially approved. The Project rightof-way, the Project facilities constructed or reconstructed on the Project site, and/or Project property purchased, excluding construction easements and excess property (whose proportionate proceeds shall be distributed in an equal proportion of the grant to GRANTEE Funding Commitment ratio), shall remain dedicated to public transportation use in the same

proportion and scope and to the same extent as described in this FA. Equipment acquired as part of the Project, including office equipment, vehicles, shall be dedicated to that use for their full economic life cycle, including any extensions of that life cycle achieved by reconstruction, rehabilitation, or enhancements.

- In the event that there is any legal court (e.g., Superior Court of the State of California, County of Los Angeles, or the U.S. District Court for the Central District of California) proceeding between the parties to enforce or interpret this FA, to protect or establish any rights or remedies hereunder, the prevailing party shall be entitled to its costs and expenses, including reasonable attorney's fees.
- Neither LACMTA nor any officer or employee thereof shall be responsible for any damage or liability occurring by reason of anything done or committed to be done by GRANTEE under or in connection with any work performed by and or service provided by GRANTEE, its officers, agents, employees, contractors and subcontractors under this FA. GRANTEE shall fully indemnify, defend and hold LACMTA and its subsidiaries, and its officers, agents and employees harmless from and against any liability and expenses, including without limitation, defense costs, any costs or liability on account of bodily injury, death or personal injury of any person or for damage to or loss of risk of property, any environmental obligation, any legal fees and any claims for damages of any nature whatsoever arising out of the Project, including without limitation: (i) use of the Funds by GRANTEE, or its officers, agents, employees, contractors or subcontractors; (ii) breach of GRANTEE's obligations under this FA; or (iii) any act or omission of GRANTEE, or its officers, agents, employees, contractors or subcontractors in the performance of the work or the provision of the services, in connection with the Project including, without limitation, the Scope of Work, described in this FA.
- Neither party hereto shall be considered in default in the performance of its obligation hereunder to the extent that the performance of any such obligation is prevented or delayed by unforeseen causes including acts of God, acts of a public enemy, and government acts beyond the control and without fault or negligence of the affected party. Each party hereto shall give notice promptly to the other of the nature and extent of any such circumstances claimed to delay, hinder, or prevent performance of any obligations under this FA.
- GRANTEE shall comply with and insure that work performed under this FA is done in compliance with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP), all applicable provisions of federal, state, and local laws, statutes, ordinances, rules, regulations, and procedural requirements including Federal Acquisition Regulations (FAR), and the applicable requirements and regulations of LACMTA. GRANTEE acknowledges responsibility for obtaining copies of and complying with the terms of the most recent federal, state, or local laws and regulations, and LACMTA requirements including any amendments thereto.
- GRANTEE agrees that the applicable requirements of this FA shall be included in every contract entered into by GRANTEE or its contractors relating to work performed under this FA and LACMTA shall have the right to review and audit such contracts.

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13.8 GRANTEE shall not assign this FA, or any part thereof, without prior approval of the LACMTA Chief Executive Officer or his designee, and any assignment without said consent shall be void and unenforceable.

- 13.9 This FA shall be governed by California law. If any provision of this FA is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, void, or unenforceable, the remaining provisions shall nevertheless continue in full force without being impaired or invalidated in any way.
- 13.10 The covenants and agreements of this FA shall inure to the benefit of, and shall be binding upon, each of the parties and their respective successors and assigns.
- 13.11 Implementation of any ITS project shall be consistent with the Regional ITS Architecture. ITS projects must comply with the LACMTA Countywide ITS Policy and Procedures adopted by the LACMTA Board of Directors including the submittal of a completed, signed self-certification form. For the ITS policy and form, see www.metro.net/projects_studies/call_projects/other_resources.htm.
- 13.12 If any parking facilities are designed and/or constructed using the Funds, GRANTEE shall coordinate with LACMTA parking program staff (see www.metro.net for staff listing) in the planning, design and management of the facility and shall ensure that its implementation is consistent with the LACMTA adopted parking policy. For the parking policy, see www.metro.net/projects_studies/call_projects/other_resources.htm.
 - 13.13 GRANTEE will advise LACMTA prior to any key Project staffing changes.
- 13.14 Notice will be given to the parties at the address specified in Part I, unless otherwise notified in writing of change of address.
- 13.15 GRANTEE, in the performance of the work described in this FA, is not a contractor nor an agent or employee of LACMTA. GRANTEE attests to no organizational or personal conflicts of interest and agrees to notify LACMTA immediately in the event that a conflict, or the appearance thereof, arises. GRANTEE shall not represent itself as an agent or employee of LACMTA and shall have no powers to bind LACMTA in contract or otherwise.

ATTACHMENT B MEASURE R EXPENDITURE PLAN GUIDELINES PROJECT DEVELOPMENT AND RIGHT OF WAY

State Law Requires All Measure R Project and Program Sponsors to Submit an Expenditure Plan

To be eligible to receive Measure R revenues, an agency sponsoring a capital project or program must by state law (AB 2321) submit an expenditure plan that is acceptable to the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority (LACMTA). Pursuant to this law, LACMTA cannot release Measure R funds to capital project or program sponsors until an expenditure plan containing the following elements is submitted, reviewed and deemed satisfactory by LACMTA. LACMTA staff will request that an expenditure plan be submitted before making a recommendation to the LACMTA Board to program funds to that project:

- o The estimated total cost for each project and program and/or each project or program activity;
- o Funds other than Measure R that the project or program sponsor anticipates will be expended on the projects and programs and/or each project or program activity;
- o The schedule during which the project sponsor anticipates funds will be available for each project and program and/or each project or program activity; and,
- The expected completion dates for each project and program and/or project or program activity.

Each of the above elements must be provided in enough detail to determine consistency with Measure R, the Long Range Transportation Plan for Los Angeles County, and the Los Angeles County Transportation Improvement Program (also a statutorily mandated function), as follows:

- Project or program scope of work, including sufficient information to determine funding eligibility, including, but not limited to, the anticipated proportional use of current rail rights-of-way, state highways, and below-ground subways versus any other rights-of-way or above-ground work;
- A current-year cost estimate breakdown of the major sub-elements of the project such as overhead, environmental and permit work, design and engineering, right-of-way, construction/installation (including maintenance facilities, rail yard, equipment and other major components), construction/installation support, interest costs, rolling stock, and other supporting components;
- Any extraordinary project cost escalation issues, such as extraordinary commodity, rightof-way, surety, energy costs, etc.;
- O A specific and accurate description of the source, commitment, and anticipated annual availability of any federal, state, local, or private funding identified for the project if applicable including a 3% local funding contribution to rail projects if indicated in Measure R and necessary to meet project expenses, and if the source funds are in current or year-of-expenditure dollars;

- An annual schedule, in current dollars, of anticipated costs by the cost estimate categories described above; and;
- o The expected completion by month and year of project or program completion.

Below is an excerpt of AB 2321 (2008, Feuer), the state legislation that requires the expenditure plan.

What AB 2321 (2008, Feuer) Says About the Expenditure Plan:

Section b (3) B

- (f) Prior to submitting the ordinance to the voters, the MTA shall adopt an expenditure plan for the net revenues derived from the tax. The expenditure plan shall include, in addition to other projects and programs identified by the MTA, the specified projects and programs listed in paragraph (3) of subdivision (b), the estimated total cost for each project and program, funds other than the tax revenues that the MTA anticipates will be expended on the projects and programs, and the schedule during which the MTA anticipates funds will be available for each project and program. The MTA shall also identify in its expenditure plan the expected completion dates for each project described in subparagraph (A) of paragraph (3) of subdivision (b). To be eligible to receive revenues derived from the tax, an agency sponsoring a capital project or capital program shall submit to te MTA an expenditure plan for its project or program containing the same elements as the expenditure plan that MTA is required by this subdivision to prepare.
- (k) No later than 365 days prior to the adoption of an amendment described in paragraph (1) to an expenditure plan adopted pursuant to subdivision (f), including, but not limited to, the expenditure plan adopted by the MTA board as "Attachment A" in Ordinance #08-01 adopted by the board on July 24, 2008, and in addition to any other notice requirements in the proposing ordinance, the board shall notify the Members of the Legislature representing the County of Los Angeles of all of the following:
- (1) A description of the proposed amendments to the adopted expenditure plan that would do any of the following:
- (A) Affect the amount of net revenues derived from the tax imposed pursuant to this act that is proposed to be expended on a capital project or projects identified in the adopted expenditure plan.
- (B) Affect the schedule for the availability of funds proposed to be expended on a capital project or projects identified in the adopted expenditure plan.
- (C) Affect the schedule for the estimated or expected completion date of a capital project or projects identified in the adopted expenditure plan.
 - (2) The reason for the proposed amendment.
- (3) The estimated impact the proposed amendment will have on the schedule, cost, scope, or timely availability of funding for the capital project or projects contained in the adopted expenditure plan.

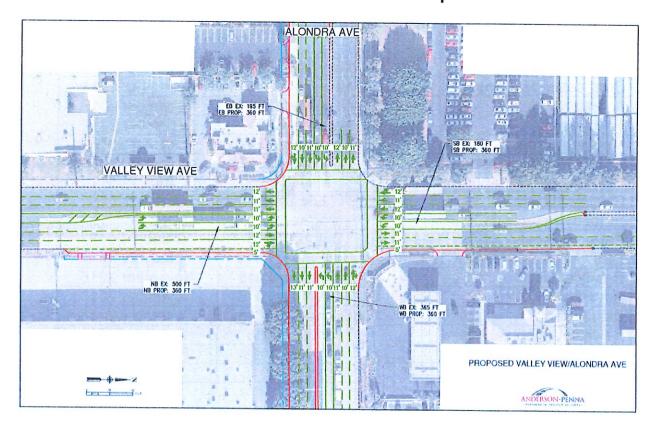

GRANTEE further acknowledges its understanding that the proceeds of the Bonds are subject to certain ongoing limitations relating to the use of the assets financed or provided with such proceeds ("Project Costs" or "Project Components") in the trade or business of any person or entity other than a governmental organization (any such use by a person or entity other than a governmental organization is referred to as "Private Use"). Private Use will include any sale, lease or other arrangement pursuant to which a nongovernmental person or entity receives a legal entitlement of a Project Component and also includes certain agreements pursuant to which a nongovernmental person will operate or manage a Project Component. Each quarterly invoice submitted by GRANTEE to reimburse prior expenditures (or to be received as an advance) shall provide information regarding the specific Project Costs or Project Components to which the Funds which pay that invoice will be allocated and whether there is or might be any Private Use associated with such Project Costs or Project Components. GRANTEE will, for the entire time over which LACMTA's Bonds or other debt remains outstanding, (1) notify and receive LACMTA's approval prior to entering into any arrangement which will or might result in Private Use and (2) maintain records, including obtaining records from contractors and subcontractors as necessary, of all allocations of Funds to Project Costs or Project Components and any Private Use of such Project Costs or Project Components in sufficient detail to comply and establish compliance with Section 141 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code"), or similar code provision then in effect and applicable, as determined by the LACMTA in consultation with its bond counsel.

GRANTEE will designate one or more persons that will be responsible for compliance with the obligations described in this Attachment F and notify LACMTA of such designations.

AMENDMENT No. 1 TO FUNDING AGREEMENT BETWEEN CITY OF SANTA FE SPRINGS AND THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY METROPOLITAN TRANSPORTATION AUTHORITY

This Amendment No. 1 to Funding Agreement (this "Amendment"), is dated as of May 11, 2020, by and between City of Santa Fe Springs ("GRANTEE"), and the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority ("LACMTA").

RECITALS:

- A. GRANTEE and LACMTA entered into that certain Funding Agreement No. 92000000MR315.41, dated February 9, 2018, (the "Existing FA"), which Existing FA provides for Valley View Ave intersection at Alondra Blvd Improvements (the "Project"); and
- B. Whereas, the LACMTA Board on October 25, 2018, delegated administrative authority to staff to extend funding lapsing dates to meet PAED, PS&E, ROW, and Construction time frames; and,
- C. Whereas, the Grantee and LACMTA desire to extend the lapsing date of the Project funds programmed for FY 2015-16 to June 30, 2021; and
- D. GRANTEE and LACMTA desire to amend the Existing FA as provided herein.

AGREEMENT:

NOW, THEREFORE, for good and valuable consideration, the receipt and adequacy of which are hereby acknowledged, the parties hereby agree as follows:

- 1. Part I, Paragraph 8 of the Existing FA is hereby amended by deleting it in its entirety and replacing it with the following:
- "8. **Attachment D** is the "Project Reporting & Expenditure Guidelines". GRANTEE shall complete the "Quarterly Progress/Expenditure Report". The Quarterly Progress/ Expenditure Report are attached to this FA as Attachment <u>D-2</u> in accordance with <u>Attachment D</u> Project Reporting and Expenditure Guidelines."
- 2. Part II, Paragraph 6 of the Existing FA is hereby amended by deleting it in its entirety and replacing it with the following:

"6. REPORTING AND AUDIT REQUIREMENTS/PAYMENT ADJUSTMENTS

- 6.1 GRANTEE shall submit the draft of Quarterly Progress/Expenditure Report (Attachment D-2) within sixty (60) days after the close of each quarter on the last day of the months November, February, May and August to the LACMTA Project Manager for review and pre-approval of the applicable report. LACMTA Project Manager shall review and respond in writing to the draft Quarterly Progress/Expenditure Reports within thirty (30) calendar days from receipt. Grantee shall submit the LACMTA pre-approved Quarterly Progress/Expenditure Report no later than five (5) days after receipt of LACMTA's written approval. Should GRANTEE fail to submit either the draft or pre-approved reports within five (5) days of the due date and/or submit incomplete reports, LACMTA will not reimburse GRANTEE until the completed required reports are received, reviewed, and approved. The Quarterly Progress/Expenditure Reports shall include all appropriate documentation (such as contractor invoices, timesheets, receipts, etc.), and any changes to interim milestone dates that do not impact the final milestone date. All supporting documents must include a clear justification and explanation of their relevance to the Project. If no activity has occurred during a particular quarter, GRANTEE will still be required to submit the Quarterly Progress/Expenditure Reports indicating no dollars were expended that quarter. If a request for reimbursement exceeds \$500,000 in a single month, then GRANTEE can submit such an invoice once per month with supporting documentation. Expenses that are not invoiced to LACMTA Accounts Payable within ninety (90) days after the lapsing date specified in Part II, Section 9.1 below are not eligible for reimbursement.
- 6.2 GRANTEE shall submit the Project expenditure estimates for the subsequent fiscal year by February of each year. LACMTA will use the estimates to determine the Project budget for the upcoming fiscal year.
- 6.3 LACMTA, and/or its designee, shall have the right to conduct audits of the Project as deemed appropriate, such as financial and compliance audits, interim audits, preaward audits, performance audits and final audits. LACMTA will commence a final audit

within six months of receipt of acceptable final invoice, provided the Project is ready for final audit (meaning all costs and charges have been paid by GRANTEE and invoiced to LACMTA, and such costs, charges and invoices are properly documented and summarized in the accounting records to enable an audit without further explanation or summarization including actual indirect rates for the period covered by the FA period under review). GRANTEE agrees to establish and maintain proper accounting procedures and cash management records and documents in accordance with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP). GRANTEE shall reimburse LACMTA for any expenditure not in compliance with the Scope of Work and/or not in compliance with other terms and conditions of this FA. The allowability of costs for GRANTEE's own expenditures submitted to LACMTA for this Project shall be in compliance with Office of Management and Budget (OMB) Circular A-87. The allowability of costs for GRANTEE's contractors, consultants and suppliers expenditures submitted to LACMTA through GRANTEE's Quarterly Progress/Expenditures shall be in compliance with OMB Circular A-87 or Federal Acquisition Regulation (FAR) Subpart 31 and 2 CFR Subtitle A, Chapter II, Part 225 (whichever is applicable). Findings of the LACMTA audit are final. When LACMTA audit findings require GRANTEE to return monies to LACMTA, GRANTEE agrees to return the monies within thirty (30) days after the final audit is sent to GRANTEE.

- 6.4 GRANTEE's records shall include, without limitation, accounting records, written policies and procedures, contract files, original estimates, correspondence, change order files (including documentation covering negotiated settlements), invoices, and any other supporting evidence deemed necessary by LACMTA to substantiate charges related to the Project (all collectively referred to as "records"). Such records shall be open to inspection and subject to audit and reproduction by LACMTA auditors or authorized representatives to the extent deemed necessary by LACMTA to adequately permit evaluation of expended costs. Such records subject to audit shall also include, without limitation, those records deemed necessary by LACMTA to evaluate and verify, direct and indirect costs, (including overhead allocations) as they may apply to costs associated with the Project. These records must be retained by GRANTEE for three years following final payment under this Agreement. Payment of retention amounts shall not occur until after the LACMTA's final audit is completed.
- 6.5 GRANTEE shall cause all contractors to comply with the requirements of Part II, Section 5, paragraphs 6.2 and 6.3 above. GRANTEE shall cause all contractors to cooperate fully in furnishing or in making available to LACMTA all records deemed necessary by LACMTA auditors or authorized representatives related to the Project.
- 6.6 LACMTA or any of its duly authorized representatives, upon reasonable written notice, shall be afforded access to all GRANTEE'S records and its contractors related to the Project, and shall be allowed to interview any employee of GRANTEE and its contractors through final payment to the extent reasonably practicable.
- 6.7 LACMTA or any of its duly authorized representatives, upon reasonable written notice, shall have access to the offices of GRANTEE and its contractors, shall have access to all necessary records, including reproduction, at no charge to LACMTA,

and shall be provided adequate and appropriate work space in order to conduct audits in compliance with the terms and conditions of this FA.

- 6.8 When business travel associated with the Project requires use of a vehicle, the mileage incurred shall be reimbursed at the mileage rates set by the Internal Revenue Service, as indicated in the United States General Services Administration Federal Travel Regulation, Privately Owned Vehicle Reimbursement Rates.
- 6.9 GRANTEE shall be responsible for ensuring all contractors/ subcontractors for the Project comply with the terms of the Ordinance. GRANTEE shall cooperate with LACMTA Management Audit Services Department such that LACMTA can meet its obligations under the Ordinance.
- 6.10 GRANTEE shall certify each invoice by reviewing all subcontractor costs and maintaining internal control to ensure that all expenditures are allocable, allowable and reasonable and in accordance with OMB A-87 or FAR subpart 31 and 2 CFR Subtitle A, Chapter II, part 225, (whichever is applicable) and the terms and conditions of this FA.
- 6.11 GRANTEE shall also certify final costs of the Project to ensure all costs are in compliance with OMB A-87 or FAR subpart 31 and 2 CFR Subtitle A, Chapter II, part 225, (whichever is applicable) and the terms and conditions of this FA.
- 6.12 In addition to LACMTA's other remedies as provided in this FA, LACMTA may withhold the Funds if the LACMTA audit has determined that GRANTEE failed to comply with the Scope of Work (such as misusing Funds or failure to return Funds owed to LACMTA in accordance with LACMTA audit findings) and /or is severely out of compliance with other terms and conditions as defined by this FA, including the access to records provisions of Part II, Section 6."
- 3. Part II, Paragraph 9 of the Existing FA is hereby amended by deleting it in its entirety and replacing it with the following:

"9. TIMELY USE OF FUNDS/REPROGRAMMING OF FUNDS:

- 9.1 GRANTEE must demonstrate timely use of the Funds by:
 - (i) executing this Agreement within ninety (90) days of receiving formal transmittal of the Agreement from LACMTA, or by December 31st of the first Fiscal Year in which the Funds are programmed, whichever date is later; and
 - (ii) meeting the Project milestones due dates as agreed upon by the LACMTA and GRANTEE in the FA; milestones include, but are not limited to the following:
 - a. for project development, GRANTEE must complete phase by the end of the second fiscal year following the year the Funds were first programmed; and

- for right-of-way, GRANTEE must follow its right-of-way acquisition policies and must show a realistic schedule for completion of acquisition required for the project agreed upon by LACMTA and GRANTEE prior to Agreement execution; and
- c. for construction or capital purchase projects, contracts shall be awarded within nine (9) months from the date of completion of design. Project design (preliminary engineering) must begin within six (6) months from the identified milestone start date; and
- (iii) submitting the Quarterly Progress/Expenditure Report; and
- (iv) funds programmed for FY 2015-16 are subject to lapse by June 30, 2021.
- 9.2 Quarterly Progress/Expenditure Reports will be used to evaluate compliance with the Project milestone due dates as identified in the FA. If the Project does not meet the milestone due dates as agreed upon in the FA, LACMTA will issue a notice of noncompliance to the GRANTEE, and the GRANTEE will be required to develop a written recovery plan illustrating in detail the GRANTEE's actions to resolve the delay and to meet the Project completion date agreed upon in the FA (the "Recovery Plan"). If the Recovery Plan is deemed viable by LACMTA staff, and meets the Project completion date agreed upon in the FA, LACMTA may grant an administrative schedule update as long as the Funds are expended in compliance with (iv) above. If GRANTEE fails to submit a Recovery Plan within 30 days of the notice of non-compliance from LACMTA, or the Recovery Plan illustrates that the Project will not meet the lapse date in the FA, LACMTA may recommend potential deobligation of the Funds as part of its annual Call for Projects Recertification/Deobligation process. GRANTEE will ONLY be allowed to request a one-time lapsing date extension of 20-months from the final lapse date, which request is subject to LACMTA's Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) consideration as part of the annual Call for Projects Recertification/Deobligation process.
- 9.3 Recertification of Funds will be based on Project progress and is subject to meeting the Project milestones as agreed upon in the FA.
- 9.4 If GRANTEE does not complete one element of the Project, as described in the FTIP Project Sheet, due to all or a portion of the Funds lapsing, the entire Project may be subject to deobligation at LACMTA's sole discretion. In the event that all the Funds are deobligated, this Agreement shall automatically terminate.
- 9.5 If the GRANTEE fails to meet any of the conditions in paragraph 9.1 above, the Project shall be considered lapsed and will be submitted to the LACMTA Board for deobligation. Expenses that are not invoiced within 60 days after the lapsing date are not eligible for reimbursement."
- 4. Part II, Paragraph 12 of Existing FA is hereby amended by deleting it in its entirety and replacing it with the following:

"12. COMMUNICATIONS:

- 12.1 GRANTEE shall ensure that all Communication Materials contain recognition of LACMTA's contribution to the Project as more particularly set forth in "Funding Recipient Communications Guidelines" available at http://metro.net/partnerscivic. The Funding Recipient Communications Guidelines may be changed from time to time during the course of this Agreement. GRANTEE shall be responsible for complying with the latest Funding Recipient Communications Guidelines during the term of this Agreement, unless otherwise specifically authorized in writing by the LACMTA Chief Communications Officer.
- 12.2 For purposes of this Agreement, "Communications Materials" include, but are not limited to, press events, public and external newsletters, printed materials, advertising, websites radio and public service announcements, electronic media, and construction site signage. A more detailed definition of "Communications Materials" is found in the Funding Recipient Communications Guidelines.
- 12.3 The Metro logo is a trademarked item that shall be reproduced and displayed in accordance with specific graphic guidelines. The preferred logo lock-up for Funding Recipients to use is included in the Funding Recipient Communications Guidelines.
- 12.4 GRANTEE shall ensure that any subcontractor, including, but not limited to, public relations, public affairs, and/or marketing firms hired to produce Project Communications Materials for public and external purposes will comply with the requirements contained in this Section.
- 12.5 The LACMTA Project Manager shall be responsible for monitoring GRANTEE's compliance with the terms and conditions of this Section. GRANTEE's failure to comply with the terms of this Section shall be deemed a default hereunder and LACMTA shall have all rights and remedies set forth herein."
- 4. Attachment B-1 of the Existing FA is hereby replaced by Attachment B1-1, attached.
- 5. Attachment C Scope of Work, attached to the Existing FA is hereby amended by deleting the Milestones table and replacing it with the following Revised Project Schedule.

AMENDMENT No. 2 TO FUNDING AGREEMENT BETWEEN CITY OF SANTA FE SPRINGS AND THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY METROPOLITAN TRANSPORTATION AUTHORITY

This Amendment No. 2 to Funding Agreement (this "Amendment"), is dated as of November 19, 2021, by and between City of Santa Fe Springs ("GRANTEE"), and the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority ("LACMTA").

RECITALS:

- A. WHEREAS, the GRANTEE and LACMTA entered into that certain Funding Agreement No. 920000000MR315.41, dated February 9, 2018, which was amended on May 11, 2020, (as amended, the "Existing FA"), which Existing FA provides for the Valley View Ave Intersection at Alondra Blvd Improvements (the "Project"); and
- B. WHEREAS, the LACMTA Board on October 25, 2018, delegated administrative authority to staff to extend funding lapsing dates to meet PAED, PS&E, ROW, and Construction time frames; and
- C. WHEREAS, the Grantee and LACMTA desire to extend the lapsing date of the Project funds programmed for FY 2015-16 to June 30, 2023; and
- D. WHEREAS, the GRANTEE and LACMTA desire to amend the Existing FA as provided herein.

AGREEMENT:

NOW, THEREFORE, for good and valuable consideration, the receipt and adequacy of which are hereby acknowledged, the parties hereby agree as follows:

1. Part II, Paragraph 5 of the Existing FA is hereby amended by deleting it in its entirety and replacing it with the following:

"5. REIMBURSEMENT OF FUNDS

Funds will be released on a reimbursement basis in accordance with invoices submitted in support of the Quarterly Expenditure Reports. LACMTA will make all disbursements electronically unless an exception is requested in writing. Reimbursements via Automated Clearing House (ACH) will be made at no cost to GRANTEE. GRANTEE must register in LACMTA's iSupplier portal and submit an application before grant payments can be made. The link to the portal can be found at

http://media.metro.net/uploads/EBB/Vendor%220Portal%20Registration.pdf . GRANTEE must provide detailed supporting documentation with its Quarterly Progress and Quarterly Expenditure Reports. GRANTEE Funding Commitment, if any, must be spent in direct proportion to the Funds with each quarter's payment."

- 2. Part II, Paragraph 9 of the Existing FA is hereby amended by deleting it in its entirety and replacing it with the following: (vii) All Funds programmed for FY 2015-16 are subject to lapse on June 30, 2023."
- 3. Attachment B1-1 of the Existing FA is hereby replaced by Attachment B1-2, attached.
- 4. Attachment C– Scope of Work, attached to the Existing FA is hereby amended by deleting the Milestones table and replacing it with the following Revised Project Schedule.

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the City Council:

- 1) Approve the Plans and Specifications for the Heritage Park Native American Pond Improvement Project; and
- 2) Authorize the City Engineer to advertise for construction bids; and
- 3) Authorize the City Clerk to file a Notice of Exemption for the subject project with the Los Angeles Registrar-Recorder; and
- 4) Take such additional, related action that may be desirable.

FISCAL IMPACT

The construction cost estimate for the Heritage Park Native American Pond Improvement project is \$240,000. The estimated total project cost, including construction, design, engineering, inspection, and contingency is approximately \$383,000. The estimated total project costs are as follows:

The Heritage Park Native American Pond Improvement Project is an approved Capital Improvement Project funded by a grant from the California Natural Resources Agency in the amount of \$276,250 for construction, with a separate design budget of \$20,000. Please note, that while the majority of the estimated construction and design cost will be covered by the current appropriated funding for the project, an additional appropriation of funds will be necessary to cover the anticipated project shortfall. Staff will be recommending an appropriation of funds at the time of the Award of Contract based on an actual construction bid amount. The current project budget is summarized below:

BACKGROUND

District Member Ian Calderon of the 57th Assembly District pledged financial assistance in the amount of \$2,520,000 to the City for improvements to various existing City parks. In January 2020, the City initiated the California Natural Resources Agency process to collect grant funding related to the various park improvement projects.

The Heritage Park Native American Pond Improvement project is located at the northwest corner of Heritage Park, south of Mora Drive. The intent of the project is to increase the pond water operation efficiencies. The scope of work consists of adding a liner to the lower pond, replacing existing piping and fittings, constructing concrete and decomposed granite, replacing pond skimmers, testing water systems, and updating adjacent landscaping plants and features. The existing lower pond liner, concrete, and piping infrastructure has exceeded its service life and needs an update to properly retain the water.

The project plans & specifications have been completed and the Public Works Department is ready to advertise for construction bids for this project, upon City Council approval. A copy of the project plans and specifications will be on file with the City Clerk.

ANALYSIS

The proposed improvements will increase pond water operation efficiencies, address the broken drain and repair leaks, and restore adjacent landscaping, to create a more appealing and revitalized environment.

ENVIRONMENTAL

Pursuant to the guidelines of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), the Heritage Park Native American Pond Improvement project is categorically exempt under Class 1(c) for existing facilities. Under CEQA, a project is exempt if the scope of work is limited to the repair, maintenance, and minor alterations of an existing facility.

DISCUSSION

The project improvements will reduce overall pond maintenance costs, and reduce operational water costs.

SUMMARY/NEXT STEPS

Upon City Council's approval of the recommended actions, City staff will advertise the project and await the construction bids that will be opened in August 2024.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the City Council take the following actions:

- 1. Authorize issuing a purchase order to Sunrise Ford to purchase three (3) Ford Explorer police pursuit vehicles in the amount of \$213,771; and
- 2. Authorize the City Manager to establish an agreement/purchase order in an amount that shall not exceed \$75,000 to acquire the items and services necessary to upfit the vehicles for field use; and
- 3. Authorize a budget transfer from the Equipment Acquisition and Replacement Fund in the amount of \$288,771 for the items above and services.

FISCAL IMPACTS

The total cost of this purchase shall not exceed \$288,771. This includes \$213,771 for three (3) vehicles and an additional \$75,000 for items and services to upfit each vehicle. Approve a budget transfer from Fund 6090-Equipment Replacement to Fund 1010-General Fund in the amount of \$288,771. Approve an Appropriation Adjustment to account 10800000-573450 in the amount of \$288,771.

BACKGROUND

The City replaces vehicles that have reached the end of their cost-effective, useful life based on age, mileage, and repair history by the vehicle replacement schedule. In addition, this program identifies adjustments to the vehicle fleet as services change in

size and scope. A recent assessment has recognized the need to purchase three (3) vehicles for the Police Department to replace aging units.

ENVIRONMENTAL

N/A

DISCUSSION

The City contracts with Whittier Police Department to provide law enforcement services. As part of this agreement, the Department of Police Services is required to facilitate the acquisition of equipment such as vehicles. Thirteen (13) vehicles have been allocated to the Police Department. Many of these vehicles are becoming expensive and no longer suitable for police work, as they are unreliable.

Since the pandemic, the acquisition of vehicles has been complex due to scarcity within the market. Vehicles being requested are not readily available and require the manufacturer's order. If vehicles are ordered today, manufacturers estimate an approximate delivery time of six (6) to eight (8) months. Although this is the case, Staff recently located vehicles from a dealer in the State. To ensure the vehicles are obtained it is necessary to place the order as soon as possible to ensure they are still available. It is requested that the City Council authorize issuing a purchase order to Sunrise Ford in the amount of \$213,771 to acquire three (3) police pursuit-rated Ford Explorers. Staff has contacted the dealership and confirmed that the vehicles are available and ready to ship.

Upon receiving the vehicles, they must be upfitted with the necessary items to ensure they are suitable for field use. This includes, but is not limited to, light bars, amplification systems, mobile data computers and docks, push bars, and decals. In addition to authorizing the purchase of the vehicles, Staff requests that the City Manager be authorized up to an additional \$75,000 to establish an agreement/purchase order with the vehicle upfitter. Staff will identify an upfitter based on the time required to complete the necessary work to prepare the vehicle for field use.

As previously mentioned, some of the Police Department's vehicles are aging and beyond cost-effective for repair and maintenance. Currently, the Department is at risk of limiting services if sufficient operable vehicles are not available. Due to the condition of the Department's fleet and market scarcity, this purchase is considered urgent outside the normal bidding process under Santa Fe Springs Municipal Code Section 34.18G, which states:

Purchases of supplies, equipment, and services shall be made pursuant to the procedures set forth in this subchapter, except for the following:

Where competitive bidding is not required by state law in specified circumstances, including, but not limited to, emergency purchases and design-build projects.

At the direction of the City Manager, Staff is in the process of implementing measures to ensure vehicle orders are placed in a timely manner. These measures include communicating with dealers to receive notifications about vehicle order windows and using PlanetBids to post vehicle bids to ensure the best pricing is obtained.

SUMMARY/NEXT STEP

Once approved, staff will issue a purchase order to Sunrise Ford in the amount of \$213,771. An additional \$75,000 is requested under the City Manager's authority to purchase the items and services necessary to upfit vehicles for field use.
